2010 POPPY APPEAL

What a remarkable show of support I have witnessed again this year for our service men and women who have been and are in the thick of the world's conflicts, as well as for the memory of those who made the ultimate sacrifice in the defence of our country. This of course includes servicemen and women from the two World Wars and all conflicts since then until the present day. Our four villages of Balsham, West Wratting, West Wickham and Weston Colville, all part of my area as Honorary Poppy Appeal Organiser, by their generosity during this year's Poppy Appeal, have shown that they are most definitely behind the Royal British Legion's endeavour to support every person and their families for the rest of their lives, both during and after their service to this country

This year the focus of the Appeal was about helping the Afghan generation of the Armed Forces and their families with a commitment of £25 million to the Personnel Recovery Centres including £12 million to the Battle Back Challenge Centre, a facility being built to enhance the recovery of injured and sick Service personnel. As the RBL spends over £200,000 per day to provide the welfare and support for our Armed Services, helping more than 10,000 Serving, ex-Service and family members since 2003 who are part of the Afghan and Iraq generation, the money we raise is so vital.

I am very proud to announce the figures from our local collection as follows: overall house to house, static and wreath donations amounted to £2175.43. West Wickham once again had a devoted collector obviously spurred on by Emma's wonderful help for the last few years. Wayne offered his services last year and I took him up on his offer. Helped by his sister, Wendy, he even visited outlying houses that hadn't seen a collector for many years and his efforts were well rewarded with a total of £144.02. Thank you all for such devoted help in so many different ways.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A very Happy New Year to you all. Below are various items discussed at the Parish Council meeting held on Tuesday 23rd November.

Streetly End speed limit: The formal advertisement of Traffic Regulation Orders and Speed Limit Orders is now being processed by Cambs County Council and it is hoped the speed limit change will be carried out in the New Year. Extra Councillors: The process of gaining two extra Parish Councillors is ongoing. Consultation notices have been displayed.

Crossroads signpost: The Parish Council were informed that if a Stop sign was requested approval would have to come from the Secretary of State and Highways who considered the "Give Way" sign was sufficient.

Children's Play area: There is some further work needed on the swings but this is in hand. There was a poor response to the request for help from parents in choosing new play equipment.

Finance: The accounts had been distributed and council were reminded of the need to think about expenditure in 2011/12. It was agreed that CGM should cut the recreation ground in 2011 and playing field hedges.

Correspondence: A request from the British Legion Poppy Appear for a donation towards a wreath for Remembrance Sunday was agreed and a cheque for £10.00 was sent.

Football Club: The lease between Withersfield Youth FC U14's, West Wickham Village Hall Committee and West Wickham Parish Council has been signed and is with the Parish Clerk.

Allotments: The new agreement had been signed by all but one allotment holder, who had decided not to renew. There are therefore two vacant plots – see advert on page 1. *Report by County Cllr. Batchelor:*

- a) The spending review had been carried out with cuts of 25% in the budget over the next 3 years.
- b) The Youth Club budget had been cut by one third and therefore the Parish Councils may be asked to help with funding.
- c) A1307 accident figures are down since the work has been carried out. In 2009 there were 68 accidents and 1 fatality compared with 118 accidents and 6 fatalities in 2008.

Any Other Business:

- a) The necessity to register the recreation ground, allotments and village hall with the Land Registry was discussed and the parish clerk will enquire as to costs etc.
- b) There is a need to look at archiving certain documents, and disposing of papers no longer required.

The draft Minutes are posted on the Parish Council noticeboard outside the Post Office.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 25th January 2011. All are welcome.

NATURE NOTES

I went for a walk with Dash this morning and no sooner had we crossed the road than she was in full pursuit of a muntjac. It sprang off in the direction of the Old Vicarage but quickly disappeared from view. From time to time we see fallow and roe deer as well as muntjac, and one wonders how many of them there are living around here, and how widely they range. They are very clever at remaining hidden most of the time during daylight hours so I suspect we only see the tip of the iceberg.

From the lower end of the village I hear tales of a high incidence of mice coming indoors. I would think this is to do with the cold weather, and can you blame them? I don't know whether people in Burton End or Streetly End are experiencing similar invasions or perhaps the mice in those parts are tougher. Of course there is not only the cold to worry about, there is also a variety of predators who will be feeling equally hungry, such as foxes, owls and kestrels, not to mention domestic cats. The life of a small rodent is not one to envy, although they do quite a lot of breeding.

At this time of year many species of birds tend to go around in flocks. Walking along beside hedgerows I often feel that I have unnecessarily disturbed a group of finches or fieldfares as they take themselves off to another perch, particularly when dusk is approaching and the flock may have decided to settle there for the night. If you walk alongside Rands Wood at that time of day, there is a constant flapping of woodpigeons' wings as they move off from their high perch when you walk past. What they don't seem to realise is that a person and a dog walking by in semi-darkness is no threat, especially if they are 30 or so feet below.

Jackdaws and rooks are also flocking families, only they do it all the year round. In recent weeks I have noticed as I drive back from Newmarket late in the afternoon there is quite a spectacular roosting or gathering site for rooks and jackdaws near where the road crosses the line of the Devil's Dyke. There are dozens of them crowding into just two or three trees

Nature's lessons for December: stick together at night time and if you get really cold, stay inside.

DIGITAL TV SWITCHOVER

Between now and 2012 analogue TV signals will be switched off across the UK and all terrestrial televisions will be converted to digital. Many people will be confused about the Switchover and be in need of new aerials and equipment. The process gives rogue installers the opportunity to target vulnerable people by charging extortionate fees for devices that do not work, equipment that isn't required and unnecessary labour. The Registered Digital Installers Licensing Body (RDI-LB) is the UK's only official body to register licensed digital aerial and TV systems installers. All official installers carry identification with a registered ID number, will never call without an appointment and have undertaken a Criminal Records Bureau check. By using the Registered Digital Installers website www.rdi-lb.co.uk or phoning 01353 644040 you can check the installer's id number. A Digital Switchover Help scheme, launched by the government, is also available to help the elderly and vulnerable get their television upgraded. For more information call free on 0800 40 85 900 or visit helpscheme. co.uk. Lines are open 8am to 9pm 7 days a week.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

Written on 10 December 2010

It is nearing the end of term, Christmas is approaching but this year there feels little joy in it all.

The reason for this is that, once more, our school community is facing up to the deaths of two young people: Benn Joyce (Ed. Grandson of John & Aileen Joyce formerly of the White Horse pub) and Jess Gower.

I'd like to say a few words here about each of them and to publically pass our condolences to the two families suffering the tragic loss of a child. We can't know how you feel, but we offer you our support and care.

Benn, who died in such a distressing way in our village, went to the College some years ago. He was a tall, friendly, mature boy and very pleasant to talk to. He left us in Year 9 to live with his father and we saw little of him after that, but he returned to the village and made close friendships with many of our students past and present. His death was a real shock and it is at times like this that you are reminded of how important a sense of community is everyone looking out for each other, standing side by side.

Jess Gower's death was, sadly, not a shock, but the impact was as great. Jess was a Year 10 student at the College. She had been struggling with cancer for over 18 months, but finally lost this struggle just before Christmas. Jess was a popular girl: bright, caring and energetic. We had known how ill she was and her year group had organised a fun run in her honour to raise money for the Teenage Cancer Trust back in June. The staff and students at the College have been hoping and praying for her recovery, willing her all the way. Her bravery throughout each painful treatment was incredible. Her loss has been almost harder to bear because of this.

Teenagers have an ability to support each other at times of crisis that inspires awe: they hug, cry and comfort their friends instinctively and on the occasions of both deaths I was left feeling proud of them as they reached out to include everyone in the wave of community warmth that enveloped us.
