NATURE NOTES

Remember Rod, the bachelor great tit, whose solitary lifestyle included nightly stopovers in Brian and Linda's spacious televised bird box? Well he has become a victim of a kind of avian bedroom tax, because his sleeping quarters have now been taken over by a hard-working family of blue tits, who are clearly "doing the right thing" and are currently incubating a clutch of eggs. We are not sure whether there are five, six or seven eggs, but they will be incubated for almost two weeks so expected hatching is around 26 May. I'm sure the tension will build as the day approaches.

Our swallows seemed to have returned and we left our garage open for them. They flew in and out a number of times but have not taken up residence yet and we haven't seen them for a few days, so perhaps they have found a better place. It was good to hear a group of five swifts screaming as they flew near the cricket ground in Weston Colville the other day, and to see three house martins drinking from a puddle in the road at Carlton, but I have not heard a cuckoo yet and have had no local reports. It would be good to know if anyone has heard a cuckoo nearby.

Di comments on the flowers and trees: "Early May has produced swathes of wildflowers in our hedgerows, woods, fields and roadside verges. Creamy white blossom festoons the hawthorn bushes; pink and white flower spikes on the horse chestnut trees; and the mountain ash flowers fill the air with their heady scent. The verges are yellow with buttercups and behind them the stands of white, shepherd's parsley, known to many as Queen Anne's lace. Our woods are carpeted with bluebells, giving off a delicate fragrance on warm evenings. Just outside Weston Colville on the Brinkley Road is a remarkable sight, a pink field of red campions in flower on a large area of set aside. The trees are all in leaf, each with their own shade of green, but then merging into one as summer approaches" I would also like to give an honourable mention to the stitchwort, whose small starry white flowers seem to be more in evidence than ever this year.

You may have heard that next year it is proposed to introduce the lynx to this country, as a way of controlling the burgeoning deer population and that one of the places they are to be released is in Norfolk. I'm always a bit wary of attempts by humans to manage the natural world by bringing in new predators, but it will be interesting to see how this experiment works out. Maybe the lynx will expand its range and we will one day find it roaming around West Wickham, although some of us believe that big cats are already on the loose and have been seen locally. A predator that definitely is around us is of course the fox, and this is a particularly dangerous time of year for those of us who keep chickens and ducks. Foxes will be feeding young, so they are more likely to take the chance of coming near houses so they can take home a meal. Mind you the other day I was walking with Kip past Rands Wood and came across a lovely fox curled up in the middle of the path enjoying the sunshine. He was startled, leapt into the air, across the ditch, through the adjoining wheat field and into the wood.

MEADOW SCHOOL NEWS

We are well and truly into the last term of the academic year...where did it go?

We are very lucky to have a running club organised by a group of very dedicated parents every Friday lunchtime. Come rain or shine, they take an eager bunch of Key Stage 2 children down to the Rec and coach them in distance running. Some of the Y5/6 runners recently got to show off their skills when participating in a cross country relay team event in St. Neots. We entered 2 girl's teams and 3 boy's teams, all whom did themselves incredibly proud, running on a challenging course. Over 65 schools entered, with each entering up to 8 teams - there were lots and lots of children there!

Our results were:

Girls A team - 33rd place.

Boys A team - 20th place
Boys C team - 96th place

Girls B team - 85th place
Boys B team - 57th place

Our Infant children recently welcomed several new arrivals into their team. They waited and watched eagerly as 10 chicken eggs arrived in an incubator. After two days, they declared they were not hatching and could we swap them for the ones in Tesco, after some gentle encouragement and a lesson in patience the children were rewarded when the chicks started 'pipping' (a technical term we have learnt for when the chicks use their egg tooth to make a hole in the egg shell). The excitement quickly spread through school and anybody and everybody paid a visit. By the end of day 4 we had 7 hatched. The children thoroughly enjoyed becoming their surrogate parents, cuddling them, feeding them, talking to them, although they weren't too keen on cleaning them out!

They learnt so much and the quality of the writing and work they produced, based around the chicks was absolutely amazing. We have now waved goodbye to our feathered friends, and they have gone back to life on the farm (and to enjoy the peace and quiet)!

In May our Year 6 children showed courage, determination, dedication and perseverance as they took the end of key Stage 2 SAT tests. As always the Meadow staff rallied around, volunteering to come in early and prepare a banquet for breakfast every day. I have never known children eat so many rounds of toast, bowls of cereal and bacon sandwiches, but it certainly helped prepare them for the tests. We will find out the school results in July, and look forward to sharing them with the children and the community.

Our Y6 children are currently looking forward to being rewarded for their hard work with a week long residential trip to Finborough. My suitcase is packed and ready, the welly boots are in the car and I am looking forward to a week of very little sleep!
