#### LINTON HEALTH CENTRE The challenge of new technology

Our new computer system has certainly proved to be challenging for both our clinicians and the administrative teams. Getting to grips with a new appointment system, a new document management system and a new clinical record system has challenged us all.

We knew that, initially, we would be somewhat slower with all tasks but our dispensary team in particular has had a very difficult period following the change of system. One of our dispensers had an emergency hospital admission followed by several weeks off work and another member of staff was away on compassionate leave. Neither of these events could be planned for and then a failure of one part of the dispensing software and a 4 day bank holiday weekend, all contrived to put the dispensers under enormous pressure.

We are aware that the delay in dispensing repeat medication caused a great deal of frustration and difficulty for our patients and apologise for this. Some patients certainly expressed their frustrations to our dispensers, others were less vocal in expressing their dissatisfaction but we do realise it has been a very difficult time for all our dispensing patients. It must be said that the frustration of our patients was equalled by that of our dispensers who always aim to provide a safe, efficient and timely service to our patients. They were very much aware that they just could not provide the level of service that they themselves would wish to provide. They have all worked additional hours and worked on Saturdays for the past month to help clear the backlog and we can now see light at the end of the tunnel.

We would like to apologise again to our patients and wish to say a big thank you to all our staff for their hard work and commitment over these very difficult weeks.

#### **BUSES - AN UPDATE**

In my article published last month I said there were no buses on Saturday. I was wrong; the 16A will continue to operate on Saturdays but if usage drops this is under threat! The times for the Saturday bus are different from the Monday to Friday service. It leaves the village at 7.30 and arrives in Cambridge at 8.12 and returns from Cambridge at 17.40, arriving in West Wickham at 18.20.

I have continued to lobby the County Council for a better service for the village on the new 19 shuttle bus, stating that the minimum should be a scheduled outward and return service in the morning and afternoon as well as the early evening return from Linton. I have suggested they could cut West Wratting from some of the journeys and route these through West Wickham instead. They have agreed to look at this. Please let me know if you have used this bus and any good or bad experiences of it.

On Thursday 14 June the County Council held another meeting to discuss the current situation and "alternative transport" options. They gave reassurances that the 16A & 19 buses will run until there is a permanent solution and have recognised that the September deadline to find this is not practical. They also suggested that the County Council may have an obligation to get 16+ students to their colleges when the school leaving age raises to 18 and running a bus to do this is no more expensive than running a regular service. Consequently the 16A bus looks safe(ish).

The meeting was very well attended and those there firmly stated their preference for the reintroduction of a regular bus from Haverhill to Cambridge via the villages, instead of the 19 shuttle to Linton & Haverhill. The County Council has agreed to consider this but before they do so want to organise a transport questionnaire to find out current and possible future usage and also to find out what would encourage people to use buses more. This hopefully will be inserted in next month's Village Voice.

## USING THE NEW 19 WEEKDAY BUS SERVICE

The new bus timetable is not the most convenient but it is only intended as an interim measure. The 19 is a minibus service which goes to Haverhill via Linton or it connects with the 13/13A at Linton for Cambridge. When catching the bus at 9.14am look out for a white minibus with Cambs County Council on the side and 19 on a paper sign in the back and front windows. There is a few minutes wait at the central bus stop (by the bus shelter) in Linton if you are changing for Cambridge (stay on the bus for Haverhill, it returns at 11.56am). Unfortunately, you only get just over an hour in Cambridge before catching the 11.30am 13A back to Linton. BEWARE - the timetable says Bay 8 in Drummer Street but buses come in at other bays and the drivers don't let you know. There is about a 20 minute wait in Linton for the 19 (on the opposite side from the bus shelter) and you need to tell the driver you want West Wickham. The only alternatives from Cambridge are the 4.15pm 16A or the 5.30pm 13A to Linton changing to the 6.24pm 19 for West Wickham.

## **ANNUAL PARISH MEETING 28TH MAY**

The Chairman welcomed just 3 parishioners, County Cllr. Batchelor and Dist.Cllr. Barrett, the Parish Council and Parish Clerk.

His report is printed with the other reports received in this issue of Village Voice.

Mr Lawrence Green who should have been at the meeting to talk about Emergency Plans for the village in case of an incident will be coming to the next Parish Council meeting on Monday 23 July at 7.30pm.

Neighbourhood Watch: It was considered to be a good idea to investigate the setting up of a Neighbourhood Watch Scheme, which would need the support of the Parish Council and the Police and would require a co-ordinator to get feed-back from the Police and a small team. Cllr. Grieve agreed to write something for the Village Voice (see next month) and Mr Nick Salter said he would put something on the village website. Cllr. Grieve will also contact the Police to find out what is involved in setting this scheme up.

Regretfully no reports were received from the Pre-School or the Governors of the Meadow School & Linton Village College!

#### **PARISH COUNCIL CHAIRMAN'S REPORT**

"Six formal meetings have been held by the Parish Council during the year, with one extra brief planning meeting. We have completed our first full year as a team of seven councillors; I hope the Parish appreciate the time and effort that the parish councillors put into representing you in a multitude of areas. Not least of which is taking time out from training to keep up with new directives from Westminster. The Council has taken time and effort to prepare for our Queens Diamond Jubilee, this is a once in a lifetime occasion and I hope the Parish events prove to live up to a wonderful few days. My thanks go to Cllr. Di Licence for taking charge of this. Cllr. Andrew Morris has kept our accounts on track, many thanks to him, particularly for guiding them through the legal requirements - thank you. Our clerk, Jenny Richards, has completed yet another year of managing the council, despite the extra load of the larger Council - thank you. My thanks also go to the District and County Councillors who attend our meetings and take further our questions to them."

#### **COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORT**

Guided Bus. It has been an eventful year at the County Council. The Guided Bus Route opened at last, two years late and £90 million over budget. It has been a great success in terms of numbers travelling, just a pity it benefits such a small part of Cambridgeshire and that we have to await a High Court decision to see if we will get any of our £90 million back.

Bus Cuts. The decision to withdraw all bus subsidies was met with consternation. Many petitions against the cuts have been presented, including one from the Balsham area. Balsham will be hard hit with the 16 & 19 going in June leaving just one bus per day. We are being told that no service will be withdrawn without putting something as

Any Other Business:

Mr Salter raised the question of the impact on West Wickham of the Windfarm, three of the turbines having been erected. Cllr. Plumb had written to RES requesting information about funding for community projects but had heard nothing back. The question as to West Wickham's eligibility to receive funds from the £37,000 annual pot will be looked into.

Mr Paul Donnert spoke about the recent serious 3-car road accident at the Wratting Common cross roads despite all the new posts recently erected. A "Stop" sign rather than a "Give Way" sign could have more effect, but Highways Dept. do not agree. It was agreed that West Wickham and West Wratting should tackle this problem out together. Firstly the accident statistics need to be looked at and various ways of slowing traffic considered.

good or better in its place. Lets hope that is true. We have not had much evidence of it as yet. At the public meeting we held in West Wratting all that was talked about was Dial-a-Ride and care sharing schemes. They have their place but they are no good for getting to work or getting students to college. For that we need regular, reliable services. That sounds like a bus to me.

A1307. The A1307 continues to be a concern. The good news is that injury accidents are down more that 40% over the last three years. We still need to do more. Recently a large lorry ploughed into the garden of house near the Village College at Linton. Fortunately there was no injuries but that was just good luck. There is now a A1307 Advisory Group been set-up by the County, which I chair, this is a forum for parish councils and other interested parties to feed their safety ideas for the A1307 into the County Council. Do take advantage of this and feed in your thoughts, we need to keep the pressure up and to keep the A1307 a priority for action.

Broadband Upgrade. High speed broadband on the way? The County are proposing to invest up to £20 million to encourage the spread of high-speed broadband into the rural areas. By 2015 they are planning to provide 90% of homes and businesses with at least 25 mbps. To do this we have to demonstrate to the suppliers that there is a real demand. We need everyone, parish councils, local businesses and individuals to sign-up and show their interest. Do register at www.connectingcambridgeshire.co.uk

This will influence which areas get the improved service first or at all. This is about those that shout loudest getting the attention. Not as it should be but that is the reality. So get shouting.

Wadlow Wind Farm. The turbine parts are being delivered and it is expected that the first turbine will be erected around 22 May. Work will then continue to complete the 13 units. It is anticipated that production of electricity should start in September.

One month after the site is fully operational the first monies will be paid to the Community Fund. The fund is being managed by the Cambridgeshire Community Foundation.

The Fund Panel met last month to discuss eligibility criteria and measures for advertising the fund within local communities. They should be in a position to distribute grants towards the end of the year.

#### **DISTRICT COUNCILLOR**

**Finance:** This has been another difficult year with no Council tax increase and another poor financial settlement from central government. Redundancies have been made from senior management and other posts through leavers and retirement have as far as possible.

**Planning:** So far we have had two meetings looking at future planning for the next few years up to 2031 details are still coming in from central government. It appears that little development will take place in our smaller villages unless a majority of the local community wants it, generally development will take place in our rural centres (larger villages) and Northstowe.

**Housing:** Major changes in council housing, as from April this year South Cambs has taken on Government debt of 204 million pounds to be paid back over 30 years. Up until April Council were paying back to Government 53p in every pound of rental income amounting to 12 million pounds each year. This will now be used to pay back the debt.

#### REV DR JULIE NORRIS PRIEST IN CHARGE

(Ed. This was a very long report and has had to be edited down to items relevant to West Wickham)

This has been a year in which the collaboration between the Seven Churches has begun to bear fruit in some lively services and activities to enrich the parishes. The Secretary of the Diocese, Graham Shorter, in a recent Report made the following general comment, 'signs of flourishing are not just increasing numbers attending on Sundays and midweek, but also generous giving, outward looking, mission minded, good liturgy, faithful teaching and mature discipleship.'

This has been a year when the signs of our flourishing have been visible in services, study and new projects.

**Ministry Personnel:** Very Rev Keith Johnson has worked diligently over the year, conducting at least two and often three services each Sunday and stepping in to take funerals and a wedding when I have been away. In addition he has contributed to the theological and spiritual life of the Seven Churches. He initiated the study of Canon Andrew White's book, 'Faith Under Fire', and the invitation to Andrew to preach to us in September.

Sharon Clark began the year hampered by illness. Even in the midst of this, she carried on sharing services and exercising her pastoral ministry. It was great to see her run the Sunday Evening Meditation, 'Christmas by Candlelight' in December.

Ven Alan Clarkson, Canon Alan Cole and Canon Pam Reed have also conducted services for us.

Rev John Fellows was appointed as the House-For-Duty Priest to work across the Seven Churches and live at West Wratting. He will be licensed in April 2012. Thank you to all the clergy and ministers who have conducted worship. I count myself as privileged to work with you.

**Services:** West Wickham. Evensong was reintroduced. Work with children and schools:

The Meadows School, Balsham I have taken assemblies three out of four Thursdays during school term and have also held Christmas, Easter and Harvest services in Church. There have been other occasions when I have been invited to take groups of children around the church and to talk about the Christian Faith

West Wickham Family services continue to thrive under Jane Scheuer's care.

**Occasional offices:** Between us we have carried out the following offices

8 weddings and 1 thanksgiving services (1 in West Wickham)

21 Baptisms (non in West Wickham)

34 Funerals either in the Parish Church or at the Crematoriums in the 6 Parishes. (2 in West Wickham)

**Prayer:** Quiet Days for the Seven Churches took place on three occasions at Mill Green House. We looked at some writings of Julian of Norwich, the Magnificat and Bishop David lead a session on different methods of praying.

**Talks and study groups:** The Question of Life Lent Course took place to address questions asked by people in conversations outside church. The invited speakers were Rev Professor Michael Reiss who tackled the question, 'Should we use medical technologies to enable people to live for hundreds of years? Wayne Talbot, Ely Diocesan Environment Officer, spoke about 'Fasting for the future.' Keith Johnson explored interfaith issues asked, 'Can there be genuine tolerance and understanding between faiths?' Professor Robert McCorquodale led an interactive session on Human Rights and Christian Responsibilities and Jonathan Borough, Chaplain at the Arthur Rank Hospice addressed the question, 'Where is God when it hurts'. These proved to be popular topics with 40-50 people attending each talk.

A study group began to explore Andrew White's book. The venue for this book group moved between churches with one memorable meeting at West Wickham with cakes.

**Music:** We are indebted to our organists for their contribution to our worship.

West Wickham: Jackie Romanis plays for the Family Service

The Balsham Benefice Choir: The choir at Balsham meets each Monday under the tutelage of Richard Skinner and has not only taken a part in special and united services, but has also sung for some of the weddings, and at concerts. Thank you to our organists and choirs.

**Fund Raising Events:** West Wickham held its fair in the grounds of Marcus and Nicki Cornish Manor Farm. This event drew people from a distance to the car boot sale, the traditional village games and stalls and the Barbeque.

In the future, the Diocese wants to resource parishes that make an effort to be self-supporting. The impact of what has been accomplished over the last year will, we hope, make new things possible for the future.

**Building Projects:** In addition to the normal attention to the church fabric several PCC's began specific church building projects.

West Wickham, had its Quinquennial Inspection. Much to the relief of everyone, the urgent tasks are neither numerous nor as expensive as they might have been.

The upkeep of these ancient buildings is a huge undertaking and I am thankful to all who are involved in this.

Thank you also to all who have cleaned, set up for services and been sidesmen over the year and also to the flower arrangers who sensitively give us floral arrangements in season and some spectacular displays for special occasions such as Easter and Christmas.

**Churchyard:** The Churchyards are largely maintained by volunteers who tidy up, prune trees and often look after neglected graves. There have been some enjoyable and effective community and church clear-up days. Thank you to everyone who works so hard to make these peaceful places for the community and all who grieve.

**Rural Dean;** I was asked in September to be Rural Dean. I only agreed when I was convinced I was being called for a reason, and because I have such a great team of people, both amongst the ministry group and in the local parishes here. Thank you for your support.

#### VILLAGE HALL MANAGEMENT COMMITTEE

**Usage.** The Hall continues to be regularly used by a number of different groups from within and outside the village and there has been an increase in the number of bookings from the previous year.

Daisy Chains Preschool continues to be the biggest user of the Hall and although their numbers had been low in September, they have now increased to twenty seven. The preschool has relied on fundraising events held at the Hall including the Christmas Fayre, Quiz Night and Jumble Sale. The KenYuKan club have extended their sessions and are the second biggest user, and a Karate club has also started. The Carpet Bowls, History and Gardening Clubs continue solidly and are all represented on the committee.

Village Hall Committee. Patrick Charlton has joined the Committee as Parish Council representative and has also taken the lead on health and safety issues. Brian Upton has joined as representative for the carpet bowls club. Simon Keen has kindly taken on the role of Invoicing Secretary. Other positions remain unchanged and the Committee continues to effectively manage the Hall providing a benefit to the local community.

**Maintenance.** Richard Grenville has addressed several maintenance jobs during the past year and Nadine Warner, our caretaker, continues to keep the hall in fantastic condition.

There has been a problem with the Elvaco heating system over the winter which has caused some inconvenience to users. The Committee would like to apologise for this. Unfortunately, Elvaco are no longer trading and it has been difficult to find a company willing to service the system. To date, two of the three heating fans have been replaced and the system is running effectively, but more work is needed to get the system back to full efficiency.

**Finances.** The Hall income is covering costs and the increase in rates last year has helped to offset spiralling energy prices. The Committee investigated the option of solar panels to reduce electricity consumption and to generate an income from the Feed In Tariff (FIT). However,

given the considerable investment required and the continuing uncertainty around FITs, the Committee decided against installation at this point. The Committee wishes to thank Martin Kerslake for his considerable efforts investigating the options and for obtaining quotes.

Some of the equipment in the Hall is showing signs of wear and tear and we are looking to fundraising and donations to help bolster finances. The Village Hall Committee will be running the BBQ and bar at the forthcoming jubilee event and it is hoped this will make a profit for the Hall. There is currently a vacant Fundraising Secretary post on the Committee and we would be delighted if someone steps forward to take this on.

**Website.** The website at http://westwickham.org continues to provide a professional web presence for the Hall and the online enquiry and booking feature has attracted several new users, mainly from outside of the village.

The content on the site has been building slowly during the year; Committee meeting minutes and Village Voice back issues are now online along with some basic information on the clubs using the Hall. Clubs and other users are encouraged to make full use of this facility and to contact the Committee to get their content added.

The AGM for the Village Hall is expected to be in September. The date will be announced nearer the time in the Village Voice and posted on the website.

#### WEST WICKHAM & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB.

The membership of the Club remains healthily in the mid forties, drawn from West Wickham and the surrounding villages; in February the Club had 43 paid up members. All the Club's regular meetings and most of its special events take place in the West Wickham Village Hall.

The core of the Club's activities is its monthly meetings, at which garden topics are introduced and discussed. Topics during the past year include bees in the garden, fruit trees, garden mazes, irises, ferns, and fences, and also a well received talk by the Club's treasurer, Andrew Morris, on the floral art in the Fitzwilliam Museum. These meetings are consistently well attended by members.

Arguably the high points of the Club's year are the two special events which it organises in the Village Hall. The first of these is the Annual Show in August, which in 2011 saw an increase in the number of entries and the maintenance of a high standard. The second has just occurred, and is the Annual Plant Sale, which has developed a considerable reputation for offering a good range of modestly priced plants (supplied by Club members), and which subsidises the Club's other activities; the takings at this year's sale set a new record.

The Club also organises a number of outdoor events when the days are longer and the weather more clement. Thus last June, Club members in Streetly End, Shirley Shadford and Jean and Kit Martin, opened their gardens to members, and in July four Club members in Castle Camps did likewise. In addition the Club organises an Annual Trip or outing, which during the past year was to Myddelton House and Capel Manor College in Enfield – two most interesting gardens, though members' support for the trip this year was disappointing.

Two other Club activities, at opposite ends of the scale of practicality, are the administration of a scheme whereby members can buy seed at a large discount, and the conducting of a Christmas raffle through which two members win subsidised tickets to the Chelsea Flower Show. Both have been well supported.

The affairs of the Club are administered by a committee, which deputes the running of the Annual Show to a subcommittee, and which is itself answerable to the A.G.M. of members. At the September 2011 A.G.M., the Treasurer, Andrew Morris, produced a financial statement which showed that, despite the increasing cost of speakers and of hiring the Village Hall, the Club had a small surplus balance. Hilary Thomas was re-elected to the chair of the Club. The Club has an entry on Camnet, and its programme is included on the Village Hall website.

## WEST WICKHAM & DISTRICT LOCAL HISTORY CLUB

The Club remains small in numbers (about 13) but has had a full programme of talks during the year on a range of subjects including the history of Abington through maps, the archaeology of the roads & dykes of SE Cambridgeshire (to which members of the Friends of the Roman Road & Fleam Dyke were invited), customs and folklore, dating family photographs and the history of the long-demolished Horsheath Hall. We have had an evening walk around the site of the Hall and have one planned in Linton for June. The small membership does make it difficult when it comes to booking speakers and we are lucky in being able to call on some 'home-grown' ones and friends but we could desperately do with some more support. It is a puzzle, when there is seemingly so much interest in history, to know why more people don't come along. 'We keep meaning to' they say but don't make the effort! We will again be organising a programme for the coming year and all are welcome to come along to any or all meetings.

Research into the history of the village continues. Recently, this has concentrated on the 1950s for the Jubilee exhibition '60 years ago – the way we were'. This year there have not been quite so many enquiries from people investigating their own family links to the village but they are beginning to increase again. The project to identify the men who died in the First World War and are listed on the war memorial in the churchyard is still ongoing

We have made a tentative application to take part in Cambridge Community Heritage Project, a new initiative to bring together Cambridge University researchers and communities in investigating their local heritage. This attracts grant funding from the Heritage Lottery Fund and is linked in to the new BBC series by Michael Wood 'The Great British Story'. The idea is to look for the archaeological evidence for medieval settlement by making as many test pits as possible around the village. Everyone will be able to get involved in this so it should be really exciting.

The Club is affiliated to both the Cambridgeshire Association for Local History and Cambridge Antiquarian Society so our members are able to attend their meetings and conferences. Personally, I represent the Cambridge Antiquarian Society on the County Advisory Group on Archives & Local Studies. The Club also supports the Friends of the Roman Road & Fleam Dyke for whose newsletter I occasionally contribute articles and I have given a number of talks this year to various organisations on Horseheath Hall (for many centuries until the 1790s, West Wickham was part of the Horseheath estate).

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the Annual Parish Council meeting held on Monday 28<sup>th</sup> May 2012 the following items were discussed:

Election of Chairman, Vice Chairman and Appt. of two Councillors to represent the Parish Council on the VHMC:

Marcus Cornish was re-elected as Chairman, Andrew Morris was re-elected as Vice Chairman, Cllrs. Cornish and Charlton were prepared to remain as the representatives on the VHMC.

*Land Registration:* The Playing Field, Playground & Allotments have now been registered with the Land Registry.

*Old Filtration Plant:* South Cambs. District Council has agreed to transfer this piece of land at no cost to the Parish Council and it was agreed that this should be accepted.

*Allotment:* A quarter allotment is still available, if interested please contact either the Parish Clerk or Cllr. Morris.

*Playing Field:* This is now registered as a Queen Elizabeth II Playing Field.

*Streetly End Speed Limit:* It is hoped the 30mph signs on the tarmac will soon be in place.

Finances:

a) *End of year accounts:* The figures were agreed and accepted by the Parish Council and signed by the Chairman. *b) Statement of Accounts (for the external audit):* This was agreed and signed by the Chairman and Parish Clerk.

c) Statement of Governance: This was read and signed.

*d) Financial Reserves:* Allocated reserves £8065.58; Jubilee Celebrations £500; Flag pole £400; Streetly End Speed Limit charge £3500; Playground £2623.78. Unallocated reserves £1770.86.

Planning:

S/0220/12/FL – 10 Burton End. Refused by SCDC.

S/0752/12/FL – Yen Hall. Recommended for approval by WWPC.

*Village Questionnaire:* 159 letters had been delivered and so far 119 had been completed and returned with 35 still outstanding.

*Diamond Jubilee Celebrations:* These were all in place and the Chairman thanked Cllr. Licence and her team for all the work involved in putting the events together.

*Bus Service Review:* On 10 June the No.16 bus will be cut and West Wickham will receive a single scheduled outward and return journey from the No.19 shuttle service to Linton. Cllr. Morris continues his campaign to get County Council to provide the same number of buses each day as West Wratting, Weston Colville and Balsham receive. County Cllr. Batchelor is also concerned about the situation.

*Reports by District Cllr. Barrett and County Cllr. Batchelor:* Both reported budgeting difficulties and redundancies. The main issue with County Council was the bus service review.

Any Other business:

It appears the Telephone Box has now been reconnected by the Electricity Board, who also removed the pair of trainers which have been hanging from the electric wire on the Playing Field

The next meeting will be on Monday 23 July at 7.30pm, all are welcome. The draft minutes for 28 May meeting are on the Parish Council notice board.

#### **NATURE NOTES**

I've been reading a book about an attempt to see all 59 species of Britain's butterfly population in one summer. The author did it in 2009 but this year, I don't think he would have succeeded. Butterflies in general don't like it cold, wet and windy. The creatures that do appreciate the wet weather are the slugs and snails, armies of whom have been waging war on our juiciest garden plants and salad crops. Gardeners may not like this, but song thrushes, badgers and (if there are any) hedgehogs do appreciate a plentiful supply of slugs and snails as part of their diet. Song thrushes have been in good voice all through the spring and early summer.

Flags and bunting have adorned the village since the Jubilee weekend, and nature has been doing her bit too. The yellow flag irises have been looking bright and cheerful on the margins of various ponds, while the bunting family have been very much in evidence. Vic and Beryl tell me that they have been regularly visited by reed buntings feeding from their bird table, while only this morning I was down on the Roman Road watching corn buntings producing their "jingling keys" song from the telegraph wires above the hedgeline. The other most familiar member of the bunting family, the yellowhammer, has been even more plentiful than usual this year.

In case anyone is feeling gloomy about the summer of 2012, Di has some thoughts which should cheer you up:

"Despite the weather telling us otherwise, summer is here. It is all around us, in the hedgerows the May blossom has been and gone and is replaced with the delicately fragranced dog rose, the heady elder flowers, and the beautiful guelderrose. The grasses are in full flower on the verges, and the birds are very vocal in the trees. Every morning the blackbird sings his joyous song in our garden, and in the evening a song thrush trills beautifully from the ash tree. All the summer warblers are singing in the hedgerows, and the garden trees are full of squeaking unidentifiable youngsters. We haven't seen many butterflies, probably due to the lack of sunshine, and even fewer bats in the evenings, but the bees seem as active as ever. Jan and I witnessed a hare recently staring at two partridge in the field, not three feet away from him, he was raising and lowering his ears, (not sure what that was all about!) In the field behind the church last week a red kite was being mobbed by 3 crows and I spotted a little owl sitting on top of a pole early one morning. Of course the summer visitors - swifts, swallows and martins are busy singing and nesting too. Yes, summer is definitely here!"

Well, she is right so I should stop dwelling on the problems of butterflies, the lack of cuckoos and turtle doves and the difficulties the smaller plants will have competing for light amongst all the lush growth brought on by the rain. Actually a walk round West Town Park in Haverhill (opposite Sainsbury's) is good for the soul – the wildflowers are spectacular at the moment, especially the ox-eye daisies but also various vetches and orchids (pyramidal and bee). Of course you don't have to go to Haverhill to see bee orchids. Some lucky people have them growing in their lawns, including Ann Denley, and they can been seen by roadside and along footpaths in the village.

Final happy note: I saw a nuthatch in Rands Wood last week.

#### FROM THE VICARAGE

I had a phone call the other day to take the funeral of a woman who lived rough near to the village of Abington. She died in her sleeping bag under a tarpaulin, make-shift tent. I had never seen her and had no idea she was living like this. She had become invisible. No one knows her name.

In the same week, I was told of a conversation that took place when someone from Hildersham went into town and passed the time of day with a man selling The Big Issue. At the end of the conversation the man said, 'Thank you, you stopped me from feeling invisible.'

Perhaps it is easier than we sometimes realise to become invisible.

There are some initiatives taking place to try to make sure that people in our own villages do not become invisible. One of these is the conversation taking place about the Parish Nurse and Older Person's co-ordinator. In the churches we are wanting to find ways of working with other people in each community to make sure that those who become vulnerable through illness or a crisis, do not become isolated or invisible. We are following up the talk last month with another meeting of anyone interested at 7.30pm on 13<sup>th</sup> August at West Wratting Village Hall.

There are also small things that we can do within the communities to mitigate against isolation. We can look out for people, take time for conversations over the wall. And those who drive can offer transport to the hospital or surgery for those who can't.

There are confirmation classes taking place and there are places for more candidates.
