FROM THE VICARAGE

It is interesting that when we are exploring an issue we become attuned to hearing others talk about it. I have been thinking about the importance of listening. I came across an old favourite poem by Michel Quoist called 'The telephone'

I have just hung up: why did he telephone?

I don't know...Oh! I get it...

I talked a lot and listened very little.'

The writer of James suggests, we 'should be quick to listen and slow to speak.' (James 1:19) and the book of proverbs regards acting without listening as foolish, 'He who answers before listening--that is his folly and his shame' (Proverbs 18:13). Jesus talked about the need to listen to God and to the cry of a neighbour. When delivering his parables he wanted people to make a conscious choice to listen and explore the meaning, 'if you have ears then hear.'

In a recent Thought for the day on Radio 4, Professor Mona Siddiqui said, 'What makes a good leader? A sense of vision, integrity, purpose or perhaps it's something even more fundamental than that – the ability and will to understand the mood and wishes of those around you, to listen as well as be heard.'

In the recent Diocesan synod, we listened to people talking about how to accommodate those who oppose Women Bishops, so that they can be served by a Male Bishop. The current legislation includes a Code of Practice which is not yet complete, but which is intended to protect their requirements. Producing this code requires both listening by those drawing up the Code and trust on behalf of those who require it. Listening may help us to see different ways of meeting the needs of those who cannot work with women leaders, whilst also listening to the mandate that the General Synod has already given that it believes that women are called to be Bishops and will serve God and benefit the Church of England by taking on this Episcopal ministry.

We are trying to listen to the views of others in all of the Churches. In West Wickham we are wanting to hear if there are people willing to offer to display their art or craft for an exhibition during the féte on 3rd September. There are plans for reordering to be found in Holy Trinity, Balsham, Hildersham and Weston Colville for anyone to look at and add their views, or draw ideas from.

One of the benefits of being a larger group of churches means that we can put on joint ventures. There is a great opportunity to listen to something different and inspiring on the 31st July when the play, *Cell Talk* is performed at 7.30pm at Holy Trinity, Balsham. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A report on the meeting held on 9 May, chaired by Andrew Morris.

Following the Parish Council election on 5th May four new councillors joined Marcus Cornish, Andrew Morris and Peter Grieve. They are Patrick Charlton, Trevor Hall, Di Licence and Justin Plumb. The new council signed their Declarations of Acceptance and received the Register of Interest forms to be signed.

Election of Chairman: Marcus Cornish.

Election of Vice Chairman: Andrew Morris

Appointment of two councillors to represent the Parish Council on the VHMC: Cllr. Cornish was happy to continue as a representative. Cllr. Charlton was elected to be the second representative.

Streetly End Speed Reduction: A letter was received from Brian Stinton apologising for the delay and confirming that the order will be advertised in the latter part of May and the work done in September.

Youth Club Funding: No youngsters from West Wickham attend Balsham Youth Club so Council did not feel under an obligation to help with funding, however further enquiries into Castle Camps Youth Club are being made.

Withersfield Football Club: They will no longer be using the recreation ground as they have joined up with another football club.

Allotments: The vacant allotment has been re-let. The Tree Warden group are looking into the viability of using part of the 2 empty plots for a Community Orchard, growing traditional varieties of fruits and managed by the Tree Warden group and volunteers.

Blue bin rubbish: The Parish Clerk had spoken to SCDC about their contractors dropping rubbish and it would be looked into it. The suggestion was made not to fill the bins to the brim.

Children's Play area: Cllr. Plumb said he would take on the planned refurbishment project.

Finances:

a) End of year accounts had been distributed to the council. The accounts ledger and sheets were signed by the Vice Chairman and the Parish Clerk, following approval by the council.

b) Annual Governance & Annual Statement: These were

read out by the Vice Chairman and following approval by the council signed by himself and the Parish Clerk.

c) Allocated reserves: £3500 for speed reduction costs at Streetly End, £845 Clerk's retirement gratuity leaving unallocated reserves of £3153.87. These were agreed by the Council.

d) Risk Management had been updated, approved and signed.

Planning:

a) S106 money from local developments: The Parish Clerk was asked to enquiry how these monies can be obtained as there were to be two new developments in the village.

b) Planning Application meetings: It was agreed that Planning Application meetings would be held now there are seven councillors. The Parish Clerk will book the Village Hall and notify council when an application is received and put up a notice for the public.

Village Clear Up: Cllr. Grieve was thanked for organising this. Approximately 19 bags were filled.

Village Hall Car Park: This has now been re-surfaced at a cost of £6000 organised by Cllr. Cornish and paid for by the Village Hall Management Committee.

Report by County Cllr. Batchelor:

a) Some of West Wickham's pavements will be repaired this year between July and December.

b) The A1307 will be resurfaced from the dual carriageway to Horseheath crossroads.

Any other business:

a) Malcolm Cameron was thanked for putting up a proper noticeboard in Street End.

b) The Bottle bank has been removed. There is a new Clothes bank and the old one has yet to be removed.

My thanks go to our Treasurer, Andrew Morris, who manages the finances extremely efficiently and has a very good understanding of the legal requirements of managing funds of a public body, even though our annual turnover is relatively modest; this represents a serious input of unpaid time. At the Annual Parish meeting held on Monday 23rd May 2011 the following matters were discussed amongst 14 parishioners including the Parish Council.

Minutes of the Parish Meeting held on 18th May 2010 were signed as correct.

Chairman's Report: Six meetings have been held by the Parish Council during the year. Two Parish Councillors have stepped down from their duties and my thanks go to them for all the time they have given over the year.

We have had a recent election at which nine candidates stood for seven positions as Parish Councillors. This is an increase of two from five. Thank you to all those who stood and congratulations to those who were successful. We have increased the numbers on the council due to the apparently increasing workload in terms of things that we need representatives to attend. I think it took two meetings at Cambourne just to increase the numbers on the council!

It is refreshing that we have had an election and this should

He has been doing this for many years and I know would like to retire from the job sooner rather than later.

Our meetings during the year usually have very few parishioners in attendance. I take this as a measure of your satisfaction with the way the Parish Council has worked during the year.

My thanks go also to the District and County Councillors who attend our meetings and take further our questions to them.

I will conclude this report with a question to the Parish. What can we do to help parishioners?

Annual Reports were presented and discussed from the County and District Councillors, the Village Hall Committee and Clubs & Societies. These are printed separately, along with any comments made at the meeting.

Finances: The accounts had been accepted and signed at the Annual Parish Council meeting on 16th May. Cllr. Morris explained the reserve was higher than normal because the cost to the parish for the Streetly End speed limit work was likely to be £3500 not £6000 which we had originally been told we would need. County Cllr. Batchelor informed the meeting that the Highways Dept. would be doing maintenance work on the pavements in the village from Maypole Croft down to the Church. Nick Salter asked if funding could found for refurbishment work on the children's playground and Dist. Cllr. Barrett said there were two funds applicable: a) Openspace Fund and b) Community Funding.

Any Other Business:

- a) The question was asked how to promote the Parish Meeting? It was suggested more notices should go up in the village, and also an item go into the Village Voice asking parishioners for questions.
- b) Cllr. Grieve wondered what was happening with the public house, as it does not appear to be used as an antique showroom. Should the Parish Council be looking again at the situation? It was suggested the Council write to the Enforcement Officer to find out how things stand at present.

COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S ANNUAL REPORT 2011

The year at the County has been all about budget cuts and project management difficulties.

With the funding squeeze being applied by the Government the County has had to make difficult decisions about how their budget would be affected. They have chosen to reduce their budget by £165 million over five years, equating to about 35% of the current disposable budget. The cuts will start biting in the coming year with 450 staff posts going. The headline issues are chopping all subsidies buses, reducing roads maintenance further and putting local libraries under threat. But the big change will be in the way services are to be delivered. With such large cuts this means that the County will move away from delivering its own service to being a commissioner of services from others. The cuts are larger than they could be as the administration is basing its forecasts on the assumption that there is no increase in council tax for the next five years. Given the choice of losing valued services or paying a little more tax I wonder what decision the tax payers would make?

The other big issue of the last few years is the Guided Bus. It should have been up and running way back in the early part of 2009, but it is only in the last couple of weeks that the bus way has been handed over to the County by the builder. The last bits of work are being done now and, hopefully, the route should be open soon. But that is not the end of the story. The project is running about £80 million over budget, the builder is refusing to accept responsibility so it seem inevitable that more money will have to be spent pursuing the matter through the court. We have not heard the last of this one.

This week sees a new leader and a new cabinet taking over the administration at the County Council. The new leader is Nick Clark, the County Councillor for Fulbourn. This should be an opportunity to review some of the cuts and look at different policy options. I hope he does just that, but I doubt that it will happen.

ANNUAL REPORT FROM DISTRICT COUNCILLOR RICHARD BARRETT

Finance. This has been another difficult year agreeing the budget with no council tax increase and a poor financial settlement from Government. As far as possible vacant posts have not been filled, but this is leaving us with a much leaner staff with ever more responsibilities to contend with. To help with this we have taken one million pound from our reserves.

Housing. Due to the down turn in the housing market, social housing has been affected as it relies on, in most cases, the 106 agreement to provide 40% on this. Consequently our waiting lists are increasing.

At the moment the Government demands about 53% of our rental income, around ten to eleven million pounds. This cuts in half the amount we can spend on maintenance, upgrading and response repairs to our 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ thousand properties.

Planning. Over the last six months a task and finish group has been set up to look into planning in general. This has involved the IT systems, listed buildings, conservation, trees and general planning. Parish councils, general applicants and developers have been involved in these meetings.

Communication. Special sessions are arranged for Parish councillors to meet with Planning Officers and Cabinet at Cambourne. Cabinet members are also happy to attend Parish council meetings.

Mobile Warden Scheme. Funding for this has been agreed by the District Council up until the end of this financial year. I understand the County Council are reviewing this in October of this year. I am awaiting further information on this.

WEST WICKHAM VILLAGE HALL REPORT FOR 2010/2011

Usage. The Hall has been well used again this year by the Daisy Chains Pre-school, local clubs, for sports hire and parties. Thanks to our Bookings Secretary, Kathy Pelling, for her considerable efforts booking and providing access for all these activities.

The pre-school is going well with 17 children attending at the end of 2010 and an advertising plan has been agreed for 2011. The discretionary reduction for the autumn term will be reviewed later in the year once the numbers are known. The KenYuKan club have continued their sessions and now provide the second largest income after the pre-school. The Carpet Bowls, History and Gardening Clubs continue solidly.

The Withersfield Youth U14s have indicated that they will be playing at a different venue next season and we wish them well with their matches.

Committee. John Pelling retired as Chairman and stepped down from the Committee at the 2010 AGM. We are extremely grateful to John for his commitment, energy and effective management of the Hall over the years. Thanks to his efforts, and those of the Committee, the Hall is passed on in good repair and with a positive balance sheet.

Maintenance. Various items of maintenance have been conducted this year, including repainting of the exterior doors. Thanks to John Pelling and sons for taking on this labour intensive task, asking only for cost of materials. Richard Grenville was appointed to fix the gutter downpipes and a number of smaller jobs and will now address ongoing maintenance at an agreed hourly rate. Nadine Warner, our caretaker, continues to keep the hall in fantastic condition.

Finances. With the price of electricity alone rising 43% since 2008 (source Times), the Village Hall rates have gone up for the first time in five years, and the new rates were published in the Village Voice in May. The Hall is breaking even today, but without much surplus to cover replacement of equipment or large maintenance items. Maintenance costs are expected to increase sharply as the building is no longer 'new'.

Despite the current financial situation, the Committee decided to make a considerable investment in having the car park resurfaced, as this was the one area letting the facility down. The work has now been completed; many thanks to Marcus Cornish for finding a very competitive quote and for organising the work over the Easter holiday.

Fundraising will be required to bolster funds in future, so please let the Committee know if you have ideas, or time and energy for fundraising, and please be ready to support your Village Hall when the time comes.

Website. A new website is up and running at www. westwickham.org. Thanks to Helen and Alex Schuilenburg for putting this in place. Initially it is being populated with basics such as booking information and rates, but over time we hope to extend the content to include information about the various clubs/users of the hall, and any other relevant community content.

The AGM for the Village Hall is expected to be in October. The date will be announced nearer the time in the Village Voice and posted on the website.

Comments were made following the report about the misuse of the electricity supply with heating being left on with the thermostat turned up. Mr Schuilenburg said he had a solution to this problem, using a programmer if it was compatible with the system, which would turn off the central heating after a period time.

It was suggested that the new website being set up could be enlarged with a broader base with the Parish Council information going on it as well as information from the various societies and clubs. It was agreed to discuss this with the Parish Council and local clubs.

WEST WICKHAM CARPET BOWLS CLUB

The Club has 24 members from West Wickham and the surrounding area. Numbers at our weekly meetings have been a little down in the last six months with several members 'out of action' for a while. Nevertheless, we have still managed to play our usual number of friendly matches, both home and away, against other clubs in the area. We have had mixed success in these but it is the enjoyment of meeting people from other villages that really counts rather than results.

As well as our weekly meetings we run 2 club tournaments in the year. The singles tournament was again won by John Short and the doubles, for the Founders Cup, was won by Brian Ellam & Jane Ruse. Several members have also taken part in tournaments organised by neighbouring clubs, usually in aid of charity. Here we have had some success this year with Sheila Hayward & Peter Pearson recently winning the Ashdon Open Pairs Competition while a team from West Wickham won the Withersfield Club quiz for the third year in succession – so now we have two shields to show off!

Carpet bowls is a fun game suited to all ages and abilities – why not come along and give it a go (it's a great social evening too).

WEST WICKHAM & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB June 2010 – May 2011

The Club has had another successful year with membership remaining around the mid forties and the monthly meetings have mostly been well attended. The programme of talks has been interesting and varied and has included, Fascinating Fungi, Trees of the Botanic Garden by Prof. John Parker, Rare and unusual perennials by Tim Fuller of the Plantsman's Preference Nursery, The A-Z of Roses by Simon White of Peter Beales Roses, Herbs and their culinary uses, which also turned into a fun tasting session and the history of the cucumber in the 18th century, in which members were amazed at the popularity of this salad vegetable, a very different type from the one found in our supermarkets today. The Plant sale last May raised over £500 and attracted a large number of people from the local area. In June members and friends were able to enjoy a coach trip to The Swiss Garden near Biggleswade and Coton Manor in Northamptonshire. These were very different gardens, as the Swiss Garden was conceived in the 1820s as a pleasure ground and Coton Manor, a private garden still undergoing development, is divided into different areas each with its own mood and theme. They provided a very interesting day out with their contrasting

styles and planting. Members also had an evening visit in June to Pauger's Plants at Debden on the A143 where they were shown round the owner's private garden before buying plants in the nursery. The Annual Show in August despite the difficult weather attracted some quality entries but the number of entries was down on previous years, particularly in the children's classes. Membership subscription was increased last year to £6 and the money from this together with the profit from the Plant Sale means that the Club has a healthy credit balance. This is necessary with the increasing cost of speakers and in particular their travel expenses.

WEST WICKHAM & DISTRICT LOCAL HISTORY CLUB

The Club remains small in numbers (about 15) but has had a full programme of talks during the year on a range of subjects including Cambridgeshire churches since the Reformation, heraldry and religion in 19th century West Wickham. We also had an evening looking at old films of the area and there was an evening visit during the summer to Bartlow church and the Bartlow Hills. The small membership does make it difficult when it comes to booking speakers and we are lucky in being able to call on some 'home-grown' ones and friends but we could desperately do with some more support. We will again be organising a programme for the coming year and all are welcome to come along to any or all meetings.

Research into the history of the village continues and there are still many enquiries from people investigating their own family links to the village from near and far. These often give insights that would be hard to discover otherwise and have resulted in some additions to our photographic collection. Another major addition this year has been a collection of school group photographs, mostly dating from the 1920s and 30s. We are very grateful to Peter Pearson and Pam Jolly who 'rescued' these for us. The originals have all now been scanned and we are in the process of trying to name some of the children. Another ongoing project is the identification of the men who died in the First World War and are listed on the war memorial in the churchyard. Unlike in other villages, there is no Roll of Honour but we now have some details for all bar one. The next step is to go through the local newspapers for the period (a rather daunting task) to see what further information they might contain (notices of death, photographs etc).

In April, the Club had a display board about the school at the annual conference of the Cambridgeshire Association for Local History, whose subject was 'Educating the Poor'. The Club is affiliated to both the Cambridgeshire Association for Local History and Cambridge Antiquarian Society so our members are able to attend their meetings and conferences. Personally, I am a member of the Council of CAS and represent them on both the Committee of CALH and the County Advisory Group on Archives & Local Studies. This provides lots of useful contacts and sources of information and ensures that there cannot be many in the local history community at least who aren't aware of the existence of our village!

CAN YOU SPARE 15 MINUTES....

....to count butterflies in your garden or in the wider countryside? The charity Butterfly Conservation is again asking people to simply count butterflies for 15 minutes during bright (preferably sunny) weather anytime from 16 to 31 July (an ideal project for the school summer holidays). Butterflies react quickly to change in their environment which makes them excellent biodiversity indicators and the count will also identify trends in species that will help plan how to protect butterflies from extinction as well as understand the effect of climate change on wildlife.

If you are counting from a fixed position like your garden then all you have to do is to count the maximum number of each species you can see at a single time. If you are on a walk you just need to total up the number of butterfly species that you see during the 15 minutes. You can submit separate records for different dates and different places – your count is still important even if you see nothing at all. You can only submit results online - the website will be open to receive results throughout July and August

HELP SHAPE THE FUTURE OF POLICING IN CAMBRIDGESHIRE

The 'Have your say' section on the force website

(www.cambs.police.uk/newpolicingapproach/haveyoursay/) will feature weekly projects being considered for a more efficient and effective policing model. The force faces a number of challenges over the next few years as we work to balance the books and ensure we make the best use of resources. Work is already underway to review the existing force structure to create a new policing model that provides the best possible service to the public. Our focus remains on frontline duties and a commitment to bringing offenders to justice and keeping people safe. Now you can get involved in helping us achieve this by having your say about the changes being made to the force.

We are very interested in your opinions and will be taking the responses into account as we redesign the force's structure. Each week a topic under review will be posted on the force website for people to comment on or post questions. All comments, questions and answers will be viewable and the forum will be live for at least the next three months. The first topic will be the review of all nonfrontline duties carried out by police officers. This includes managerial, analytical, training and call handling. Over the life of the restructure we will look at each of the officers in these posts and consider which should be returned to the frontline and in what timeframe.

NATURE NOTES

We all need reassurance from time to time, and the cycles of nature do provide it. You know something must be right when the sights and sounds you expect to see and hear each year come up with the goods at the right time. But together with reassurance there is also an element of anxiety, and it wasn't until nearly the end of May that Carol Hall let me know that she had heard a cuckoo in the field behind her (phew!), while turtle doves seem to have deserted us at this end of the village, and there is a distinct shortage of house martins.

Before I got too worried, however, Di wrote to remind me about the abundance of wild flowers this year, including "spikes of broom rape, greater knapweed, and field scabious already out around the parish." I would also like to give a mention to the oxeye daisies, which seem to have been even more prolific than last year – especially along the footpaths near Skipper's Hall. Di also also talks about the bee orchids, "stunning little flowers, pink with a large brown and yellow body exactly mimicking a bee, hence its name". There have been a number of reports of bee orchids, including from Shirley, Sheila and Steve. If I were a bee I would find these plants a bit off putting. Why land on it when it looks as though there is a bee there already? However the thought processes of the bee presumably don't go along those lines. Incidentally the field scabious that Di mentions is clearly a destination of choice for bees. There seemed to be one on every flowerhead as I was out with the dog the other evening.

Bees and other insects are benefiting from the flowers, as Di comments "The dog roses are everywhere in the hedgerows, and the cow parsley has been replaced with the huge creamy white heads of the hogweed on our verges. The roses and honeysuckle in my garden give out a heady scent in the evenings and attract a lot of insects, one of my favourites being the beautiful humming bird hawk moths. We have had many honeybees, bumble bees and ladybirds."

Most of the trees are now displaying, as Di says, a uniform summer green apart from the horse chestnut trees, some of whose leaves are "already changing to yellowy brown on the horse chestnut trees, caused by the moth that attacks them."

Di's final comment is that she was "lucky enough to have two of our nest boxes occupied by blue tits this year, and Jan had a great tit nesting in her ivy. The garden trees are now full of squeaks and twitterings which are the fluffy replicas of the parent birds constantly demanding food. Unfortunately their constant noise attracts the magpies, also nesting nearby." I wonder how many people have had birds nesting in their garden this year. If you have had a brood, let me know and we can make a judgement on whether it's been a baby bird booming year in West Wickham.

Footnote: In addition to the arboreal snails, I have recently discovered a literary chiffchaff. It flew into our library at school through the open door one hot day. It seemed to know how to behave because it didn't make a noise, but was eventually rescued from the fiction section and returned to the trees outside.

FARMERS MARKET RECIPE OF THE MONTH

On our College Improvement Plan, we make a pledge to our young people that they should all have opportunities, whilst at LVC, to do the following: visit the theatre, go to a concert, sing, dance, play a musical instrument, try out a sport we do not teach in school, attend a national sporting event, meet a writer, travel abroad, visit an art gallery, set up camp and sleep in a tent, talk to someone who speaks another language in their language, have a conversation with an old age pensioner, do some community service and give a talk in public.

Our enrichment week, this year held in the first week of June, provides all of our students with a chance to tick off many of the opportunities on this list all in one go and I think this year was our most varied programme ever:
