IF THE A1307 IS BLOCKED - WHERE DO WE GO NOW?

One of the questions taken up by the Police at the most recent Linton Neighbourhood Policing Panel held in June concerned the procedures for managing traffic in the event of the A1307 being closed between the A11 and Haverhill. (This has happened a number of times in the past due to accidents). There is no agreed diversion route at present. The problem is that police policy is to divert traffic onto similar class roads (i.e. A roads) but this would mean a 50 mile diversion. In order to stop through traffic selfdiverting onto unsuitable roads, an alternative needs to be agreed between the relevant authorities so that signing can be erected straight away after closure. The County Council as highway authority has undertaken to revisit this by talking to Suffolk County Council and the police to try and come up with a solution - one which we hope need be used infrequently as people start to drive more sensibly on the A1307.

DOES THIS SOUND FAMILIAR?

"the moss on your roof needs removing otherwise it will cause damage..."

"you've got a loose tile on your roof..."

"I have some tarmac left over from a job..."

"we were working on your neighbours when we noticed..." "the trees in your garden need cutting back otherwise..."

These are some of the false claims made by rogue traders who have cold called to persuade people to pay for services or goods they do not want or need. Rogue traders target the elderly and vulnerable, and deliberately overcharge for unsatisfactory, unnecessary or even no work at all. Work is often left unfinished, property damaged and sometimes intimidation is used to obtain money. People have even been taken to the bank to withdraw their savings.

The Police are working with Trading Standards and other agencies to stop and arrest these unscrupulous 'traders'. But they need your help.

Have you had cold callers knock at your door touting for business?

Have you had flyers advertising services put through your letterbox and still have them?

Are there any 'traders' that you are unsure about in your area?

Do you suspect your neighbour is being targeted and ripped off by a 'trader'?

If you have answered yes to any of these questions - we want to know details of the 'traders' and their vehicles.

NATURE NOTES IT'S NOT SO BAD AFTER ALL

I was premature in writing off 2010 as a poor year for butterflies. July and August are the prime months so I should have been a bit more patient to see what comes out. The first bit of good news is that shortly after publication I saw a few small tortoiseshells. There have been plenty of orange tips and other whites, and ringlets are now plentiful (Peter Pearson brought one up to me in a jam jar).

Di and Steve Licence have now utterly confounded my pessimism with this upbeat contribution:

"We have to disagree about the number of butterflies seen this year – we don't think there are any fewer. This month we have had an elephant hawk moth and a hummingbird moth in our garden – in the conservatory on the honeysuckle. We have also seen a dark green fritillary and a large skipper on the patio flowers.

Several Saturdays ago on a warm sunny evening we parked at Marks Grave and walked up the Roman Road towards Balsham. The flowers are spectacular up there knapweeds, bedstraws, yarrow and the lovely pale lilac field scabious and many more. There were birds - linnets, young mistle thrushes and corn buntings (which are rare nationwide, but fairly common around here). Bees and butterflies were feeding on the flowers, but the best thing of all was that we counted 25 tall broomrape - strong brown spikes about 9 - 10 inches high protruding through the grass - these parasitize the knapweeds - look closely and they have tiny yellow flowers. Also, a spindle tree had been stripped down one side of foliage, and was now covered with caterpillars inside webs. (Lyn - any idea what they areplease?)"

Further afield, I was walking on the Devil's Dyke at Newmarket Racecourse where the otherwise rare chalkhill blue was plentiful and a pair of marbled whites were flying – a really nice surprise as I associate these with the more southerly chalk downlands.

Keeping on the upbeat tone, I agree with Steve and Di that it has been a wonderful year for wild flowers. Currently scabious and meadowsweet are starring up this end of the village – in amongst those grasses many butterflies like so much. One plant that has featured in this column previously is the dreaded ragwort – poisonous to horses and cattle but vital to the survival of the cinnabar moth. This year I have seen a number of their stripy yellow and white caterpillars on ragwort plants in the area.

On a slightly more worrying note, Richard Toft asked me to mention the apparent shortage of hedgehogs. These seem to be rarely seen now in our area. Even the once common sight of the squashed hedgehog in the road is not something we now see. One possible reason for the decline has a link to last month's notes. The badger population is apparently rising, and not only do they compete with hedgehogs for food (worms, slugs etc.,) but also it has been suggested that badgers have started eating hedgehogs as well. Hedgehogs are certainly in the sharpest decline where badger populations are rising. This is a sad fact when you consider that these two ancient animals have co-existed for so long.

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LINTON FARMERS MARKET RECIPE OF THE MONTH

Raspberry Eton Mess

To serve six, you'll need:

1 pint double cream

1 lb raspberries

8 meringue nests (Waitrose and Marks and Spencer carry meringue nests which are ideal for this - crunchy on the outside with a soft give in the centre)

Crumble the meringues into bite-sized chunks with your hands. Whip the cream into soft peaks and fold in the raspberries and crumbled meringue. Spoon into serving bowls and decorate with a few spare raspberries (sometimes you'll find mint leaves dressing an Eton Mess) Serve immediately

The Year 11 ball was, once more, splendid: the students had a brilliant time, they looked fabulous and it was lovely to see so many people in our community come down to see the grand arrivals in the ever more witty and enterprising forms of transport that the students had arranged. For me, however, the best event was the last. It wasn't the grandest or the most well attended, but the fun run and fete was the realisation of an idea had by 9HP, a Year 9 tutor group. They wished to demonstrate their strength of feeling about teenagers fighting cancer. Students at the College have fought this disease very bravely and the money raised by the event will help other young people to cope too.

Adrenalin must have carried us through, but we are now enjoying a more restful few weeks.
