# FROM WEST WRATTING VICARAGE

Rev Prof Sir Diarmaid Ninian John MacCulloch, Professor of the History of the Church in the University of Oxford (crazy name, crazy guy as Private Eye's Glenda Slagg might have put it) is in fact far from the pillar of Establishment orthodoxy that his name suggests. He has just produced a book called *Silence: A Christian History*. What makes it especially interesting is that, like football, it is a game of two halves.

On the one hand there is the honourable history of Christian silence, taking its cue from Jesus's own seeking of silence many times in the gospels, when as the hymn puts it *Jesus knelt to share with thee the silence of eternity*. Silent prayer, meditation and contemplation have a long and cherished place in the story of Christian spirituality

There is also what we call the apophatic (a word my spell checker can't cope with) tradition: that God is in fact unknowable, and the only language we can use about him is saying nothing or saying what he is not. And sometimes Christianity can seem to deserve E.M. Forster's dismissive "poor little talkative Christianity", especially when celebrating the Word made flesh we manage to turn Him back into word again. Sometimes our liturgies can seem very wordy, using a lot of words to say not very much.

That is why I was so pleased to learn when I came here of the existence of the Julian Group, a small monthly meeting, lasting about an hour, looking at the writings of the Lady Julian of Norwich, and having at least half an hour of silent prayer. I do commend this group to you. Julian's day is 8 May, and we shall be meeting at the Vicarage at 7.00pm that night. Silent prayer is not for everyone, but it might be for you. Think about it and certainly ask Stephen Wheeler or Kathy Bishop or even me about it.

But the second half of the book deals by contrast with the dishonourable silence of the Church. How for example it has quite clearly covered over the role of women in the Early Church. How it turned a blind eye to so much that was wrong in society and indeed the church itself. The child abuse scandal still engulfing the Roman church, though the Church of England is not immune, is a very topical example. One of the tasks of the Church is to give a voice to the voiceless and you cannot read the Gospels without being aware that Jesus had a special regard for the poor. They had a special place in his sympathies and a regard for the poor remains a mark of his disciples. The poor have no voice. It is up to Christians to give them one

So I was a little disappointed when I came here to discover that Christian Aid Week (This year 12-18 May) didn't loom as large in church life as it certainly had in my last parish. Of course Christian Aid is not perfect, but on balance I really believe it to be a major force for Christian good in the world. Also I am bound to say that in my experience people who have money will always come up with reasons why they shouldn't give it away. But that's not the gospel.

So come on, everyone. Be generous and let's make it a bumper year for Christian Aid in our 7 churches!

#### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the parish council meeting held on Monday 25 March 2013 the following items were discussed.

*Village sign:* An outline design has been made and after discussion with a number of residents it was thought the best siting of it would in front of the village hall. The clothes bank and yellow grit box would need to be moved. The sign will be made of black etched metal with silhouettes of the Church, the Windmill and a Lancaster aeroplane. A model will be made for everyone to have a look at.

*Old Filtration Plant:* The transfer of this land from SCDC to West Wickham Parish has now gone through.

*Woodland Trust & Wildlife Area:* A grant of £4.00 per tree has been awarded from DEFRA and South Cambs. Wildlife will donate 50% of costs after assessment. A further grant has been applied for birdboxes, stakes and ties for trees. A picnic table has also been donated.

*Burton End street sign:* This sign will be replaced by SCDC and the Parish Clerk was asked to write the District & County Councils concerning the state of all the signs in the parish, particularly the West Wickham sign on the Balsham road and one of the Streetly End street signs, which has disappeared.

*Planning:* A further letter is being drafted to be sent to Sir James Paice, MP, about the dissatisfaction over the Inspector's decision not to award community support money from the development at 10 Burton End.

*Correspondence:* A letter asking for funding had been received from the Meadow Primary School and Mrs Jan Ellam came as their representative and spoke briefly to clarify their need, which was mainly due to the financial provision for ICT being reduced to nil. The IT equipment is old and needs replacing. The Parish Council agreed to consider this but felt no decision could be made until the after the end of the financial year when the year end figures and available reserves were known. (Ed. *Finance:* The Parish Clerk told Council that Running Total (Jackie Dockerill) would be able to carry out the internal audit and monitor the PAYE.

*Playground refurbishment:* The money raised so far through fund raising and grant awards was £46,752.00, so still £6000 short. More fund raising e.g. coffee mornings, quizzes was being carried out. Work has not yet started due to the bad weather.

*West Wratting Crossroads:* It had been agreed with the Highways Dept that two rather than four rumble strips will be put on the two minor roads. There will be no cost for this.

*Maintenance:* Road gritting – a yellow grit box was requested for the entrance to Maypole Croft and the Parish Clerk will enquire as to cost etc. The Parish Clerk was also asked to write to the Highways Dept requesting that the roadside gulleys throughout the village be cleared out.

The next Parish Council meeting (AGM) will be on Monday 20 May at 8.30pm. The Annual Parish Meeting will be held on the same day at 7.30pm. If anyone would like any issue discussed please contact me.

#### **NATURE NOTES**

We were down in Devon for a week looking for spring, but when we returned we found it had crept in at the back door while we were away. Mind you we did see a couple of swallows and the primroses were spectacular. Back home the stars of the show as I write are the windflowers (wood anemones) up Blacklands Lane, ably supported as usual by the oxlips. The bluebells will be coming soon but the windflowers really are at their best now.

Since the last Nature Notes I've had one or two messages from people who have seen interesting things. These include reed buntings from Vic Terry and Lucy Cameron, and a dipper spotted by Jean and Kit Martin. Lucy also commented on the woodpeckers in Hare Wood, the hares on the Roman Road and a lone lapwing on a field at Burton End. Just too late to be included last time was a goldcrest from Valda Shaw. That one did well to get through the long winter. Andrew Morris saw a group of golden plovers near Hill Farm looking at their smartest, so presumably on the way north and 2 swallows near Yen Hall on Sunday 21 April.

Di says "What a difference a few weeks make....I walked one morning from the A1307 along Deane Road towards home, on a grey, snowy day. Once the drone of traffic had gone, I was left in a silent world, that still eerie silence that only a fall of snow brings. As I walked, I become aware of the loudness of the woodland bird song, and wondered at the resilience of these tiny birds in these harsh conditions. The blue, great and long-tailed tits were all there, looking resplendent in their mating plumage, foraging along the bare branches between the emerging leaf buds, a jay shrieks and flies across my path, two male pheasants are sparring in the field to my left, and the rooks nesting in the high trees are squabbling about something, all flying into the air squawking loudly.....silence.....what silence? I scan the field, and there crouching in a scrape in the ground called a 'form' are two hares, with that characteristic round hape, with slightly flattened ears. I watch, but they remain motionless.

On two consecutive mornings, I spotted a fox walking as bold as brass across the road onto the green at the old White Hart, none too bothered about the car, and a badger was seen one evening down at Horseheath Park, foraging in the leaves at the base of the wall.

Fast forward three weeks....the sun is shining, and the air temperature is warm. There are bumble bees flying about, a beautiful brimstone butterfly has emerged from his winter hiding and there are honey bees in the crocus flowers, their pollen bags laden. Our neighbour tells us she had a tree creeper in her garden, our summer visitors, blackcaps and chiffchaffs are singing in the trees, and the celandines by the church are fully out....spring is here at last."

Those of us in the Gardening Club had a very interesting talk from a butterfly expert. The message for gardeners is: leave some long grass if you can, and don't be too harsh on the ivy. Many butterfly species lay their eggs in long grass, and ivy provides a valuable nectar source at the end of the year when everything else has finished flowering. The brimstone that Di mentioned is particularly keen on buckthorn, so if anyone is thinking of putting in some hedging that is a butterfly friendly option.

#### MEADOW SCHOOL ICT PROJECT UPDATE

The last four remaining whiteboards with interactive projectors were installed over the Easter holidays with thanks to the Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund and the PTA. Already the teachers have noticed a difference and the Key Stage 1 children are delighted these boards are now in place allowing them to take part in their lessons interactively with more confidence.

We have also gratefully received generous donations from the Balsham Parish Council, the Ploughmen and the Parochial Society in Balsham which have enabled us to purchase four digital cameras, a new printer and partially fund the installation of WiFi into school.

We still need to raise around £20k and are in the process of applying for grants to replace the computers in the ICT suite, our next priority.

# LINTON HEALTH CENTRE NEWS

 $1^{st}$  April 2013 – an important date for the NHS: reorganisation on a huge scale with many challenges ahead. Yet, at a local level, be assured that we are still here to provide the best possible medical care for our practice population.

GP Commissioning is at the forefront of the NHS changes. Clinical Commissioning Groups (CCGs) have been formed to manage the NHS budget and, as a practice, we fall within the large Cambridgeshire & Peterborough CCG. The CCG is split in to 8 Local Commissioning Groups (LCGs) in order to provide a local perspective to the decision making process.

The challenges for CCGs in managing the budgets are huge, especially in Cambridgeshire where we are seen as a 'healthy and wealthy' population and therefore the funding has been lower than elsewhere in the country. This filters down to practice level and in the reorganisation a practice like ours is set to lose over £200,000 in annual funding in the coming years. All practices will have to really engage in the commissioning process in order to make best use of the funds available and to maintain the level of service to patients.

# LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

We have had a really exciting early spring at LVC: the production of 'Guys and Dolls' brought the community together in a wonderful celebration of the talent of our young people: a large number of the staff volunteered their time to help with the front of house, behind the stage with the set, by playing in the band, by selling refreshments or by directing and the audience was packed on both Friday and Saturday nights. The show was also previewed by children from Granta School and some of the senior citizens in the community. This kind of event reveals a Village College at its very best. Our director, Laura Cassidy, deserves a special mention. She broke her leg a few weeks before the performance but remained completely committed to the notion that the 'show must go on' and hobbled her way through rehearsals and ignored her own discomfort.

This month we also received the news that Linton Village College has been awarded Teaching School Status. This means that we will be leading an alliance of schools in Cambridgeshire and Suffolk with a view to training teachers to teach: both new entrants to the profession and those progressing in their careers to leadership roles. It is a great honour to be one of the 350 primary and secondary schools nationally that are recognised as strong enough to take this responsibility on. We are looking forward to it. We have built an alliance of many first class education providers: Suffolk and Cambs Local Authorities, the Faculty of Education at Cambridge University, Sawston Village College, Thurston Community College, Castle Manor Partnership, the Granta School and Linton Infants School.

There has been much to celebrate: I just wish that the warmth of feeling that we have about our Village College was matched by some warmer weather!
