BUS SURVEY

Cambridgeshire Future Transport (CFT) have devised a short questionnaire in partnership with your local parish council, which is inserted in this issue of your village magazine. The survey will help us to more fully understand the accessibility needs of your community.

Originally Cambridgeshire County Council had proposed to withdraw bus subsidies from a number of services in your area in the autumn and are committed to investing money in alternative solutions to ensure that you could still access health services, work, education, shopping and for social trips. Stagecoach made the decision to change some services in June. The County Council has put in place an interim service run by the Voluntary Network, which runs along similar lines to the Service 19.

We will use the results from this survey to work with your County & District Councillors, your community and Parish Council to develop options for a long term solution. The County will continue to run the interim service until a long term solution is in place.

FROM THE VICARAGE

On 27 June we had three speakers who came to talk to people from the seven churches. Melanie Murdoch works for Age UK and organises the Warden Scheme where older people can be visited in their homes and practical help given to sort out medication amongst other things. This costs £5 per person per week. Jean Newman is an Older Persons' Co-ordinator. She talked about her work to set up programmes of activities and support for older people. We heard from Sue Evans who is a Parish Nurse, working with vulnerable people of all ages including the vulnerable elderly, young families and people with mental health problems.

We may think that we live in tight-knit communities where there is something going on to meet everybody's needs. However, when things go wrong it is not always the case that everyone rallies to someone's aid. Finding carers for people coming home from hospital is proving increasingly challenging. Sometimes, this means that people stay in hospital longer. Sometimes, it means that people come home and struggle.

There are two initiatives underway to build stronger links in our villages between people and provide support.

Firstly, we will be holding a meeting on 13 August at 7.30pm in West Wratting Village Hall to explore further the possibility of the churches employing a Parish Nurse or Coordinator for all seven villages. Everyone who is interested is encouraged to come.

A Parish Nurse, for example, would complement the existing Warden Scheme by having a wider remit of supporting vulnerable parents and children, those who are physically sick or disabled or with mental health problems as well as the vulnerable elderly. Where there have been both Parish Nurse/Co-ordinators and Wardens, the Parish Nurse/Co-ordinator has been a point of referral for the Warden Scheme. The evidence reported is that this is mutually beneficial.

Secondly, subsequent to the meeting in June, Melanie has begun to plan to organise an event which includes school children and older people, to highlight Celebrating Age at 1pm on 16 October at West Wratting. Rev Julie Norris

BIG VILLAGE DIG

We have a wonderful opportunity to find out about the origins of our village, when it started being settled and how it developed. Do Streetly End, the church end and Burton End date from the same time for instance? Very little is known about this. Documentary evidence is scarce and doesn't tell us where people were living, where their houses were. By the time you read this we will have put in an application for a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund - All Our Stories. This takes its inspiration from Michael Wood's recent BBC TV series The Great British Story – A People's History. The BBC, the Heritage Lottery Fund and universities across the UK have teamed up to help people like us find out more about our history. In our case, the university is Cambridge and through Cambridge Community Heritage we are able to call upon the expertise of archaeological staff to support us in carrying out between 20 and 30 1 metre square archaeological test pits throughout the village.

FOR THIS WE WILL NEED YOUR HELP. EVERYONE WILL HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO VOLUNTEER AND TAKE PART.

There are numerous ways you will be able to do this: Volunteer to do this in your own garden with your family (great fun for children)/friends/neighbours.

Offer your garden and we will find someone to do the work. Lend equipment like shovels, sieves, plastic sheeting.

Take photographs for us or report on Facebook or Twitter.

And there are probably other ways we haven't thought of yet!

Throughout the project, which won't take place until next year, we will be instructed and supported by archaeologists and experts in identifying finds. Our assigned University researcher is Britt Baillie-Warren, who by happy coincidence has just moved into the village so has an added personal interest!

We will not know if our application is successful until the end of October but I'd love to hear from anyone who might be interested now. Do get in touch.

NATURE NOTES

I saw a squashed hedgehog in the road outside the Post Office in Horseheath. Not nice, I know, but it is a relatively rare sight now, because they have declined so rapidly for other reasons. I would love to hear from anyone who sees a live one – such a shame that a hedgehog should perish in this location where cars should be travelling slowly. I'm not sure if hedgehogs like it wet, but their diet includes slugs, which are plentiful in this weather so let's hope it has given them a slight boost.

Despite the incessant rain, Di is focussing on the positive:

"Most mornings for the past few weeks, a buzzard has been sitting on one of the dead trees up Balsham hill, maybe keeping an eye on the replica owl perched on the hay bales? Pete is right, there are very few butterflies in the garden, we have seen a couple of speckled woods and meadow browns braving the weather, but on the warm dry days that we have had, the smell of the roses and honeysuckle have attracted many types of bees and hoverflies, but no big moths as yet.

The wet brings out the slugs and snails, we have had a beautiful brown slug with a black head on the patio, and many snails with brightly coloured shells, and of course the predators also come out...we have 'rescued' two toads on tarmac outside the house, and there are lots of frogs around the pond.

Walking up the Roman Rd one dry but windy evening we were amazed how many flowers were out and how forward they are...the knapweeds and field scabious nearly a month early. There were ringlet and skipper butterflies and small iridescent green beetles on the purple flowers, and lots of swallows catching insects over the fields, but the most dramatic thing was the effect the wind had on the barley...it was like standing on the seashore, with waves coming towards you. The tips are already turning yellow, and the wind produced waves of ripples across the entire field, like a 'Mexican wave'. The best display of wild flowers that I have seen recently is along the back road from Linton to Hildersham, a mass of red poppies, purple scabious and knapweeds and yellow and white bedstraws."

Having just driven along that very road, I had the same reaction to the wildflowers – they are a picture, even through a rain-spattered windscreen.

Finally, back to the butterflies and moths. Just in the last few days when we have had an occasional glimpse of the sun there have been plenty of ringlets and some meadow browns about and a small colony of (I think) large skippers feeding from the tufted vetch up Blacklands Lane. There was also a seven-spot burnet moth there alongside the skippers. Our garden has been visited by just one large white, showing interest in the cabbages, which I have made a feeble attempt to protect, and a lovely cinnabar, whose caterpillars should soon be evident on the ragwort.

Oh, and one last thing. Sue saw a barn owl on the way to Withersfield the other day. Maybe they have returned after being displaced by the short–eared owls in January. It's a theory anyway.

LANGUAGE MENTORS WANTED

Students at Linton Village College (LVC) are learning a range of modern foreign languages thanks to an innovative Language Futures programme.

Instead of the traditional approach where everyone learns the same language, Language Futures offers students the opportunity to learn whichever language is most relevant to them. Using modern technology such as I-Pads, students learn skills which they apply to a specific language of their choice with the support of community mentors who are fluent in the chosen language.

The college is currently recruiting voluntary community mentors to support students in French, Spanish, Italian, Mandarin and Russian.

Mentors are asked to keep in touch with students by email, attend some lessons, help with assessments and run lunchtime clubs depending on their availability.
