VILLAGE SIGN

Our new village sign, which was commissioned by the Parish Council to commemorate the Queen's Diamond Jubilee in 2012, was erected outside the Village Hall in October. The project was led by Parish Councillor, Di Licence and the design was drawn by Trevor Hall from ideas and suggestions submitted by village residents. The sign has been cut from 6mm mild steel by Martin Chamberlain and the oak post and brick plinth were made by Tom Licence.

The sign contains elements from each 'end' of the village – Streetly End, the Church end and Burton End – with the scroll beneath symbolising the road

linking them all together. The crown-shaped surround represents the Diamond Jubilee with the wheat sheaves on top signifying both the arable fields which surround the village today and the village's historical agricultural past.

Yes, the windmill at Streetly End did once have sails and no, it's not a Spitfire but a Lancaster! To find out more about the history behind the sign why not pop into the Village Hall and see the display on the West Wickham & District Local History Club's noticeboard.

FROM THE VICARAGE

Christmas has traditionally been the time of good will. We think of our love for other people in the light of the gift of God's love in the coming of Christ.

I watched a busy person, with many demands running a community event. This was something with no payment, not appreciable acknowledgement, but which made a positive contribution to community life. NATURE NOTES

Those of you who have been walking around looking at your feet should take note of Di's recent sightings, and look up into the sky. "For us, November has been the month of the raptor. Barn and little owls have both been seen on the new fencing at the bottom crossroads and by the church. We are frequently woken up to the sound of young tawny owls trying to perfect their calls. There seem to be large numbers of kestrels about and hardly a week goes by without seeing or hearing common buzzards. Both Ann and Jan (and Bert Watts of the Bowls Club) have had sparrow hawks in their gardens. Over the years there has been the occasional sighting of hen harriers in the parish, on their way to Africa. These have always been ringtails, either females or juveniles. So the piece de resistance this month was the sighting, on two separate occasions, of two males in less than a week. They both flew across the road just in front of the car giving us superb views of their plumage, pale grey with black wingtips and a white rump. (hen harriers have been in the news regularly in recent years because of their persecution, particularly by gamekeepers eager to preserve game birds for the gun. As a result there are only a few breeding pairs left in the country.) We recently arrived home to see a pair of red kites casually circling no more than 40 feet above the Croft." Non-predatory birds that merit a mention include the usual arrival of fieldfares and redwings, who should be pleased with this year's berry harvest, and a stonechat that I came across near Balsham Wood sitting a-top a hedge

Meanwhile, at ground level, "while it is not uncommon to see wild flowers blooming late into the autumn if the weather is mild, this year seems to have been exceptional. These are some of the plants that we have seen in flower, mainly in pristine condition. Hogweed, upright hedge parsley, meadow sweet, oxeye daisy, common daisy, varrow, prickly ox tongue, lesser knapweed, field scabious, chickory, hemlock, herb robert and recently in Norfolk, red *campion and blackthorn.*" With a refusal of some plants to die back for the winter, and some butterflies still flying, things do seem a bit strange so we should be grateful for those agents of decay, the fungi which I feel are having a good year. Unfortunately my knowledge of the fungus kingdom is extremely limited, although I have enjoyed some delicious mushrooms picked near Rands Wood, and at Weston Colville, and survived. Particular mention goes to a couple of non-edible bracket fungi that I have admired for some time - one on the path between Weston Green and Carlton, and another on a tree hanging over the river near Sturmer. Both have been spectacular, and deserved to be photographed, but I fear are past their best.

On the mammal front, the deer population seems to be increasing, judging by the number of recent sightings, although Kip, our dog, attempted to reduce it by one when encountering a muntjac in the Rosie Green Wood in Balsham, an experience I hope is not repeated. A more pleasant piece of news is that Vivienne Henderson has had a badger foraging for apples in her orchard, but she hasn't seen any climbing trees to reach them, as they showed on Autumn Watch.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

When the College acquired the rubber crumb Astro-turf I had just been appointed to the post of Principal. England and West Ham striker Trevor Brooking was invited along to open it up and various members of the school community tried to save the penalties he knocked into the new goals. That does not feel that long ago. It amazes me, therefore, that we are currently negotiating a new surface for the pitch that has almost reached the end of its natural life. We have been saving for the replacement, via an annual sinking fund, since it was purchased nine years ago and the idea is that the rest of the funding is provided by the Football Association, just as it was back in 2005. The old pitch has seen a huge amount of use: Aztecs, Cambridge United, Linton Granta and the PE Department all give it a good hammering so it has served the community very well indeed and lasted just long enough for us to have saved enough to replace it. We are incredibly lucky at LVC to have the fantastic sporting facilities that our children and our community enjoy - the gym, the sports hall with its new flooring, the dance studios, the tennis courts, the cricket nets and the generous amount of field space make us the envy of all around. Getting a brand new Astro-turf once more will be the icing on the cake.
