WE WILL REMEMBER THEM

The War memorial in the churchyard has the names of fourteen men who died in the First World War and four from the Second. You may also have noticed that there are two military gravestones nearby. One is of 22-year old Albert Mansfield, who was accidentally killed at Warren Heath Camp, Ipswich, in November 1916. The other is of 21 year old Albert Bradnam who died in a military hospital near Manchester from wounds received on the first day of the Battle of the Somme in July 1916.

Recently, Tony Beeton, a former resident of Balsham, has passed on some more details about this latter Albert. He and his elder brother, Bennett, enlisted together in Linton and were sent to Cambridge (along with many others from surrounding villages) to join the newly formed 11th Battalion (Cambridgeshire) of the Suffolk Regiment. The Battalion stayed in Cambridge until moving to Ripon for training before leaving for France in January 1916. Sometime during this period, Albert became the batman (servant) to Lieutenant Robert Gilson. Robert was an undergraduate at Cambridge and also just 21 years old when he enlisted in the 11th Suffolks. Originally from Birmingham, he was at school with and a great friend of J R R Tolkien and it is from John Garth's book Tolkien and the Great War that much of this information comes. On the 1 July, the 11th Battalion received heavy casualties as they were literally mown down in the advance at Becourt Wood. Robert was killed by a shell and Albert received a severe leg injury which led to his being sent home. He had two amputations on his leg but died on 7 July. Apparently, Robert's parents sent Albert £50 in appreciation of his work for their son without realising that he, too, had died. Tragically, just over a year later Bennett was also killed in action. He is buried in the Jeancourt Communal Cemetery, Aisne.

Now I need your help

Thanks to the work of Ron Pearson we know quite a bit about those men who died in the Second World War and those men and women who served. However, there are still four men on the Memorial from the First World War who have not been identified and we know virtually nothing about those who served. Unlike many villages, there is no roll of honour of service. Of the four men, two - B Brown and W G Page - I'm pretty certain are local. These are names of village families but the surnames are also quite common and without a first name or any other details it has not yet been possible to trace them. The other two - C Bentley and A Steed – are more of a mystery. These are not village names, nor can I find anyone of those names on the 1911 census. They could have simply been working here when they enlisted or perhaps their connection with the village was on their mother's side. Can anyone help? Do you know who these men were? I am trying to put together as much information as possible about those who died and those who served in the First World War. Did you have a relative who left the village to go and fight for their country? If so, I would love to hear from you. Any photographs would be an added bonus (we can quickly scan them for you so you don't lose the original). Please help me recover the story of these men and make sure they are remembered.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The meeting on 28 September discussed:

Matters arising:

Dog litter bins: Due to a change of policy by South Cambs DC no new bins are allowed, therefore Streetly End cannot have one

Streetly End Speed Limit: It is hoped that work to make the necessary changes to the Speed Limit will soon be started. Extra councillors: The request for 2 additional Parish Councillors made to SCDC is going through the necessary process before hopefully being agreed to.

Children's Play area: Following the RoSPA inspection there were one or two medium and low risk items which have now been attended to. Cllr. Morris thanked all those who had helped with distributing the bark in the play area.

Finance: The External Audit had been completed satisfactorily and the necessary notice posted on the noticeboard. The budget is on schedule except money spent on the repairs and refurbishment of the play area had gone over budget.

Linton Neighbourhood Panel meeting: Cllr. Grieve had attended this meeting and reported that the main issue was road safety with another serious fatal accident occurring on the A1307. The "speed" sign had still not been wired up for use. The council then discussed the Common crossroad where another accident had occurred. It was felt that there should be more explicit signage not just a "Give Way" sign. Following on from this Cllr. Morris told council that two sessions of the Speed Watch monitoring had been carried out and cars were slowing down when shown to be speeding. More sessions were planned.

Football lease: The Chairman reported that the terms of the lease had been agreed but not yet signed. There were some issues about unsupervised children being disruptive outside the hall whilst the football club were there and the Chairman is dealing with this. However the games are being well supported.

Report from District Cllr. Barrett:

- a) SCDC are waiting to hear what the government cuts will be for next year, however the community charge will not go up, but there are likely to be cuts made in other ways.
- b) There may be changes to Planning and Licensing with more consultation between parish council and local government.
- c) The Blue bins appear to have been welcomed by users.

Report by County Cllr. Batchelor:

- a) Again cuts are being made and various grants cut by the government with £595,000 less allowed for work on roads and no money for maintenance. The A1307 speed camera by Hildersham turn off has been put on "frozen list".
- b) The Linton Wind Farm appeal has come to a halt but it is unlikely that the Wind Farm will go ahead as NATS were totally against it for safety reasons. Wadlow Wind Farm will start being built in 18 months time.

The draft Minutes are posted on the Noticeboard and the next meeting will be held on Tuesday 23rd November. All are welcome.

NATURE NOTES

Stragglers

A few days ago I saw what will probably be the last Swallow of the year in West Wickham, about to embark, presumably on its long journey to South Africa. Let's hope the journey is a successful one. I also spotted a Red Admiral butterfly enjoying some pleasant October sunshine. Most of these butterflies migrate to the Mediterranean for the winter, often flying through the night, although apparently some do overwinter in the far south of England. Even the wasps' nests, which have been in my garden for most of the summer were still fairly busy up to a few days ago. The natural world is therefore fully occupied either moving to warmer climes or taking advantage of the autumn glut.

In fact Di Licence has written about how much we can appreciate Autumns plentiful treasures at this time of year – "the magnificent berries in the hedgerows, particularly on the Roman Road where there is a tremendous variety, including the usual juicy blackberries and the rich reds of rosehips and haws, the tiny black shiny fruits of the purging buckthorn and the marble-sized sloes. These lovely shiny berries often appear multi coloured, ranging from grey to purple due to the "bloom" on them. They are very bitter, but when mixed with gin and sugar, make a famous winter drink. There were strings of shiny red beads of the white bryony, slung across the hedges and (my favourite) berries of the spindle tree, bright shocking pink fleshy cases, which burst open to reveal bright orange seeds (a rather strange colour combination). Walking home we found a yew tree covered in fat fleshy berries, and everyone's favourite, the holly. Quite a colour show - all for free."

Di also let me know about some of the insects she disturbed while clearing her runner beans – ladybirds, shield bugs and more red admirals, as well as a bright green bush cricket on her window sill and a humming bird hawk moth on the lavender.

Of course to some species, our winters are comparatively warm and we always seem to play host for a few weeks at least to the golden plover, which, Di tells me, have already made their appearance, so listen out for their piping calls as they huddle in a group in the middle of fields. There has also been a minor incursion of mistle thrushes – seen fighting over the whitebeam berries on the Croft. Di asks where do they go in the summer? Any ideas?

Returning to the subject of butterflies, the results of the butterfly/moth count from July have been published

The top ten for the east of England were:

1.Large White 2.Small White 3.Gatekeeper 4.Meadow Brown 5. 6 Spot Burnet 6.Common Blue 7.Silver Y 9.Red Admiral 9.Peacock 10.Comma.

Interestingly, for the country as a whole, the Gatekeeper topped the list and the eastern region was the only one to have moths (Spot Burnet and Silver Y) in the top ten – the Green-veined White and the Small Tortoisehell featured instead in the other regions. My brassicas certainly bear witness to the prevalence of the large and small whites in East Anglia

NEWS FROM LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE

Last weekend we said goodbye to our 3 visitors from Boepathutse Secondary School, as they flew back to Johannesburg from Heathrow. Hosting our visitors was very enjoyable, but rather tiring. They brought with them all kinds of paraphernalia from the World Cup: mugs, a football and vuvuzelas. The World Cup, Sarah Seroka, the Principal, explained had been so much more to the children at our link school than a football tournament. It had been about the pride of the rainbow nation, about opening fully to the world after the dark years of apartheid and about demonstrating that South Africa could manage the organisation of such a huge international event. children of the school had all waited with baited breath for the appearance of their great hero, Nelson Mandela, at any of the stadiums and were beside themselves with happiness when he appeared, briefly, at the final. The township, we were told, partied all summer long.

During their visit, our guests learned all about the very many uses to which we now put ICT in the school and we provided them with lots of resources to use with their own computers. Our next fund-raising project will focus on raising enough money to provide some of the Boepathutse teachers with laptops, so that they can improve their own skills. Our target amount to raise is £3K. In July, four teachers and 16 students will go out to Boepathutse. Apart from laptops for the teachers, and some wall clocks to help teachers to time the parts of their lessons, we will be taking the sports leadership initiative with us. The idea is that our own young sports leaders train the students in South Africa in the skills of sports leadership and that they, in turn, pass those skills down to the years that follow. We hope to hold a sports festival at the end of the visit to showcase all that we have done.

We are going to channel our fundraising into two particular projects: a Christmas Fayre for the local people and a whole school link walk in the summer. We will set up a 'Just Giving' site for donations and very much hope that we can get the whole community behind this project in 2010/11.
