FROM THE VICARAGE

Archbishop Rowan Williams said,

'We stand in a very vulnerable place. We stand in the middle of a human world where God's will is not the most automatic thing that people do. Where crisis faces us, where uncertainty is all around about tomorrow and where evil is powerfully at work.'

Many people pray in moments of crisis. Prayer can be a way to help us to find dignity, freedom and purpose in the midst of daily challenges and opportunities. The Archbishop suggested that saying the Lord's Prayer can help. The first few words, 'Our Father' set out a relationship,

"...we need to know that God is Our Father... and that that glorious God has made us members of his family in a very intimate and direct way... [And that this is] a relationship that nothing can break."

In a recent letter to the Church at Hildersham, Bishop David suggested, 'Pray as you can, not as you can't.' There are many ways into prayer, and some of these will suit our particular personality, experience and circumstance better than others. Sometimes, we learn the benefits of particular ways of praying even though they are not the ones that are natural to our inclination. The person who enjoys silence may find the discipline of the Anglican liturgy of Daily Prayer hard work, but also essential to bring order to the day and a sense of communion with others across the world. Those who like words may find silence uncomfortable and yet a necessary space to listen - to what is going on inside them and beyond words. However, if we are only using methods of prayer that do not suit us, we can find that we tie ourselves in knots and feel abandoned. Bishop Stephen, talking about his own education in prayer described this as 'taking on the world and falling flat.' We need to learn to pray as we can. Bishop David is coming to lead a Quiet Day on this theme on 12 November at Mill Green House, near Horseheath 10am -4pm. This is an opportunity to explore different ways of praying in order to open ways up for us. Anyone can come to this who is interested in prayer. Please ring me if you would like to join in (891350) and lifts can be arranged.

Commemoration of the Faithful Departed. We are coming up to the time of year when we celebrate the Saints and remember the Faithful Departed. Balsham Benefice Choir are going to sing a Requiem Mass on 2nd November at 6pm at Holy Trinity, Balsham to remember those who have died. There is still time to add names to the list at the back of the Church so that a candle can be lit for each person remembered.

Talk by Dirk Jonkind on the King James Version which will take place in The Chestnut Pub, West Wratting at 8pm on 2 November.

Confirmation. At the last Confirmation Service I went to, the age range was impressive. There were youngsters and octogenarians and lots in between. No one is ever too old for this. We now have two groups of people in these seven churches who are looking for Confirmation in the new year. One group is for youngsters and will meet on 19 November and the other group is for older people and will meet on 24 November. There is still time for newcomers to join in.

CONSULTATION ON REVIEW OF THE DECISION TO REMOVE ALL SUBSIDISED BUS SERVICE FUNDING

Cambridgeshire County Council wants to hear your views on changes and reductions being proposed to bus services which are supported by financial contributions from Council funds. This will help us decide on how we implement the financial savings and where possible find local solutions.

The County Council subsidises about 20% of all bus services (ED. Including those through West Wickham) which bus operators are unable to operate on a commercial basis. In the future, this may not be possible due to reduced overall grants from Government and increased costs of services. The County Council needs to make savings of around £540 million over the next 5 years and some of these savings have to come from the transport budget.

The County Council's Cabinet has agreed that a review of last year's budget decision to cut the £2.7 million that is currently spent on subsidising bus journeys in Cambridgeshire over the next 4 years should take place. This review is being carried out as part of this years budget planning process, ensuring that the Council consults widely, seek views on not only the principle of making the cuts but also on the impact of specific route changes. The Council is also looking back at the routes that have already been cut, gathering feedback on how this has impacted on communities in those areas.

Alongside this work, the Council is working hard with operators, community transport providers, local councils and businesses to find alternative and viable ways of meeting the transport needs of communities as much as possible and looking for other alternative solutions to help reduce the impact of these changes. This could be through the expansion of community transport or developing completely new forms of demand-led transport

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The following matters were discussed at the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 3 October.

Children's Play area: RoSPA had submitted their inspection report and the only high priority risk was the lack of safety notices. These have now been put in place.

Pavement resurfacing: This is now in progress.

Land Registration: A letter is to be written to the Land Registry pointing out that the boundaries shown in their registration of the Village Hall and surrounding land are out of date.

Village Web site: This is now available and it is possible that the Parish Council Minutes may be put on bi-monthly.

Finance: The Annual Return Statement had been satisfactorily examined by the External Auditors and the audit for the year passed.

Planning: An Agreement between SCDC and West Wickham Parish Council that money to be received following the development of land adjacent to 35 Streetly End is to be spent on Open Space infrastructure or towards indoor community facilities was signed by the Chairman, Marcus Cornish, witnessed by Cllr. Licence. Cllr. Morris, as Vice Chairman, will sign this on his return from holiday. The money will be spent on play equipment in the play area. Village Questionnaire: Four people had offered their services as part of the Steering Group. Joining them from the Parish Council would be Cllrs. Grieve and Hall.

Diamond Jubilee:

- 1. The parish has been offered by SCDC a sapling Oak for the Jubilee to go on the recreation field.
- Cllr. Licence would be having a meeting on 4 October to discuss further plans for the Jubilee. She asked if the village had any bunting for decoration. Cllr. Hall suggested a flag pole should be erected. Further discussions at next meeting.

Report from Dist.Cllr. Barrett:

- Future development in South Cambridgeshire. 350 sites for future development have been registered but nothing in this area, any development in villages is likely to be in-fill. Brownfield sites are also likely to be used.
- 2. SCDC has a £250m debt relating to the Council housing stock; 50% of rental income is paid to the government.
- Leaflets concerning Community Transport were handed out, promoting Balsham's "Helping Hands" scheme. Co-ordinators and drivers are needed to help with this service.

Report from County Cllr. Batchelor:

- 1. County Council had agreed that no libraries will close and the 48% budget cut was no longer required.
- 2. The decision to cut subsidised buses has been put off and consultations are being carried out.
- 3. An investment of 70m is being made by the government to get high speed broadband to the villages within the next 2/3 years.

The Minutes of the meeting are posted on the Noticeboard.

The next meeting will be on Monday 5 December 2011 at 7.30pm. All welcome.

NATURE NOTES

This month's Nature Notes comes from Di Licence:

September was a month of things we humans love to hate. moths, spiders and toads. Spectacular humming bird hawk moths on the honeysuckle, and one we can't identify on my car. We have had green shield bugs on the dahlias, and bush crickets in our house. Toads a-plenty in my compost heap, and the most beautiful garden orb spiders everywhere in the hedgerows and garden. We watched entranced for 20 minutes the other day as a tiny male spider ventured onto the web of a female and spent a long time strumming the web line and moving very stealthily towards her in the centre. He eventually spun her round, delivered the packet of sperm and made his escape but not quickly enough, she was on to him, and wrapped him up for later.

Birds have featured high on my list this month too. I saw my first kingfisher ever in the parish, down at Streetly End, near the entrance to the farm and it flashed past me along the line of the ditch, showing off its fantastic iridescent blue plumage. I was amazed as I thought they needed running water to survive.

Steve and I saw a small brown bird with a white rump flying very slowly along the field up the Roman Road one evening, obviously tired. It was low to the ground and kept stopping. We identified it as a wheatear passing through on migration.

A spectacular red kite entertained us one morning, as it was mobbed by half a dozen crows. These are becoming quite a common sight now in this area, and very easy to identify with their characteristic V – shaped tail.

In early October we noticed that the golden plovers were back on the fields around Bottle Hall, and they have hung around ever since. Sunday 9th we saw our first flock of fieldfares fly over. They are the wintering thrushes that feed on our berries.

Another treat a few weeks ago, a friend rung to say that a lilac-breasted roller, a bird never recorded outside Africa was on a ploughed field in a nearby village. It was fabulous, sitting and flying low over the soil catching insects on the plough, and then flying up into an ash tree. It must have escaped from a private collection, but nonetheless was fabulous to see, the colours being truly lovely shades of green, blue and lilac, a stunning contrast to the brown earth.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

On Friday 7 October you may have seen a group of around 800 young people, many in fancy dress, in procession along the local paths and fields. They giggled as they went, accompanied by two teachers on guitars and a trio of unicyclists. This was a LVC first: the whole of the school out on a 11km sponsored walk, the three unicyclists excepted. The walk was the brainchild of our recently rebooted Friends of LVC, who have been making amazing efforts in recent months to raise more money for the school. The focus of their fundraising is the new school building which needs equipment in the indoor student common rooms which we just cannot afford from our funding allocation. It is this kind of money for 'extras' which makes strong PTAs and Friends groups so vital to schools and we are tremendously grateful for their efforts. The Student Council has already chosen the furniture they would like for these areas and I think we now have raised enough money to make their dreams come true.

By the time this edition of the LVC News is published we should have moved into the new facilities. Our reception will be towards the middle of the site and from that point we have access to new office spaces, a staff common room and work area, the upper and lower school common rooms and the amazing cylindrical library. Phase 2 will then have been completed. Our work is far from done, however.

Back in 2003, when Clive Bush was the Principal at LVC, the Local Authority struck a deal with the College Governing Body. In return for agreeing to allow Granta Special School to be sited on some of the LVC playing fields, the Local Authority agreed to a building plan for our school which would do the following: replace the Vic Hallam buildings, improve the sports facilities, create a coherent design across the site which was in keeping with the 1937 listed building and remove the need for the mobile classrooms by building new ones. When I was appointed, the LA turned this into a three phase building programme. Phase 1 and 2 are now finished, but in 2010 I was informed that there would be no funding for phase 3 as capital funding for school buildings had been cut. This leaves us stuck with an incomplete building schedule and a number of mobile classrooms. When we converted to academy status in 2011, a glimmer of hope returned: the government was inviting bids for building work from a centrally held government pot. With our own plans at an advanced stage, we felt sure of success, only to be told that our building had too many 'Art Deco' style features in it to qualify for the per metre square unit funding that was available.

So a new local campaign starts: let's get our LVC phase 3 building work completed and rid the site once and for all of its mobile classrooms. Our community deserves better and our students deserve better.

MEADOW MATTERS

News From The Meadow Primary School

Can you believe it, but it is half term again next week (at the time of writing) – I know most of you think we are always on holiday, but when they come round they are very welcome!

There seems to have been lots of fundraising events taking place over the term:

First we had Lepra Week - a lady came in to run an assembly for the children to tell them about the Lepra Charity and how they are helping to cure people of leprosy completely within 6 months - the cost of this is £21.00 per person.
