FROM THE VICARAGE

Twenty-four people came to a meeting on 13th August to explore the prospect of having a Parish Nurse. At the meeting it was noted that there are people who are struggling in our villages and whose needs are not met by statutory service providers. Good neighbours and priests and lay people from the churches work to try to help, but find that needs are increasing. There are communications links that are missing to support the work of caring agencies in the community. There is sometimes a need for an advocate to work with individuals when they need to access help. It is not just the elderly but across all ages. Young and old people who are ill or incapacitated can experience isolation. Mental health issues can affect all ages, sometimes made worse by economic stress. The GP's at the meeting talked about the potential benefit of having someone who could form a strategic link between the community and healthcare providers.

The vision for the Parish Nurse is that he or she would work with vulnerable people of all ages, including young families and those with mental health problems, often as the first point of contact, referring people on to other schemes and health professionals and providing an important link in the network between service providers and our communities.

West Wickham is fortunate to have both a Warden and a retired nurse who help in the parish. Other parishes do not have these resources. We will seek to navigate an appropriate way round the consequently differing needs.

At the end of the meeting it was agreed to develop this further by setting up a group to work out a more detailed job description, costings and to look at how to raise the funds needed.

It was also understood that the role of the Parish Nurse should be structured so that it meets new needs and does not replicate the valuable work of the Warden Scheme in West Wickham, West Wratting &Balsham. If you can make a contribution to this vision, or can offer advice as we begin this venture, please contact me, Julie Norris (891350).

LINTON HEALTH CENTRE Accident and Emergency attendances

Nationally, practices are being asked to reduce A+E attendances by providing easier access to practice clinicians during normal working hours, particularly for minor injuries/illness. As always, finance lies behind this target for GP practices. An attendance at A+E starts with a minimum charge of £56, whether the patient waits to be seen or decides to leave the department without being seen. The charges increase considerably if x-rays or blood tests are taken or if a cut is glued or sutured. It is surprising how many attendances at A+E result in advice only, with no investigations or treatment whatsoever. These are the attendances that we are being targeted to reduce.

Here at Linton we have always been open from 8am-6:30pm on weekdays and we have always offered a minor injury service. Our local schools and local employers would generally think of us before embarking on a trip to A+E, but we wonder whether the wider practice population would think to call on us first?

There are certainly benefits to being seen at the practice: we have free parking for a start. Minor injuries are usually fitted in with a nurse in the first instance (as often happens at the hospital) but you will never have to wait up to four hours to be seen! Our nurses are highly trained and will be able to deal with many minor injuries themselves and the duty doctor can always be called if necessary.

FLU CLINICS: Summer is almost over and we are preparing for our annual flu clinics. We plan to run clinics on Saturdays 13th, 20th and 27th October and will be taking bookings from mid September onwards. All over 65's and those in clinical at-risk groups should be immunised. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The following is a summary of matters discussed at the meeting held on 23 July 2012.

Old Filtration Plant: SCDC has agreed to pay the costs for passing the ownership to the Parish Council but before Council agrees to taking ownership it is necessary to know to whom the track leading to the piece of land belongs.

Woodland Trust: Cllr. Hall had looked at the proposed site for the new trees and is submitting the plan to the Woodland Trust. There are 60 trees available some of which could also be planted on Maypole Croft.

Church Insurance: It has been established through CAPALC that money can only be given by the Parish to the church for maintenance or a donation through S137 could be made to help cover the cost of an event. The Chairman is looking further into this.

Village Sign: All agreed this would be good to have but various points needed settling before a decision on who would make it, such as cost, design, its placing and what should be depicted on it. Please read the item in this issue of Village Voice.

Finance: The Internal Auditor's report: This was satisfactory and comments made by Jackie Dockerill under various sections were discussed, e.g. under Schedule of Assets it would be useful to show the last year's figures against the present year to show the differences.

Village Questionnaire: 75% of the forms had been returned and were being analysed and collated. The findings will go on a spread sheet and discussed fully at the next meeting.

RoSPA Report: Cllr. Plumb told Council that the A frame and multi-climbing frame had been condemned by RoSPA and should be removed. For the present he will check them each week to see that they are satisfactory rather than remove them as the summer holidays begin. On the 14th August Cllr. Plumb has organised a meeting to discuss the redevelopment of the playground with parents and children.

Diamond Jubilee: The Chairman thanked Cllr. Licence and all those involved with organising these celebrations which went very well.

Wratting Common Cross Roads (arising from the Parish Meeting) The Chairman is liaising with the Chairman of



West Wratting Parish Council as the cross-roads are in the West Wratting parish. The County Council is not keen to put up a "stop" sign but discussions are still ongoing.

Neighbourhood Watch: (arising from the Parish Meeting). For those who have email there will be an email available giving information concerning crime, anti-social behaviour, security etc. Cllr. Grieve is looking into finding a solution for those who do not have email.

Wildlife: Cllrs. Licence and Hall had a meeting with Laura Osborne of the Wild Life Trust and she suggested that a survey of the flora is carried out through the year on the two de-commissioned allotments to find out what grows there, to cut the grass in August/September and return to her for further advice.

Bus Service Review: It is hoped that everyone will complete the short questionnaire devised by Cambs. Future Transport to help them assess the transport needs of the village.

Report by District Cllr. Barrett:

Consultation concerning the Local Plan is at present being carried out, ending in September. There appears to be no plans for any development in smaller villages unless requested by the village itself.

Report by County Cllr. Batchelor:

- a) He is a member of the Liaison Committee for the Wind Farm and its next meeting will be in October. A representative from the village can attend. He will let Council know the date.
- b) He asks for everyone to sign up for the High Speed Broadband. The fibre optic cabling is being installed along the A1307.

Any other Business: Cllr. Morris told the Council that the West Wickham & District Local History Club has applied for a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund to do a series of archaelogical test pits around the parish and will know in October whether this has been allocated.

The draft Minutes are posted on the Noticeboard and the next meeting will be held on Monday 24 September 2012. All are welcome.

NATURE NOTES

Di and I seem to have been venturing beyond the Parish Boundaries in search of wildlife this month.

Di starts off coming down the Roman Road on her way home. "The recent warm sunshine has brought out the butterflies at last, but not in our garden. Walking home from work one afternoon, I counted 51 butterflies in the space of 20 minutes along the footpath from Wort's Causeway to the Babraham park and ride, along a sheltered path between two hedges, filled with white varrow and clover and purple field scabious and knapweeds. There were only three species, green veined white, gatekeeper and meadow brown, but this small area of warm sunshine and flowers was very popular. Another glorious spectacle was walking along Devil's Dyke at Newmarket to see the rare lizard orchids, a quite amazing plant, smelling of goat. We were enchanted by hundreds of chalkhill blues mating and chasing each other on the chalk land flora. It was mainly field scabious and harebells, but many were on the path in front of us and flew up in a cloud as we walked along. We also saw stemless and carline thistles rock rose and yellow wort, which attracted numerous beautiful 6 spot burnet moths."

I have also just returned from a section of the Devil's Dyke near the railway line and similarly experienced the clouds of chalkhill blues - virtually all of them were males - I only spotted one female, who surprisingly was not being pestered. Maybe all the mating is over for the year now. Being possibly a couple of weeks later than Di's walk, the flora had moved on a bit in that the eyebright was in flower and the wild thyme just about starting to come out. Meanwhile the rock rose, scabious and harebells were still in flower, and on this section of the Dyke there was also plenty of bloody cranesbill, which must be having a second bloom after its first flowering in May. It was a very windy morning so on the way back I dropped down onto the racing gallops in the shelter of the Dyke and was rewarded by seeing a small heath butterfly as well as witnessing a magnificent fly-past of jackdaws and rooks, coming from the Dullingham side and landing on the gallops. There must have been at least 200 of them.

One other thing I wanted to mention is what seems to have been a larger number of dragonflies and damsel flies than normal. I have noticed them flying not only near ponds, but elsewhere in the fields when I have been out for a walk. Can it be something to do with the wet summer? Has anyone else noticed this phenomenon?
