#### VILLAGE TIDY-UP

Thanks to all the adults and children who came along to the Village Tidyup on Mothering Sunday. As in previous years everyone had a satisfying time accumulating all the cans, bottles and crisp papers, which were nestling in the roadside verges and underneath the hedges. The key areas were the playing field behind the Village Hall and the stretches of road just beyond the village, and between West Wickham and Streetly End. 18 bags of rubbish were taken away by South Cambs DC, who provided the grabbers and gloves. #### STREETLY END SPEED LIMIT

You will see in the Parish Council News (see page 4) that the Parish Council, frustrated at the lack of progress on this issue, has formally complained to the County Council. This is the response from Brian Stinton, Area Manager (Traffic). Cambridge and South Cambs.

Firstly, I must apologise for the long delay in progressing the speed limit order for Streetly End. Regrettably, limited resources to deal with traffic management issues in the South Cambridgeshire area has resulted in a backlog of work and progress has been slower than we would wish in delivering third party work.

I have now discussed a programme for implementing the reduced speed limit in Streetly End with David (Lines) who was aware of the need to progress this with some priority and I can confirm that the order will be advertised in the later part of May. This will enable any objections that may be received to be determined at the next meeting of the South Cambridgeshire Traffic Management area Joint Committee in July.

Dependent on whether objections are received, I would anticipate that the speed limit would be in operation in August/September.

Progress at last, albeit slow progress!

#### FROM THE VICARAGE

We had some excellent speakers for the Lent series, 'Questions of Life.' We were also grateful for the two venues, Holy Trinity Church, Hildersham, and the Black Bull in Balsham which was opened especially for us on some of these Monday evenings.

One of the speakers was the international human rights lawyer, Robert McCorquodale. Robert set out for us the different kinds of human rights, civic and political, economic and social, individual and collective, and those which are about treating people with respect. He noted that the list of human rights in any given time or place changes with our awareness of what makes human life flourish. Although every country has signed up to at least one treaty on human rights, this does not mean that governments uphold them. It is the most vulnerable who are at greatest risk when human rights are ignored.

Another talk was about 'Where is God when it hurts?' by Jonathan Boroughs from Arthur Rank Hospice. These two talks captured many of the themes of Holy Week. They are also very relevant to those who will be planning and collecting for Christian Aid during the coming Month. We want people here, and in other countries to have the opportunities to flourish.

An illustration from Christian Aid this year focuses on a coffee farm in La Paz del Tuma in Nicaragua. Helped by a Christian Aid Partner, Soppexcca, this community is being transformed as they produce coffee for a world market. Clean water, education, and latrines are now a reality and not just a dream. There will be a Christian Aid service at Lt. Abington Church on  $15^{\text{th}}$  May at 4pm where you can hear more about this.

It is impossible to drive around the area without being aware of the surrounding fields of crops. This is a constant reminder of the work of those who labour to produce our food. On May 29th at 10.45 we will be holding a Rogation Sunday service united with all 7 churches, at Holy Trinity, Hildersham. The theme of this service will be, 'Ask and you shall receive.' Weather permitting, this will be held outside, so that we can be close to the natural world. It will be an opportunity for people to pray for all those who contribute to meeting our daily needs, as well as to ask God for help in those needs. It will be followed by a picnic. Instead of 'beating the bounds,' there will be a walk planned.

Finally, thank you to everyone who helped to make Service of Thanksgiving and Requiem Mass for John Cotgrove such a joyful celebration of his life. Thank you also to everyone who helped to make the Palm Sunday service with Bishop Stephen a memorable and enjoyable occasion.

#### **OIL SYNDICATE UPDATE**

For those interested in the price of oil, I thought you might like to hear how the first order of the newly re-formed oil syndicate went. On 11<sup>th</sup> April I rang the 6 suppliers listed in last month's edition together with Browns of Burwell which has also been suggested. 12 households wanted around 8000 litres in total and I got quotes ranging (exclusive of VAT) from 61.28p per litre to 57.94p per litre. The highest quote was, interestingly from Shelford Energy, who assured me that this was their best offer and the lowest from Pace Fuelcare with whom I placed the order. They delivered next day, which was very efficient but rather too short notice as far as contacting some people about access, etc.

Since writing my piece last month I discovered that there is in existence a local oil syndicate at Withersfield. It operates in essentially the same way as ours does now but with one significant difference - one of its objectives is to raise money through donations for good causes. Members are asked to make a minimum donation of 0.5p per litre to one of: EACH - East Anglia's Children's Hospices, the East Anglian Air Ambulance or St Mary's Church Withersfield for fabric upkeep, whichever you prefer, by way of a cheque to the organiser after each delivery, for him to sort and forward. Syndicate members can also nominate other good causes at the end of each year for the following 12 months, so if members from West Wickham joined, they could, for example, nominate our own church as a recipient of donations. The syndicate has an excellent website - http:// theoilsyndicate.wordpress.com/ - where you can find more Otherwise you can contact me or the information. organiser, Cliff Hall on 01440 708648 (in the evening or weekends) for more information.

I would like to hear from any of you already involved in our syndicate or thinking about joining whether you would be interested in joining the Withersfield syndicate instead of having a separate one for our village. The advantages, I suspect, would be that with a larger order an even better saving per litre can be achieved and you would put me out of a job (great!) I had proposed that I would next place an order on 11<sup>th</sup> June; the Withersfield syndicate's next order would be 19<sup>th</sup> June.

**NATURE NOTES** The Bard, the Boxers and the Bees

Shakespeare rarely appears in this column, but his references to nature are many. The bank where Titania sometimes sleeps has "oxlips and the nodding violet". We too have banks (and ditches) like that, as Perry Morley has written to remind me. Particular places are at the edges of Leys and Hare Woods. She points out that our oxlips are the true oxlip - often confused with the false <math>oxlip - ahybrid between the cowslip and primrose. The true one has paler flowers and shorter, fatter leaves. It does not have the five-pointed delicate red brush marks that both the primrose and the cowslip show and that Shakespeare described for Imogen's birthmark in Cymbeline as "cinque-spotted, like the crimson drops I' the bottom of a cowslip". Perry also mentions the pleasure in seeing the wood anemones, which I am sure are spreading more as the years go by. At the time of writing the stitchwort is in flower beside the roads and in the hedgerows, so spring is on the march.

My own observations take us slightly away from the confines of West Wickham and on to the Devil's Dyke near Stetchworth. It is a wooded section of the Dyke, consisting mainly of beech trees, and at this time of year every trunk is populated by dozens of snails many of whom have climbed to a considerable height. The beech trees have very smooth trunks, but the snails do not confine themselves to those. I am not sure of the explanation for this phenomenon, but suspect it may be something to do with sex, as most things are at this time of year. Whatever, it is a remarkable sight.

Di too has written with some of her spring observations – they include the mad March hares seen not only in West Wickham but also on the beach during a recent visit to Norfolk. Di comments "the jury is still out as to whether it's the males boxing the females, or the females boxing each other". She also mentions the emerging insects: brimstone and peacock butterflies, several queen wasps and a green shield bug which crawled out of her linen cupboard. That sounds like a nice warm place to over-winter. Di's favourite of the early insects is "Bombylius major', which Jan found in her conservatory. These beautiful insects are called from the 'bee-fly ' family, as they imitate bees. They have furry bodies, and a long stiff proboscis, and they hover like miniature humming birds. They like the nectar in the early spring flowers."

Seasonal noises that Di has been hearing include "*a loud cranking like a bicycle wheel with a broken spoke*" and "*deep rumbling and croaking*". Before your imaginations run away with you these noises came from an overflying heron and various pondside frogs. Beauty is in the ear of the listener as well as the eye of the beholder.

Final word as usual goes to the birds, and the summer arrivals. Last year was great for warblers and so far things are promising for a repeat. There are already plenty of chiffchaffs and blackcaps; I heard a couple of willow warblers on a recent walk near Streetly Hall and Yen Hall respectively and we should expect to see a whitethroat soon. Both Di and I have heard of people seeing a reed bunting in their back garden, and yes, I have seen a swallow – just one at Carlton on April 11<sup>th</sup>. It would be good to hear next time if anyone has a swallow or house martin nesting on their property.

## PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the Parish Council meeting held on Tuesday 22<sup>nd</sup> March the following items were discussed:

*Streetly End Speed Limit:* Due to the absence of County Cllr. Batchelor he was unable to report on David Line's unsatisfactory email. It was therefore agreed that a letter written by the Chairman would be sent to Richard Preston, with whom Clls. Cornish and Morris had met, to complain at the lack of progress.

*Hedge cutting:* The trimming of the hedge from the Village Hall down to the road had been satisfactorily carried out. CGM (grass contractors) needed to be consulted over the condition of the recreation ground following the short cutting for the football club.

*Football Club issues:* The Village Hall Management Committee is dealing with these problems, which are mainly due to the visiting players and supporters. However if these continue then they will not be allowed to use the playing field for their matches.

*Children's Play area:* The two swings have now had their chains replaced.

*Allotments:* There has been no interest in the two vacant allotments, which are gradually being cleared of rubbish and brambles and the hedges trimming back. The future maintenance of these allotments, should they not be let, will be discussed at the next meeting.

*Parish Council meetings.* It was agreed that the meetings would be held again on Mondays as formerly.

Finance:

- a) It was agreed that Jackie Dockerill of Running Total Bookeeping would be appointed as the Internal Auditor for this year.
- b) The Parish Clerk's salary would now have to go through the PAYE system from 1 April by order of the Inland Revenue for all Parish Clerks.

*Planning:* Planning Permission had been granted by SCDC for two dwellings to be built at 39-47 High Street. There is now a policy that the developers of new building developments have to pay a sum towards the infrastructure of the area and payment towards community leisure. It was agreed we should express an interest to Scouth Cambs DC in using the money from the two new builds in the village for the Play Area's new equipments.

*Road gritting & Pot holes:* Dene Road is being repaired and the pothole at the top of the High Street dealt with. The Salt bin is now residing behind the Bottle & Clothes Banks because it blows away if left standing alone. It will be fixed in place once the bottle bank has been removed.

Written Report from County Cllr. Batchelor:

a) The budgets are still being discussed;  $\pounds 160,000000$  cuts from its budget over 4 years. They are looking at service delivery.

b) List of cuts to be made – withdrawing bus subsidies leaving only No.13/13A available for this area along the A1307. Libraries under review, some will close, some will be run by volunteers and some run by trustees, a possible £1M has been allocated towards community transport schemes; Social services will inevitably be cut,

Regarding the bus services, those in this area are safe at the moment. However they are likely to be cut next year as all subsidised services will no longer be funded. Community transport relies on volunteers and is available only between 9.30am and 4.30pm. on a "dial a pick up" system, so what is Cambridge County Council doing about people living in the

rural areas who rely on buses to get to work?

The question was asked if the Council do impact assessments and if so were they published?

It is understood that the Archive Dept. is being put in the hands of a Trust. Do we, as depositors and therefore trustholders, get consulted about this, as we should have a say in where our archived documents are going?

Any Other Business:

- a) Blue bin rubbish: Much paper rubbish had been left strewn around by the blue bin dustman. A complaint will be made to SCDC.
- b) Cuttings from hedges and bushes have been left where cut by the contractors of BT Open Reach. A letter of complaint will be sent.
- c) The Chairman reported on the Village Hall Management Committee meeting: a) the car park will be resurfaced with tarmac. The work will be done by Anglia Surfacing during the Pre-School Easter break;
  b) the hall fees have been reviewed and there will be a 20% increase in hiring from 1<sup>st</sup> April. c) Richard Grenville is now the Maintenance Officer.
- d) The Chairman thanked the two Councillors who are not standing again in the election, namely Councillors Pearson and Cameron. Councillor Pearson was particularly thanked for his many years of service both as Councillor and Chairman.
