NEW PARISH COUNCILLOR MALCOLM CAMERON

I am completely new to local politics and have arrived as a co-opted member of the Parish Council to represent Streetly End. My interest was stimulated by the need to change the speed limit in Streetly End from 40 to 30mph for the benefit of all people but especially the children who have to cross the road to catch the school bus or simply cross to use the footpath. That said, my remit now is much wider and I don't intend to be a "single issue" campaigner!

We have lived here since 2006 when a job change took me to Addenbrooke's. This move represented a return to the area for my wife Lucy who went to school in Clare, so I had a good advisor with "insider knowledge" about south Cambridgeshire and Suffolk. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The venue for the meeting, held on 26 January, was changed to the church, where the temperature was bracing. Understandably, attendance by people living in the village was low. Hopefully there will be more next time when we will be meeting in a somewhat warmer village hall.

Parish Council vacancy. Three people had expressed interest in being co-opted to the Parish Council. The council felt it was very important that Streetly End was represented and decided to co-opt Malcolm Cameron. As Cllr Cameron is unable to attend meetings on Monday evenings it was agreed to move future meetings to Tuesday evenings.

Streetly End Speed Limit. A meeting had been held with a senior officer of the County Council. Whilst the CC has accepted that the speed limit could be reduced they have not yet consulted the Police. Before they do so a further speed survey will have to be done. The CC has informed the PC that if the Police do not support the reduction then the CC will withdraw its support for it. They have also confirmed they are unable to fund the changes but were still unable to provide a detailed breakdown of the costings. This has left the PC with a difficult decision. £3000 had been raised through the council tax and from reserves in 2009 and a probable further £3000 would be needed. See item on the PC budget. The CC has also informed the PC that any works like this, funded by the PC will have to become an PC responsibility for the funding of future maintenance!

Recycling. A clothes bank will shortly be placed next to the bottle bank in front of the Village Hall.

Children's Playground. Tom Licence has finished the new swings and nearly finished making 2 new "springy" toys. A quote was still awaited for Ecoscape recycled rubber mulch, to be used instead of the bark used before. This is expected to cost less than play bark, need little or no maintenance and not attract animal waste.

Village Hall Car Park. South Cambridgeshire District Council has advised that planning permission may be required for resurfacing with tarmac as this is a non permeable surface. They would also need details of what drainage will be put in place. This information has been passed to the Village Hall Management Committee but it was not known if they had been able to take this forward vet

Parish Council 2010-2011 Budget. Whilst most budget headings will only be increased by a small amount it was agreed to raise a further £1000 towards the playground and to raise the extra £3000 possibly required for the Streetly End speed limit reductions. Printing the Village Voice has become more expensive (£300 to £450 per annum) now that

Andrew Morris is no longer able to photocopy it. It was also agreed to increase the grass cutting grant to the Parochial Church Council for the churchyard from £200 to £300. It was agreed to increase allotment rents from October 2010 to £8.00 for a full allotment, £4.00 for a half allotment & £2.00 for a quarter allotment. It was also agreed to offer a 25% discount to the 2 people who have rented multiple allotments for many years. The council agreed to increase the budget from £7100 to £9500, an increase of 33.8% resulting in a likely charge per household of £59.00.

Finance. It was noted that expenditure in 2009-2010 was in line with the approved budget with the exception of playground & playing field grass cutting. 12 instead of 11 cuts had been done resulting in an overspend of £125. The contractors would be reminded that only 11 cuts are required for 2010. The Parish Clerk announced the good news that she had been successful in claiming back £247.86 income tax that should not have been paid on the PC's bank accounts.

Pavement resurfacing and recurbing. County Councillor John Batchellor reported that a capital bid had been successful and West Wickham High Street would have new curbs and be resurfaced in February 2011 from the junction near the Church to 25/26 High Street. This news was met with some dismay as the PC had jointly identified with the County Council areas that were particularly in need of attention. These are the whole of Streetly End and the High Street from the old Chapel to the Village Hall and then in places through to Maypole Croft. Cllr Andrew Morris agreed to try and persuade the CC to re-schedule the work to the more needy areas but has since found that as this is a capital bid it is not possible to do so!

The full minutes of the meeting will be displayed on the Parish Council notice board near the Post Office, once Jenny Richards, the Parish Clerk, has returned from holiday.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 23 March, 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All are Welcome.

The Annual Parish Council meeting (AGM) and the Annual Parish meeting will be held on Tuesday 25 May. The latter gives all of you the opportunity to show an interest in the village you live in and have a say about what is or isn't going on or what you are concerned about and might like to see changed!

POTHOLES

Concerned that the County Council has not yet filled in the pothole you are worried about? It could be this is because they don't know about it! They need your help to find the location of potholes in your area. There is an online form that can be used to report road defects, such as roads or footpaths needing repair, damaged road signs, overhanging trees or bushes, flooding or standing water, broken roadside gulleys, mud on roads etc. This can be found at

You can also report these problems by phone to 0345 045

Alternatively, you can report a wide range of problems through the website www.fixmystreet.com. This allows you to pinpoint faults on a map. The fault is then reported to the relevant authority and there is also feedback about whether it has been rectified.

NATURE NOTES

We are told that the benefit of suffering a long, cold and generally grotty winter is that, when Spring finally does burst upon us, we will be treated to a spectacular few weeks when everything that has been held back by the cold rushes into colourful life. So during next month, when this phenomenon occurs, I'm hoping for lots of information about things you have seen and heard in the wild world of West Wickham. March is an exciting month for migrants arriving early or stopping off en route, so let me know when you hear the first chiffchaff or see a group of golden plovers stopping off to refuel on the journey north.

The most interesting piece of news this month is the reported sighting (by Mary Stone) of a white stork on a roof in Streetly End. Her description of the bird (black and white with a red bill), more or less eliminates all other possibilities. On checking the internet for stork sightings in Britain, there have been a surprising number – mainly in North East England before Christmas, but there has been a recent sighting in London (at the wetland centre on 3rd February) and another last year in Hertfordshire. Apparently some of these are possible escapees from wildlife parks but others may be stray migrants.

Most of the normal garden birds have been struggling in this weather and seem to be very grateful for all the bird food we put out. In this garden the tit family seems to hold sway (blue, great, coal and long tailed). We haven't had any gold or greenfinches but others tell me they have plenty. Beyond the garden (but only just), buzzards are more and more in evidence, as they are in most parts of the Country now. I'm not sure why, but they are definitely doing well.

Please keep your observations coming – they don't have to be amazingly unusual. Anything about plants, insects, birds, reptiles, amphibians or mammals is interesting.

NEWS FROM LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE

We have had a very quiet few months at the College. Of course our students have been their usual lively and enthusiastic selves and teaching and learning has continued as normal, but visitors to the site will have been able to hear, for the first time in many months, the blackbirds singing on the walnut tree in the Henry Morris garden and the rooks croaking overhead. This is because they have not been competing with the sound of delivery lorries, diggers and drills. However, the peace and tranquillity we've been enjoying will not last long.

In March, builders return to the campus to move our mobiles and refurbish them to become a temporary staffroom, learning support area and library.

Then during the Easter holiday, the hoardings go up around the old Vic Hallam building (the grotty one made of wood) and then, joy of joys, demolition starts. The Vic Hallam was meant to last 10 years at most. It has served 40+ and seeing it being dismantled will give me great pleasure.

The demolition phase will last a month and then once the site has been cleared, the archaeologists return. They will work throughout May and June and we await their findings with bated breath. When the old Horsa building came down they found significant Roman dwelling and Neolithic remains, so we are hoping for similar treasures.

In August, archaeology permitting, we begin a 58 week long construction phase. This building work will radically alter the appearance of the College – visitors will enter the College through a new reception, positioned more centrally on the site and new offices will spring up. The students will also benefit from the new social areas and the split level school library that comes with the build. We will take possession of phase 2, it is anticipated, in September 2011.

So lots to look forward to at the end of a rather noisy tunnel.
