CHURCH YEW TREE

The whole Parish will have seen the tragic demise of the oldest living thing that we had, the churchyard yew tree. It happened in a violent gust of wind and snow on the morning of 28 January.

Initially, I thought it might be possible to radically trim the stump and re-erect it. This is what I successfully did with a yew tree in the garden at Manor Farm after the October 1987 storm. Sadly this has not been possible as the tree base was largely rotted away and had been invaded by ivy over the centuries. I know when I first got involved with the church yard with Alf Mayes in 1975, most years we tried to cut the ivy stems within the base. I think Brian Mayes eventually got to it a couple of summers ago within the trunk about eight foot off the ground. It had been smothering the tree right to the very top.

We have now cleared the site and several villagers have asked if they could have a piece of yew for woodwork pieces. Can those who would like some please contact me to arrange choice and collection. The Church plans to have something made with it for display. The Local History Club are anxious to try and establish its actual age.

NATURE NOTES

My reference to moles last month sparked off a memory for Di of "a mole encounter which the children still talk about 30 years later. It was on the way to Streetly End, just past the turning to Hill Farm where the banks on the roadside are steep. We could see a small animal, running along the edge of the road, occasionally stopping and trying to get up the bank. He was a black velvet, well-stuffed beanbag with a pair of pink, spade-like feet at the front end. I naively thought I would pick him up and put him back in the field, but he wriggled and tried to bite me as I gripped him round the waist. So I took off my shoe, pushed him into it, and crawled up the bank to release him into the ploughed field."

More recently up this end of the village we had a splendid recent sighting of a weasel in action. He had been spotted on more than one occasion over the last few weeks, but last week Brian phoned to say the weasel was in his front garden. This efficient little predator had his eye on two mice, which he quickly dispatched and took under the cover of some plants. As far as we know he didn't then take a ride on a green woodpecker, like his cousin who achieved fame in the National Press, but the resourcefulness of a weasel should not be underestimated. Certainly when Kip came face to face with one the other day, it turned to face her and she decided on a discrete withdrawal.

The trees and hedgerows are still brown, but close inspection shows signs of new life, and on the warmer days, insects have emerged. Di particularly mentions the bumblebees, who have taken a liking to the nectar-rich hyacinths in her conservatory. Two or more buzzing at once make an alarming noise, particularly in a confined space. On a very warm Sunday in the sheltered Devil's Ditch, near Dullingham, I saw my first brimstone butterfly on 8 March. It may seem appropriate to see a butterfly named for one of the ingredients of Hell in the Devil's Ditch but on that day the surroundings seemed more heavenly. I also spotted a couple of small tortoiseshells having a quick flutter on the allotments at Balsham.

There is much bird activity, with the winter visitors (fieldfares and redwings) returning north and the summer arrivals expected daily. I understand that the chiffchaffs have landed, but have not yet been heard in West Wickham. Whoever hears the first one, please let me know. Meanwhile our resident birds have already started nest building. Di has been watching "a pair of long tailed tits collecting nesting material in her garden. They have been taking wisps of moss from logs and spiders' webs from between cracks in the brickwork. They then fly to a branch and rearrange the material in their beak, before flying off to a nest site which she has yet to discover."

I was delighted the other morning to find plenty of frogspawn in our pond and shall be keeping an eye on it over the next few days. We don't want a repeat of what happened a few years ago, when there was a heavy frost after the frogspawn had arrived, freezing the pond over.



MEADOW SCHOOL NEWS

The shops are full of Easter Eggs, snowdrops, daffodils and crocuses are popping up everywhere and the evenings are getting lighter, a few signs that spring has sprung and that we have passed the halfway point of the school year. This month has definitely been one of providing a broad and balanced curriculum, with lots of opportunities for learning and participating outside the classroom.

The whole school spring term topic of Africa has not only engaged but united our children and community, with personal experiences, artefacts, photos and even a personal message to Dragonfly Class from a Zulu Warrior being shared. The topic has allowed the children to learn about a fascinating continent, and all of the amazing things it has to offer, but also for our older children they have had the opportunity to learn about the darker side of Africa, with poverty, apartheid and the lack of education for all being studied.



With Africa and education being a huge focus, it was great to support this year's comic relief day by wearing red and making our faces funny for money. The children fully embraced the day, and with the whole school gathered to show off their outfits and faces in the hall, the view was literally a sea of red! Once again, children, parents and staff had been very ingenious with the costumes and face paints. We sold £120 of red noses and raised a further £229 of

donations on the day.

We recently took 32, Y5/6 children to Linton Village College to participate in the primary cluster Tag Rugby and Quicksticks Hockey tournament. The four teams played their hearts out and showed great sportsmanship, always shaking hands and cheering their opposition. Despite the chilly conditions the children had a fantastic time and once again were great ambassadors for our school.

We were delighted earlier in the term when we were approached by 'Outspoken' the company who in the Autumn term each year deliver the Bikeability programme to our Y6 children. They asked if we would be one of 6 schools in Cambridgeshire to be part of a pilot supported by the Department for Transport and Cambridgeshire County Council, launching Bikeability across the school.

We were treated to a Bikeability fun day to launch the programme, with every child and adult in school having the opportunity to try out a range of bikes including, 4 seat bikes, recumbent bikes, Dutch bikes and of course the age old favourite, the chopper! After school, parents joined in the fun, reliving their childhood, racing around on bikes that brought back many fond memories.

One of the highlights of the day was definitely the jukebox powered by



pedal power on the static bikes. With the music flowing, the children enjoyed dancing around, whilst cheering on their friends who were having great fun whizzing around the playground, trying out all of the bikes.

The Bikeability crew are also running different sessions over a six week course. Our youngest children have been having a weekly lesson on using a balance bike. Children in Years 1-3 are having lessons on how to ride without stabilisers, with several children already successfully progressing from wobbling to riding with confidence, a fantastic sight! Our oldest children in Years 5/6 are having bike maintenance lessons, learning skills such as checking brakes and mending punctures, essential lifeskills for anyone.

The project has been very successful already in raising the number of children and families connected to The Meadow riding bikes safely around our beautiful countryside. We shared photos and videos of the day on our twitter page, @Meadow_Balsham. Have a look to see that and other news too.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

Now that my own office is housed in such a modern part of the school building it is far too easy to forget that LVC is nearly 80 years old. I was reminded of this fact last week by the arrival of a letter from the Manager of West Road Concert Hall at Cambridge University. The unexpected subject of the letter was a chamber organ, built by John



Snetzler, that once stood in our school hall on the left-hand side of the stage. Apparently the College still owns it because it was given to West Road on a permanent loan basis back in 1967. It is rather a beautiful thing, but now very fragile and because of its condition it has not been played for a decade. The organ has quite a history. It was once owned by Captain "Titus" Oates, of the "I might be some time" Antarctic exploration fame. There is a plaque to this effect on the side of the organ. It was bought

from the Oates family by friends of the Village College for Mr Edwin Swannell who was Head of Music and then Warden here between the late 1930s and mid-1960s. Now that it is so delicate the University would like us to take it back. This idea has got our imaginations racing ahead: what if we could get it restored and playable for one last concert? What if that could, in some way, be tied into our 80th birthday celebrations? I will keep you posted. Still, it has brought a whole new meaning to the phrase "organ donor" for us.

If you are contacted by someone on the phone saying they are from Microsoft and your computer has been sending out viruses over the internet, beware, it is a scam.
