In April the Bishop of Ely presented all the churches in the Diocese with a consultative document in which he invited us all to 'Imagine the Future'. It came from his observations after visiting churches during his first year in post. He has asked us all to seek ways to be

Self-supporting Contributing Investing

This has give us much to think about. How can the churches here in these six parishes make sure that we are sustainable into the future? For each church there are questions about how we can make our ancient historic buildings open, accessible and functional not just for our own needs but for the communities we serve. In some cases this begins with repairing what is already there, sorting out drainpipes, putting in suitable heating, getting rid of damp and making sure that the organ can be played. For others, this is raising questions about whether running water, toilets, and a simple servery can be put into the building to enable us to offer hospitality and activities that will serve our communities better and ensure the future of the church.

We must not forget that living amongst us are people in real need. Two recent incidents have reminded us not to be complacent. The burial took place of Sally, a woman who lived, unknown to most of us, in a tent on the edge of the village at Abington. We also had a talk from Ann Merrigan, the manager of the Foodbank at Haverhill, who told us that she took food boxes to people in these villages. Over past months we have already been thinking about how the churches might better care for local vulnerable people. In each village there are local people willing to visit, and we are now also trying to plan for and employ a Parish Nurse. We continue to support the work of Janet our Age UK Village Warden. There will be an event for Cambridge Celebrating Age taking place on 16th October by Age UK in the village Hall at West Wratting starting at 1pm.

It is not just the adults that have something to contribute! I recently went to one of the Children's Church Councils at Hildersham. I will talk more about this on another occasion. I just wanted to say now how impressive it was to hear the ideas and energy for making things happen that the children mustered. The children in West Wickham also have good ideas.

The churches are also being invited to think about how we can be good stewards of our financial resources. In the current climate we are all finding it hard to pay for what we have.

On 6th October all Six Parochial Church Councils are meeting together at Weston Colville to share ideas, good practice and ways of working together to support each other. If you have ideas that you want us to consider please let me know.

Please come along and support your own Harvest Festival at St Mary's at 9.30am on 28th October. Dried produce will be going to the Haverhill Foodbank. We will also be marking the presence of the Salvation Army Flag now hanging in Church.

Please also come along to Keith Johnson's **Study Day on the Lord's Prayer**, taking place at **Balsham Church Institute on 27th October 10-3pm.** He has spent the last six month studying this and come up with some very interesting ideas. Lifts will be available.

NATURE NOTES - NO STING IN THE TAIL

The holidays are over, the swallows and house martins have virtually all returned to Africa, and normally during September we should be out picking blackberries. Unfortunately it's not been a vintage year for blackberries, which seem to have been slow to ripen, although as I write it is now possible to find a few juicy specimens. We have picked a few but nothing like the normal amounts. Apparently apples have not done well either - the commercial producers in the west have been complaining. I don't know whether there is any connection between these two things, but has anybody seen a wasp? We actually do have an apple tree which has produced well, and whereas last year the crop was devoured by wasps, this year the apples are virtually untouched. I would love to hear an explanation for the sudden downturn in wasp numbers, especially as there seem to have been plenty of bees around.

There is general acceptance that butterflies have had a bad summer, because of all the rain in June and July, but in the last couple of weeks there has been a bit of a late flourish. We had five Red Admirals and a Comma on our Michaelmas daisies the other day and walking down the road I noticed Red Admirals and Small Tortoiseshells in other gardens too. Speckled Woods have been regularly seen on tree and hedge-lined sections of walk and Whites are omnipresent.

Last month I asked if anyone shared my perception that there were more dragonflies around than usual. Well, I haven't heard from anyone but the dragonflies do seem to be plentiful this year. Their names – hawkers, chasers, skimmers and darters – hint at their predatory nature, but I prefer to concentrate on the more aesthetic aspects – the colourful bodies, the beautiful transparent wings and the hovering flight, and try and forget for a moment that they are ruthless killers.

Still on the insect theme, I'd like to give an honourable mention to my friends the shield bugs. The adults usually appear in the Autumn. Two that I have seen recently are the Hawthorn Shield Bug (bright green) and the Sloe Bug (reddy brown), both of which are common in hedges and are always likely to drop onto you when doing some cutting or pruning.

Finally, a word for the mammals. I had a good sighting of two roe deer as I walked between Horseheath and Streetly End; a fox came dangerously close to the end of our garden causing considerable alarm to the chickens; and a mole has thrown up a molehill in our lawn. The chickens were immediately attracted to it, scratched it flat only to find that it had been re-erected the following day.

Remember I would love to hear from anyone with news and views on wildlife so please let me know.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

We returned to College in the kind of glorious sunshine we would have killed for in July or August. However, we were not bitter because we also returned to THE BEST RESULTS IN THE HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE. A staggering 92% of the class of 2012 achieved 5 A* - C grades or better and 71% of them achieved those 5 grades with Cs or above in both English and Maths. Nearly half of the students had 3 or more A / A* grades. All of this, of course, bucked the trend nationally and has left us wondering how stellar those results could have been if grade boundaries in English had not been moved upwards at a national level. We know that students who would have achieved the all-important 'C' grade in January 2012 with the same work did not do so in August and our teachers, parents and students feel that this is ridiculous and unfair.

So what do we now have to look forward to? Well, we are applying to become a Teaching School this year, so we are keeping our fingers crossed about that, we are going to renovate our main hall and we are excited about the prospect of a grand production of 'Guys And Dolls' in the spring term. It is going to be another great year.

LINTON ADULT COMMUNITY NEWS

As part of our new Adult Community Learning programme we are introducing a new course entitled Treading the Boards – Making theatre. The course is for everyone and you need not have any experience of theatre to attend.

The course will explore various aspects of theatre through practical means and learners will explore how text can be developed into physical theatre; how ensemble casts can inspire exciting staging ideas; how soundscapes can enhance dialogue and how real voices can develop verbatim theatre. These techniques will be put into practice as students experiment, devise and rehearse their own theatre performance under the guidance of the Rachel Yates.

Rachel trained in theatre in Liverpool before moving to London where she gained her degree in Performing Arts. She went on to become Head of Dance Programming at the Islington Arts Factory, Head of Dance at Barnet College and then became a lecturer at Middlesex University teaching contemporary dance technique.

Rachel joined Chickenshed, the world renowned pioneering theatre company, in 1998 as Associate Director where she currently teaches, choreographs, performs and directs mainhouse performances.

Rachel's strong belief that everyone can access the performing arts makes her sessions lively, creative and vibrant and often focuses on the strength of the ensemble. Her creative style of blending the physical with the narrative makes strong, bold theatre full of imagery and depth.

FROM THE MEADOW SCHOOL GOVERNORS

The Meadow Governors aim to promote continued school improvement by supporting and challenging the school, providing strategic direction and engaging with children, staff and parents openly and honestly.

The Meadow School is very much a community school, and as well as the regular up-dates on general school activities that appear in the village newsletters, the governors would like to outline some of the priorities with which the governing body has been involved over the past year.

One of our main areas of activity is assisting senior staff in monitoring the school's Raising Attainment Plan (RAP), a document that identifies priority areas within the school for particular attention. Governors this year have assisted with assessing data on achievements in maths, improving the system for management of TAs and assessing the impact of a new Behaviour Policy.

The school is due for a full OFSTED inspection, and governors have been helping the senior staff to fully understand the new inspection framework that came into force in January, and to ensure all the documentation that OFSTED may require is up-to-date.

Another major role of governors is to assist with setting and managing the school budget. This has become increasingly challenging in the past two years amidst the tighter funding provided to schools, especially a much smaller Capital Fund (for the fabric of the school and its ICT equipment). A programme of essential repairs to the school roof, scheduled to take place over the next five years, and replacing and updating the school's computer equipment will use a high proportion of the Capital Fund over the next few years. We are extremely grateful to the Parent Teacher's Association (PTA), which has assisted with some ICT purchases, and we have established a Working Group involving parents, staff and governors to explore other ways to support the renewal of the school's ICT equipment.

Governors also have a role in strategic planning and have been involved this year in the unavoidable decision to reduce the number of classes in the school from ten to nine in September. Historically, the school expanded in the mid-1990s following new housing in the catchment area, but families have stayed as their children have grown up and the number of primary-aged children has dropped again.

Optimising communication between all elements of the school community has been another area of focus this year, along with the on-going work of ensuring all the school policies are in place and regularly reviewed.
