BIN COLLECTION CHANGES

South Cambridgeshire District Council is changing the way used paper is collected from residents for recycling. From 11 December, residents won't need to use their caddies to recycle paper anymore. From that date, residents should place their used paper directly into their blue wheelie bins instead. This used paper will still be recycled after being sorted from other materials at our facility near Waterbeach.

The decision to withdraw the paper caddy service was taken at South Cambridgeshire District Council's Cabinet meeting in September. The decision will save taxpayers money and simplify the recycling process for residents.

Because of this forthcoming change, the District Council will not be delivering any new paper caddies. If they are lost or stolen before 11 December, residents can begin putting paper in their blue bin.

After 11 December, residents can keep their caddies and use them however they wish. Alternatively, they can be taken to a household waste recycling centre for recycling. They should not be placed into wheelie bins.

PARKING ON PAVEMENTS

The Parish Council has received complaints about people parking on the pavement, and about the state of some of our pavements in the village. The County Council Highways Dept. has repaired some of the pavements, but will not do so where people drive across it to access their property. The Law states that is an offence to DRIVE on the footway even for a few seconds (Section 34 of Road Traffic Act 1988) and that private driveways that cross a footway need a 'dropped kerb' (Section 184 of Highway Act 1980). Property owners should apply to the County Council to install a dropped kerb. The work will be carried out by the Highways Dept and the property owners will be responsible for the cost involved. We hope this clarifies the situation.

GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES APPOINTMENTS

We continue to have a very high demand for appointments but continue to offer unlimited on-the-day access for urgent problems. Our routine ability to book ahead depends on the clinician and the current wait for the next available routine appointment is 3 weeks. However for doctors with specialist areas of expertise the wait may be longer but, as a service, is far shorter than waiting for a hospital specialist. Following discussion at the patient group, we have implemented a change to our system to generate an extra 64 routine appointments a week. Unfortunately we also have to deal with some staff sickness at the moment (down 6 sessions a week). Fundamentally, we have extremely high demand levels, we never turn away on the day urgent cases and are the only surgery doing this.

FROM THE VICARAGE

In our lounge, on a bookshelf, is a Russian 'Babuschka' wooden doll of the Russian President Boris Yeltsin. We bought it as a reminder of a family camping trip we made to Russia in the 1970s. Inside Yeltsin is a nest of six more dolls, Gorbachev, Bresnev, Kruschev, Stalin and Lenin, each one smaller than the last. Finally, inside Lenin is another one. It is a tiny doll of Tsar Nicholas II, who was assassinated following the Russian Revolution of 1917. Someone in the Babuschka doll trade of Russia obviously has a sense of humour!

When we hold our Remembrance Sunday services on 12 November, will be are be reminded of all that happened a century ago. Our services will be at 10.45 am in churches at Balsham, Weston Colville and Little Abington, and at noon at the War Memorial on Wratting Common.

Next year, on Sunday 11 November we will be marking the centenary of the Armistice, the end of the First World War. I imagine there will be a series of really special and moving national events held then to remind us of the horrors which Europe endured in the time of my grandparents.

As we wear our poppies this month and hear of family tales from our parents and from our friends parents, and as we stand silently through the two minutes silence, please remember all those men who went to France and to Belgium from these Cambridgeshire villages between 1914 and 1918 to give their lives in the battlefields of the Great War.

NATURE NOTES

There was some controversy arising from last month's column. Who exactly was responsible for spitting on the blackberries, and when did they do it? Some say the Devil, others say witches. Some say 30 September, others 11 October. A possible reason for the date disagreement is whether we go by the Julian or Gregorian calendars. I know sometimes we are accused of being behind the times in West Wickham, but going back to 1752 may be a bit extreme. Mind you, it was introduced in Europe in 1582 and we took 170 years to accept it in Britain. Perhaps West Wickham had an opt-out clause.

Nature pays little regard to such details but continues to respond to the normal seasonal rhythms with adaptations where necessary owing to the fluctuations of the weather. It was 21 degrees as we drove back home recently and we spotted a bat flying near our house, stirred into activity by the warm evening air. Di has also commented on the number of red admiral butterflies that have been around this autumn, at a time of year when they are normally beginning to hibernate. She recently spotted a dozen on a small patch of ivy flowers, basking in the sunshine, either feeding or just sunbathing. The results from the summer's Big Butterfly Count show that this sighting is not surprising – red admirals have had a very successful year, increasing their numbers by 75% on last year. Ivy is a great source of nectar for many insects late in the year – bees are also very appreciative.

Another available food source are the red berries in the trees and hedgerows – particularly for the thrush family. Resident birds get first picking, and Di's mountain ash tree is being attacked by blackbirds. However, she tells me that the first small flock of redwings of the autumn have been seen in Blacklands Lane, with their distinctive eye stripe and patch of red under the wing. Di wants to know whether anyone has seen a song thrush recently. It has been quite a good year for slugs and snails (which thrushes like), but the last couple of months seem to have been thrush free in contrast with the spring and early summer.

Some species of birds tend to form flocks in autumn, sometimes mixing together, so you may well see yellowhammers and chaffinches feeding in the stubble. I had to cut down some blackthorn scrub by my hedge the other day and at the bottom was a yellowhammer's nest from earlier in the year – they tend to nest in the bottom of hedges, which seems a rather strange and vulnerable location. Two branches of the plover family tend to associate in flocks. We have often mentioned our golden plovers, who visit us for a few days in autumn and spring, but Di also reports that a large flock of lapwing were seen recently on the field at the bottom crossroads – a rare sight as these are not common in this area any more.

It's a time of year when owls become more vocal, and we have been hearing a particularly loud female tawny owl 'tutting' but without any audible response from a male 'twooing'. A barn owl has been seen flying by the Withersfield Road and there has been plenty of activity from daytime birds of prey, including the rare sighting of a merlin in the field behind Ann's house. Red kites are continuing their takeover bid – I saw five over at Weston Colville the other day and three near Yen Hall, one of which was on the ground beside a flock of lesser black-backed gulls who were feeding on the newly ploughed field.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The Parish Council met on Monday 25 September. This is a summary of what was discussed. The draft Minutes can be seen on the notice board.

Maintenance:

1. Dean Road hedging and junctions – still no action taken by Highways regarding cutting back overhanging branches. Another serious accident occurred at the crossroads.
2. Gritting Bins -2 new bins are now in place in Streetly End and at the T junction near the Church.
3. Signage – road signs etc. have been repaired and a new one in place by Maypole Croft.
4. Footpaths: Work has now been carried out on the footpath bridge behind the church.

Planning:

1. S/1803/17/F. 3 High Street, S Jordan. 4 garden sheds & a shepherd's hut. This had been approved by South Cambs DC.
2. S/2865/17/OL. Land at Burton End, M Cornish. Outline planning for 2 market houses and 2 affordable houses. The Parish Council had decided to object to this application at a special planning meeting because the land was outside the development framework. This was in line with previous decisions, although it was noted that until South Cambs' new development plan was finalised, the development framework carried little weight.
3. S/2628/17/F. 45 Streetly End, G McNeillie. Demolition and replacement with single garage. This had been approved by South Cambs DC.
4. S/2483 and S/1415/17. New dwelling, Streetly End, Anita Stone: The Parish Clerk had received from SCDC Planning Dept a "Discharge of Conditions". Cllr. Cornish said he would check with Ms Stone if she was happy with the outcome.

Finance

1. Authorised payments: These are shown in the draft Minutes posted on the Noticeboard.
2. The annual audit was passed as satisfactory and details have been posted on the website.

Speed Indicator: All the participants have agreed to purchase the Swarco equipment. The size of sign and where they will be sited has still to be decided by each

village. Cost per village will be £1052.59. Cllr. Hall was thanked for the work he has put into this project.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr. Hall reported that a Character Assessment dividing the village into 4 sections, Streetly End, High Street (Church to Village Hall) & High Street (Village Hall to Burton End) and Burton End is near completion. Each section was assessed for its main characteristics in order provide guidance for any future development. The next phase will be looking at policies regarding transport, roads, schools etc.

Playground report: Playground repairs have been carried out and CGM have been asked to trim round the play area when next cutting the grass.

Report by County Cllr Batchelor: The full report is available on the website.

1. Library services – a further consultation is being carried out and the Mobile library service is being looked at with regard to need and the best time to visit villages.
2. HOOPS – Housing Options for Older People – a 6 month project offering advice and support for older people with a questionnaire being sent out to people over 65.
3. Children's Centres- Linton's Children Centre closed on 22 September.

Report by Dist.Cllr. Turner: The full report available on the website.

1. Review of recycling – the caddies for paper in the blue bins may be done away with as the cost of replacing broken or stolen blue caddies costs £20,000 a year.
2. The Community Chest has been increased to £85,000.
3. The Local Plan is still under consultation.

Any Other Business: Cllr. Licence had received complaints about cars parking on the pavements. There are several houses waiting for drop kerbs to be installed and the delay in the work being done was raised by Cllr. Schuilenburg at a combined Parishes meeting but it appeared that unless the resident was prepared to help with the cost there was no hurry to carry out the work.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 27 November at 7.30pm. All are welcome.

FIREWORK SAFETY

Fireworks and bonfire night can be plenty of fun for all of the family to enjoy and going to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home can be a great way of supporting your local community. If you plan on using fireworks or lighting a bonfire at your own home however, please ensure you consider our safety advice below:

Fireworks:

- Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper, stand well back and never go back to a lit firework
- Never throw fireworks or put them in your pockets or clothing
- Light sparklers one at a time wearing gloves, and place used sparklers in a bucket of water
- Never give sparklers to children under five
- It is illegal to sell fireworks to someone under the age of 18 or to light fireworks in a public place
- Always consider animals and wildlife nearby when holding a firework display
- Always consider the location of a bonfire or firework display, smoke drifting near or on to surrounding roads can have devastating consequences.
- Always advise your neighbours if you are having a firework display.

Bonfires:

- Do not light bonfires in unsuitable weather conditions, particularly when windy. Be conscious of the wind direction, especially if there are thatched roofs nearby. This also applies to fireworks such as rockets.
- Do not leave bonfires unattended
- Keep a bucket of water or a hosepipe handy just in case
- Build bonfires well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and hedges
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire
- Never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres, batteries, etc
- Before you light the bonfire, check that children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe distance away.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

Education news has been awash with challenges faced by schools. There have been a number of high profile campaigns, including www.schoolsjustwannahavefunds.org to address endemic funding issues that are affecting our ability to deliver the excellent education that all children deserve.

After months of consultation, the National Funding Formula was published in September. Despite a commitment to tackle inherent inequalities that saw schools in Cambridgeshire being grossly underfunded on the basis of historic formulae, the indicative figures demonstrate little real improvement.

Linton Village College stands to gain a nominal amount over the coming years. Unfortunately much of this is wiped out by real-term cost increases. Meanwhile caps to protect the funding of better-off counties maintain existing inequities. If we were positioned over the Essex border we would see around £105,000 more in our annual budget; if we were in Greater Manchester we'd be over a million pounds better off; in Hackney we would receive an extra £2.5 million.

Making the books balance is becoming increasingly more difficult. We are keen to maintain a holistic and enriching learning experience at LVC, avoiding a narrowing of the curriculum that other schools in the area have resorted to or having to cut back on much-needed pastoral and learning support, especially as access to other services are under significant pressure.

We are really grateful to the school community for supporting us with fundraising. The Chestnut Tree at West Wrattling raised over £1,300 from donations from their beer festival at the start of term which has been committed to improving IT resources. We are awaiting a final total of the monies raised from our annual sponsored walk which will help to update school facilities.

The Friends of LVC have recruited a new Chair and Secretary to the committee and we are thrilled that this important source of support will continue. Anyone wishing to volunteer can contact friends@lvc.org.
