LINTON HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

The practice is changing its clinical computer system. This is a major piece of work for the practice team, but the new system will have big advantages. It will improve our efficiency, both for clinicians and support staff, and will in time talk to the computer systems used by the district nurses, health visitors, hospice and out of hours service, allowing us to work more closely as a team.

Our current system will stop recording new data on Friday 11th May, but it will be a full week before our "go-live" date for the new system on Friday 18th May. During this period we will still be able to access your records. We will continue to see all urgent cases as normal, but we need to reduce the number of routine appointments and prescriptions to prevent a huge backlog developing, and to allow time for staff training.

There are a couple of ways you can help:

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Bookings - Our appointments diary will not transfer automatically, so all the booked appointments will have to be manually entered before we can make any more forward appointments. For this reason on the 17th and 18th May, we will not be able to book forward appointments.

Order prescriptions early - We must also minimise dispensing during the week of 14th May. If your prescription is due during the week of 14th May, please submit the request early by mid-day on Friday 11th May.

Please be patient with us over this busy period. We have prepared a leaflet with a little more information which is available from reception or on our web-site www.linton.gpsurgery.net

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OIL SYNDICATE UPDATE

In April I placed an order for 12 of us with Team Flitwick who are part of GB Oils/Emo. For the first time I had several companies offering the same price – 58.95p per litre, but went with Team Flitwick as they were promising a quicker delivery and do not charge for debit or credit card payments. The variation in price was fairly small this time – the highest being 61.99p per litre from Shelford Energy. This was 1p cheaper than February's order.

We nearly got ourselves on television this month as I had received a call from ITV who were keen to film an oil delivery and speak to some of the recipients but although I put the Assistant Producer in touch with Team Flitwick did not hear any more. I think they were unable to tie up time of the oil delivery with the film crew's availability. What a shame!

I mentioned last month that Cambridgeshire Acre were promoting a countywide community oil buying scheme. Before I decide whether it seems a good idea to join it I would like to find out from them the prices they have been achieving when placing an order each month. If the savings are higher than we are getting currently then it probably justifies the annual £20 charge. I would welcome your views.

I plan to place another order in June if I have enough of you interested, the deadline for letting me know will be 10th.

FROM THE VICARAGE

I have just come back from a few days away in the South of France, where we visited the ancient Cistercian Abbey of Thoronet in Provence. I was intrigued to read about one of the Abbots called Folquet de Marseille. He came from a wealthy merchant family in Genoa, but gave up his career in trade to devote himself to poetry. He then turned to the church. In *The Divine Comedy*, Dante thought highly enough of Folquet's poetry to refer to it.

While singing it happens that I remember what I intend to forget by singing.
But although I sing to forget the pain and suffering of love, the more I sing, the more I remember, since from my mouth nothing else comes out except, have mercy!
Which is why it is true and seems good that in my heart, Lady, I carry your face that entreats me not to change my intentions." Folquet de Marseille. *Manuscript G.*

Talk of God is different from everyday talk. Often people have turned to metaphor and poetry in seeking to say something about God. In the Old Testament *The Song of Songs* is a love poem which appears at first glance to be between two people, but is a metaphor for the searching person and God.

The yearning to believe and to know God might be as painful as unrequited love. We might seek distractions from thinking about God, yet find constant prompts through a beautiful encounter with the natural world, or in songs, or with another person. This draws us back to seek God again. The search for God may be as basic as the drive for love. And just as we cannot make someone else fall in love by describing our experience, so each of us must search for God for ourselves. We must each explore the experiences behind the metaphors.

I am so pleased to be able to welcome Rev John Fellows to our 7 Churches. Thank you to everyone who helped at his licensing service.

There are to be six study sessions to look at areas of Christian faith that many take for granted but which bear further scrutiny. All interested people are welcome to these. They all take place at 7.30pm

2nd May, St Mary's, Little Abington - What sense can we make of the New Testament?

9th May, Holy Trinity, Hildersham - What we can know about God by looking at the Trinity?

23rd May, St Andrew's, West Wratting - Is it hypocritical to say the creed if we are not sure what we believe?

The Bishop of Ely has given the churches a consultation document called, **'Imagining the Future.'** A copy of this available for anyone to read at the back of each church. Bishop Stephen has said that this is not a strategy document but a document to invite conversation. Please drop a line with your views to me or to one of the Church Wardens. Archdeacon John Beer is coming to engage in an open conversation about the document with the Deanery on 11th May at Hinxton Village Hall, at 7.30pm.

There is an Evensong on 13th May at St Mary's West Wickham at 6pm.

We hope that all the children and families will come to the Celebration of Jubilee Service on 3^{rd} June at 9.30am.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

A Parish Council meeting was held on Monday 26th March and the following were some of the items discussed. The draft Minutes are posted on the Notice-board outside the Post Office.

Land Registration: \pounds 200 had been paid to Adams Harrison for the Registration fee with a valuation of \pounds 50,000 put upon the ground.

Village "Litter Pick Up" Day: Despite the rain, turning later to snow, there was a good turn out to help with picking up 27 bags of litter. Thanks to all those who helped.

Sewage Problem: Some weeks ago there was an overflow of sewage water, which was investigated and found to have been caused by a broom handle stuck across the pipe.

- Planning:
- a) Mr Duncan Henry who has purchased a piece of land in Burton End came to the meeting to discuss ideas for the use of this land. The Parish Council suggested a fruit orchard or wood for harvesting. TheWoodland Trust is offering various types of trees for free. Mr Henry is not keen to develop the land with housing.
- b) Minutes of the Planning meeting held on 7th March 2012 were signed as correct. S/0220/12 planning application for a new dwelling in the garden of the Old Vicarage had been discussed and was recommended for refusal by the Council.
- c) Section 106 payments would be made to the parish should S/0220/12 planning application be approved by SCDC and this would go towards the Playground redevelopment. However, in the comments made by the Parish Council on the application they asked as a condition that pedestrian safety should be improved if planning were to be given approval.

Allotments: There is still a quarter allotment available (see advert on page 5). It was agreed that the area where the bee orchids grew last year be taken out of circulation. This was agreed as the ground is not fit for allotment purposes and Cllr. Licence proposed it should be a wild life area and community orchard, seconded by Cllr. Hall and agreed by the Council.

Finances:

- a) The re-appointment of the internal auditor was discussed and it was agreed that Running Total Bookkeeping should be asked to do it again this year.
- b) Cllr. Licence will have invoices to pay towards the cost of the Diamond Jubilee celebrations and asked if this money was available now. However this is not possible, she will have to pay and submit the invoices to the

Parish Council for payment.

Village Questionnaire: Each household should by now have received their copy, to be completed and returned by the end of April.

Woodland Tree Trust: Cllr. Hall told Council that up to 105 free sapling trees could be given by Woodland Tree Trust. He suggested different areas for planting, e.g. by Bottle Hall on opposite side or on the strip of land used in the past by Nip Pearson for tree planting. These trees would be hazel, silver birch, oak, rowan, all suitable for the soil. Another 30 saplings from the Pre-school had also been donated. This will be discussed further.

Diamond Jubilee Celebrations: The programme of events is inserted in this edition of the Village Voice. The Parish Council has to look into guidelines for health and safety and risk assessment issues and check that the insurance policy covers things such as the Beacon.

Emergency Plans: Mr Lawrence Green will be speaking at the Annual Parish Meeting on Monday 28th May about emergency plans for the village should there be a serious incident, fire, flooding etc.

Police Liaison Meeting: Cllr. Grieve had attended this meeting and reported that the crime rate in this area has plummeted. He asked if a Neighbourhood Watch scheme should be re-instituted in the village. It was agreed that this could be discussed at the Annual Parish Meeting.

Report by County.Cllr. Batchelor:

- a) A Bus Service review had been carried out and the subsidies for bus services 16, 17, 16a and 19 will be discontinued in September. However alternative transport has to be in place before this can happen. Further details will follow.
- b) County Council has increased their part of Council Tax by 3.5% as they decided not to accept the 'freeze' money from the government as it was just for one year, meaning that next year the tax increase would be double.

Report by Dist.Cllr. Barrett: There has been no increase in Council Tax as SCDC have taken the one-off payment of 2.5M offered by the government.

NATURE NOTES – HOME & AWAY

In Spring we look for the old certainties, but do not take them for granted because they may surprise us, even in the garden. Here are a few recent highlights from ours. After that very cold week in February we had three frozen frogs in our pond (two attached to each other), so we feared for this season's new crop. But some must have beaten the frost, because now there are hundreds of wiggling black tadpoles, some of whom will turn into adult frogs, but many will be newt fodder or eaten by water boatmen. Pond life is tough. insects seemed to emerge earlier than usual during the warm spell at the end of March, including three different butterflies in our garden - a Brimstone, a Peacock and an Orange Tip - just one of each. I also noticed, while weeding, a Bee Fly, with its hovering flight and long proboscis which it was inserting into a hellebore flower to extract the nectar. Still down on my knees, I moved a bag full of soil which had been close up against one of the raised beds. This revealed a pile of snails, on top of which sat the tiniest of lizards. I picked up part of the pile, including the lizard, who didn't move, and replaced them and the bag in their original positions.

Outside the confines of the back garden Sue Harrow sent me news of the first chiffchaff being heard behind Maypole Croft on 19th March. This has since been supplemented by its lookalike, the willow warbler, in the same location but far more melodious. Meanwhile the spring flowers are doing their thing up Blacklands Lane and elsewhere with the bluebells on the point of full flowering, plenty of violets, ground ivy and cowslips plus, in the wood itself and alongside the path, oxlips. Di has also commented that the wood anemones, my personal favourites, have spread quite a bit but some have had their flowers eaten off. Anyone driving back from Withersfield may have noticed a lovely patch of them in the verge, just down the road from Skipper's Hall. These have escaped the executioner.

With all the flowers blooming and birds arriving, who would want to venture beyond the boundaries of West Wickham? And yet some of us have done just that in search of wildlife. Di reports on a trip to the RSPB reserve at Fowlmere, which was alive with the sound of chiffchaffs and blackcaps and in particular a Ceti's Warbler, - out of sight in the reeds, but loudly singing. Also several pairs of bullfinches were occupying the willow trees and there were quite a few varieties of Duck. We spent a week in Suffolk near Minsmere, where there had been a visitation from a lone flamingo, an escapee from a safari park. It looked rather strange standing among a group of black-tailed godwits, but they didn't seem to mind. We saw many other interesting birds, but it wasn't until we returned to West Wickham that we heard the exhilarating sound of the song thrush, having never heard it once while we were away. It was a nice homecoming.

Di saw her first swallow on the wire opposite the telephone box in the High Street on April 10th, so summer is on the way. I'm hoping that someone will soon tell me that house martins have arrived, or that they've seen a turtle dove, or heard a cuckoo, and then we can all relax.
