#### **CHURCH NEWS**

I am delighted to announce that we have appointed the Rev. Dr. Julie Norris to be the half-time priest-in-charge of the Balsham Benefice. The appointment team (2 representatives from each of the 4 parishes) met Julie a few weeks ago. We found her to be a perfect match for all the qualities we wanted. She is married with young children and keenly interested in joining us and doing parish work.

Julie will continue to live in Abington and working as a half-time team Vicar elect in the Linton Benefice. It is likely that she will only take one service per month in each of our 4 parishes but she is very keen to develop links with the Meadow School. She already works in Linton Village College.

If you are wondering why we will only have a half-time priest, the reason is partly that there are few clergy who wish to work in rural parishes but more importantly we just don't have the financial strength to support a full-time priest. We need £86 per week just to pay our share of a priestly salary and pension and then we need more to cover our other costs – heating, insurance, repairs etc. We are lucky to be allowed a half-timer! We will soon be looking for a "house-for-duty" priest to work with Julie and share the joys of our benefice.

#### THE PLIGHT OF THE MASONRY BEE

Readers will be pleased to hear that all is not lost. There are several other settlements of anthophura plumpies that I know of. The church is home to a great number of them as is the weak lime mix in a lot of the older buildings in the parish. Old flint walls also are full of them.

The location of the rubble from the building has been made known to a few people who wanted to encourage the bees into their gardens.

The planning department were asked if any permissions were required to take down this building. The reply was that any unlisted structure of less than 115cu m does not need permission for removal in a conservation area.

I did consult a local beekeeper about what I could do in summer 09 when they were causing a nuisance to residents in the immediate locality. His response was that they are very difficult to move. It also seemed kinder to demolish whilst the bees were hibernating. It was only a matter of time before the building would fall into the road as a direct result of the bees' lifestyle over the last x years.

I have had several complaints about visibility at the junction, the only cure was to remove the garage.

I would also like to report that we have a thief in our midst who also is a trespasser!

I have had 20 rabbit traps stolen and someone has taken it upon themselves to release the trapped rabbits. The trapped rabbits are humanely dispatched every 24 hours and sold. They are very good to eat and used to form a very valuable source of meat for country folk.

We do currently have a serious rabbit problem as myxomatosis no longer seems to have the virulence that it once did. Readers will have noticed the severe grazing of the wheat field nearest the church for example. This will have reduced the potential yield from that 6 acre field by at least 6 tons or 8000 loaves of bread!

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the meeting held on Tuesday 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2010 the following items were discussed:-

**Speed limit at Streetly End:** Following a request by a Streetly End resident the police visited the village to see the pace of traffic going through the village particularly with regard to children crossing the road to wait for their school bus. The police agreed there was a problem and will be writing a report to the County Council recommending a speed change.

*Car Park resurfacing:* The work is to be carried out once the weather improves. However Council needs to be consulted over any alterations. Meanwhile it was suggested that road planings could be used to fill the holes as a temporary measure, this is being looked into.

*Recycling Clothes bank:* The Parish Clerk was asked to chase this up and you will now see that you have the bank in position.

*Speed watch*: An additional four parishioners will have their speed watch training in April and a rota will be organised for monitoring.

*Road Maintenance:* Following consultation with Highways Dept. they are unable to change the work already listed as it is part of a Capital bid and work will be carried out between the Church and 25/26 High Street and not in Streetly End where it is most needed.

*Litter Picking day:* Cllr. Grieve said this had been a success and thanked all those involved.

**Children's Play Area:** The work is now completed and there are two new swings and two new springy items. A recycled rubber mixture called Ecoscape has been ordered to replace the bark floor covering. This is very low maintenance. When it arrives there will be a "rally to arms" to lay the mulch on the necessary areas.

*Finance*: It was agreed that M Gutteridge should be asked to carry out the internal audit again this year.

**Tree Warden Scheme:** Cllr. Morris and Carol & Trevor Hall had attended a meeting where the status of trees and the need for a complete review of any trees with preservation orders on them was discussed. There are at least three trees in the parish which might benefit from such an order, two Yews in West Wickham and a large old Elm in Streetly End. It was agreed that a full survey of the parish's trees would be valuable.

#### Reports by Dist. Cllrs Squiers/Barrett:

- Cllr. Barrett said that there was grant money available to help with the cost of refurbishing play equipment. Cllr Morris said this cost had been budgeted for but if new equipment was needed then an application would be made.
- 2) Members of the Cabinet would be pleased to come to a Parish Council meeting if required.

*Any Other Business:* A request was made for a Dog Waste bin for Streetly End. The Parish Clerk will look into cost etc.

The next meeting, which will begin with the Annual Parish Meeting followed by the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council, will be held on TUESDAY 25<sup>TH</sup> MAY 2010 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall. All welcome.

#### LINTON NEIGHBOURHOOD POLICING PANEL MEETINGS

What are they? Public meetings where you have the chance to have your say about issues that affect you. This could include safety issues such as crime, anti-social behaviour, road safety and traffic management, as well as other matters that affect the quality of life in your neighbourhood.

At the last meeting held in Linton on 23<sup>rd</sup> March 2010, attendees from parishes, the police, the district and county councils considered action taken against previous priorities:

- a) Criminal damage in Linton Village has resulted in high visibility patrols in the village at varying times of day on foot and in vehicles and a security light initiative to reduce attractiveness of causing damage.
- b) Perceived lack of confidence in Policing in Linton Village. Close engagement with Linton Village College who have confirmed that they feel we deliver a good level of service. Elderly residents spoken to ensuring that they have confidence in the local team, and feel happy to report things to us. Youth Club Organiser has confirmed that visits to the club are effective at reducing offending.
- c) Dwelling burglaries Balsham & Teversham. Burglary information packs have been personally delivered to all victims of burglary in the area and crime prevention advice given to make properties less attractive to potential burglars. Increased patrols of both villages, as well as other hotspot areas have been made.

#### New Priorities Agreed included:

- Implement preventative measures to reduce the impact of seasonal anti-social behaviour across the neighbourhood.
- Review existing procedures to manage traffic on A1307 and in surrounding villages in the event of closure of A1307.

#### **NATURE NOTES**

This is my favourite time of year with so much stirring into life, a hopeful reminder that things aren't really that bad after all. It's a time for firsts – the first celandine, the first chiffchaff, the first swallow and the first brimstone. Soon it will be the first whitethroat and the first turtle dove.

Di Licence tells us about one part of West Wickham that is at its best in Spring. She writes:

#### "If you go down to the woods today ....

West Wickham has many footpaths which take us across fields and through woods, but my favourite at this time of year is Blacklands Lane (as you go out of the village towards the airfield, just before the sharp bend, turn right, signposted Withersfield). A stretch of grass leads into a tunnel of green; the trees are coming into leaf and there are violets, wood anemones, cow parsley and dogs mercury on the ground. Our resident birds sing alongside the summer visitors (mainly warblers from countries far away) advertising for mates and protecting their territories. This time of year belongs to the flowers, though, mainly the bluebells. At the end of the tunnel, keep going across to the woods and take in that amazing sight of an English bluebell wood, an extensive carpet of blue flowers. If you concentrate you can get a faint whiff of their delicate scent. It is a beautiful sight, and one that fills me with pleasure. Beside the path two more spring flowers grow, both *yellow – cowslips with lovely butter yellow heads (as a child* growing up in Essex they were known locally as 'peggles') and oxlips – similar, but with a bigger, much paler yellow head like our wild primroses. But the pearls on this footpath are the bluebells. Do go down to the woods today...."

I can only endorse what Di has said, although I have a soft spot for the lovely white wood anemones (or windflowers) which this year seem to have spread more deeply into the wood and amongst the bluebells that are about to flower at the time of writing. The field that adjoins the tunnel seems to be bunting country at the moment – I have seen plenty of yellow hammers and corn buntings there, as well as a beautiful male reed bunting.

Other highlights since the last Village Voice include numerous Barn Owl sightings in the last few days of March, and a pair of treecreepers in the recently thinned out Rands Wood (although I am told that they were technically just over the border into West Wratting.)
