END OF YEAR UPDATE FROM LUCY FRAZER MP

I wanted to take the opportunity to wish all my constituents a very merry Christmas and a happy new year to come. 2017 has flown by with so much to do and an unexpected election on top! I have been pursuing with vigour the roll out of superfast broadband across the constituency, regularly meeting and speaking with all involved and pressing for more, quicker! I am extremely grateful for the support of local residents and, in particular, the broadband champions in our constituency and it was in recognition of this support and the progress we are making that Digital Minister, Matt Hancock MP, came to West Wickham in April to speak to local residents and officially open the West Wickham broadband cabinet. I am also pursuing a campaign to get South East Cambridgeshire selected as a testbed for the trialling of the next generation of digital infrastructure through industrial 5G pilots.

As most of you will know by now, education is a passion of mine and I am relentless in my efforts to pursue fairer funding for our schools. I take every opportunity to engage with both schools and the Secretary of State for Education to ensure our requirements are front of mind. I welcome the recent announcement of £3.1 million more for our constituency and I will continue on this mission to pursue funding wherever it is available.

Other projects I am involved with around education include encouraging businesses to work hand in hand with schools with specific reference to STEM subjects and building pathways to future careers in local businesses. I am also driving a project to reduce the costs of teacher recruitment through an online government website.

Infrastructure projects occupy a lot of my time, fighting for necessary funding and maintaining a presence where projects are underway to ensure where possible they remain on schedule and on budget. The start of works on the Ely Southern Bypass in March was the culmination of a great deal of work and lobbying by a great many people including myself and I'm delighted work is now underway. I am very much behind the Greenways initiative to introduce more cycle and multi-purpose routes into Cambridge.

I enjoy every opportunity I have to meet with constituents from all walks of life, whether welcoming groups and individuals to Westminster, attending a Rotary club meeting, joining a Women's Institute gathering, opening a summer fete, chatting at an Open meeting, or meeting constituents in my surgeries - I never like to pass up the chance to exchange views and hear any issues constituents may have.

All across the constituency, over recent weeks, our senior school pupils have been busy debating. This year marks the 4th inter schools debating competition since I became a Parliamentary Candidate and first initiated the idea. The final sees 14 students debating in the House of Commons. I am so grateful for all the support I receive from constituents young and old and I look forward to working as hard as I can on your behalf in the coming year.

NATURE NOTES

Birds of a feather flock together - particularly as the weather gets colder, seeking company, security, food availability and warmth. Di reports that her neighbour's feeder is a magnet for a flock of chaffinches and goldfinches that visit each morning. Goldfinches are known collectively as a charm – lovely brown birds with a red face and gold edges to their wings; when disturbed they fly to a high perch with a delightful twitter. I was told that they are known in the south west by the unflattering name of 'monkey-faces'. Whatever we call them it must be good news that we are now five times more likely to see them in our gardens than in the 1990s. The flocking phenomenon is also apparent in the fields with yellowhammers, chaffinches and a few greenfinches (although the last of these have sadly declined) flying from field to hedge. Occasionally skylarks will be disturbed from their foraging on the plough and fly into the sky with their chirruping song, giving us a slightly less upbeat version of their spring exultation.

At Halloween I heard a cackling sound overhead, and briefly thought it might be a coven of witches flying over on their broomsticks, but was relieved to see fieldfares, which have now arrived from northern Europe along with more blackbirds and redwings. They will be stripping our hedgerows of their berries and getting stuck in to the decaying fallen apples that we have disdained. Corvids seem even more plentiful in the fields this year. Alongside Yen Hall a large quantity of rooks have been occupying one of the fields regularly and there are plenty of jackdaws, magpies and jays about. Di describes seeing these large gatherings as a 'Hitchcock moment'. If they knew I'm sure many of these intelligent birds would be taking legal action against the master of suspense for sullying their reputation.

Possibly of a more threatening disposition are birds of prey – thrilling but chilling. Connie has had several sightings of a sparrowhawk in her garden, on one occasion capturing a wood pigeon under her apple tree and taking it behind the shed to pluck and eat it, leaving a pile of feathers behind. I had a different experience as a female flew down from the fence in pursuit of a dunnock hiding in a small shrub. The chase turned into a foot race around the shrub until the hawk jumped up to the top of it and the dunnock took its chance to fly away to denser cover.

On the mammal front, Janet told me that she had seen a good-sized hedgehog walking up their path. It's great to hear of hedgehog sightings as we know how much they have been struggling. This is another reason to keep your speed down when driving through the village. Meanwhile I've seen two foxes – one hurrying into Leys Wood beside Hill Farm at dusk, and another strolling into Horseheath Lodge at noon. We are coming up to the time of year when foxes mate, so if you hear any blood-curdling noises, this may be vulpine love-making.

As Christmas is coming, we must mention the robin. Connie's cheese-lover has brought along a friend to share the spoils, while Mick mentioned to me that he was sure the robin that frequents his garden would soon be tempted onto his hand.

It's been a glorious autumn but as the leaves fall, there are still some spectacular colours, particularly the beeches. If you catch them on a sunny day, the leaves look gold.

At our meeting on November 20 we were delighted to welcome Dr. Ian Bedford who is Head of the Research Entomology Facility at the John Innes Centre in Norwich. His talk entitled "Garden Bugs, cohabit, conserve or control" was received with great enthusiasm by a large audience. Ian was a mine of information and his powerpoint presentation included a comprehensive roundup of all those bugs, good, bad and ugly that one has to deal with in the garden. The pictures of his lawn covered one dewy morning with 350 large, brown, Spanish slugs was amazing; the only way of getting rid of them is to gather them all up and drown them in a bucket of soapy water. Ian's message to us was that it is our decision whether or not to use pesticides and he did not try to persuade us one way or another - but he did ask us to really think about the environmental effect of neonicotinoid pesticide sprays on bees.

Our meeting on Monday 18 December will be an informal get together with wine and nibbles and a raffle for Beeches Nursery garden tokens. You are all welcome to join us, 7:30 in the Village Hall.
