# **NATURE NOTES**

If in your wanderings you noticed in the early part of May a large number of black bodied flies, legs dangling, airborne, and rather clumsy in their flight, this would have been the annual emergence of the St Marks Fly. This far from beautiful insect is supposed to emerge on 25<sup>th</sup> April (St Marks Day) but in fact comes out over a longer period – probably a bit later this year because of the below-average temperatures we have endured up until the time of writing. My perception is that there have been a lot of them this year – now I am aware of them I shall watch out for them next year and see when they emerge. Apparently they are harmless, and large numbers become food for predators (mainly spiders) while the lucky survivors are left to perpetuate the species.

Emergence is the theme for this month with the tadpoles, butterflies and the first fledgling birds appearing. The nicest story I have heard about this concerns Peter Pearson's coiled-up hosepipe in which a robin decided to nest. It successfully produced a brood of six chicks, ignoring the sound of running water coming through the hose at various intervals during incubation. Robins clearly know who they can trust.

As far as incomers are concerned, it seems to have been a good year for the warblers (chiffchaff, willow warbler, blackcap, whitethroat and lesser whitethroat). I have seen a few swallows, house martins and swifts, but no cuckoos or turtle doves up this end of the village. Let us know if you see or hear them.

As I write, I'm looking forward to our bat watch on Saturday, hoping the weather will be good and I'll let you know what happens in the next edition.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL FIELD MARGINS**

The ramblers amongst you will have noticed that there are six metre wide strips and three areas of one or one and a half hectares of arable land that have been allowed to naturally regenerate and have been taken out of our arable rotation. They are actually part of an environmental scheme that Natural England now sponsors.

At Manor Farm I have just signed up to a further five years of taking part in this scheme. This includes 3.15 kilometres of four meter headland strips, 3.5 hectares (8.5 acres) of field corner management and various hedge and ditch management schemes which includes very specific timing and biannual trimming, all to help our native wildlife.

You will soon be seeing signs go up saying that you are not allowed to walk on these strips as some people have been doing, basically treating them as footpaths and dog exercise tracks. They are not public footpaths. They are there to encourage all sorts of wild life in an arable environment. Natural England insists that we adhere to the guidelines and keep off these areas, please stick to the footpaths and keep your dogs under control.

# NEWS FROM LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE

Of all the times in the school year, perhaps I love May the most. The cherry blossom on the drive is always a frothy joy to behold, the students return in happy numbers to play and picnic on the school fields and the light holds long enough to make you feel that there is still something to be squeezed out of the day even after the longest of Governor's meetings comes to an end.

This year it has been especially pleasant because the monstrous sight of the dilapidated Vic Hallam is no more and you can see the pleasing design of the Newton Building clearly from the front field. It actually glints in the sun. The demolition was wonderful. There is no other way to describe it. It took three weeks in total and became a popular spectacle at breaks and lunchtimes from the various demolition vantage points. When the first window was smashed a great cheer from the students went up. We had anticipated some kind of wrecking ball would do the job, but the machine that took the building apart was modelled on a creature from the Jurassic period and it literally swivelled its terrible head, opened its jaws and then bit into the walls, chewing up the pieces into a gravelly pulp. The ground beneath is so undisturbed that Nick the archaeologist has been hovering around with great excitement. The archaeologists will be digging for the rest of the summer.

We took advantage of the sunny weather and the blossom to take a whole school photograph last week. This involved 820 children and 80 members of staff taking up their positions on a vast rig that Van Coles, the photographers, had set up on the field. When we last took a whole school photograph (10 years ago), the College had around 250 fewer people in it, so we were a little anxious about whether they could get us all into shot. We shouldn't have worried and the final result will be an especially nice memento for those children leaving us this year.

Finally, a few words about that outgoing Class of 2010. These young people are a real tribute to our community. When I first met them, they were shiny-faced 11 year olds and they now look so incredibly grown up. I have never known a group of young people who are more polite, more considerate of others, more confident or articulate. Their parents have done a great job in bringing them up, our local primary schools gave them a terrific start to their education and we, at LVC, did our very best for them too. We will miss them. Good luck folks and keep revising!

# PLAYGROUND NEWS

Sadly I have to report that the playground has suffered some damage recently, which is particularly disappointing so soon after the recent refurbishment. It has been suggested a gokart might have hit and damaged the fence over the early May bank holiday weekend Repairs were seemingly attempted to cover this up but subsequently some youngsters climbed over the damaged fence and it collapsed, leaving the wooden rails lying loose with exposed nails. Anyone could have trodden on these and been seriously injured. Unfortunately no positive identification has been made of those responsible and regrettably no one bothered to report what had happened. The Parish Council would always be sympathetic to a genuine accident. Common sense would seem to dictate that driving a motorised go-kart around a play area is frankly dangerous but now the Parish Council will have to consider formally prohibiting this from the playing field and car parks (motorbikes and horses are already prohibited on the playing field).

In the April issue of the Village Voice I reported that the Parish Council has decided to not use the playbark used before but a recycled rubber mulch specially made for school & community playgrounds. This will need little or no maintenance and not attract animal waste and a 5cm (2 inch) layer has a critical fall height of 3 meters. The Parish Council has not had sufficient funds to buy this yet but will in April, at the start of the new financial year. The rubber mulch will be delivered on pallets and when it arrives WE NEED YOUR HELP to wheelbarrow it to the pits. If you are willing to spend a weekend morning or all day helping please let me know. If anyone would like to know more about the rubber mulch please contact me, I have details and a sample.

I am dismayed that only one person has stepped forward to volunteer to help (thank you Gavin Kelsey) so the ecobark hasn't yet been ordered. IT WILL NOT BE POSSIBLE TO PUT THIS IN PLACE WITHOUT YOUR HELP. With enough volunteers this could take less than an hour of your time – surely not too much to ask when the safety of our children is at stake! All ages, shapes and sizes are welcome and how about some of those youngsters who caused the damage – perhaps they would like to make amends.
