PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

ANNUAL PARISH MEETING

Held on 18 May prior to the Parish Council meeting.

Under Matters Arising: at last year's Parish Meeting the question of the accidents occurring at West Wickham/ Weston Colville crossroads was discussed and it was hoped something could be done to make a safer crossing. It was therefore pleasing to be able to say that a staggered junction was in the process of being created.

Reports sent in by local clubs and societies were read out by Cllr. Grieve. Nick Salter, Chairman of the Village Hall read out his report and the Chairman, Cllr. Cornish gave his report on the Parish Council's year. All these reports can be seen on the notice board and on the village website.

The accounts were available to view prior to them being signed off at the Parish Council meeting.

County Cllr. Hickford reported that a study of the A1307 had been set up and will be completed by January 2016, funded by City Deal, looking at solutions re traffic flow etc. from Haverhill to Four Wentways. A road turn into Hildersham from the left hand side of the road has been agreed and there will be an island. The cats eyes have been removed from the road from Balsham to the A11 as it is being resurfaced. It is not yet known whether these will be replaced although many people have made complaints about this.

ANNUAL PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Firstly the forms of Declaration of Acceptance and the Register of Interest forms were signed by the 7 Councillors elected in May, followed by the election of Chairman, Marcus Cornish and Vice Chairman, Patrick Charlton. Di Licence and Patrick Charlton were elected to represent the Parish Council on the Village Hall Management Committee. *Matters arising*:

Post Office: It was understood it will reopen in the Village Hall on Monday 22 June.

Dean Road: Because Cllr. Hickford had left the meeting it was agreed to email the County Council with photographs showing how road sight is impeded by hanging branches.

30mph sign: This has been repaired but other signage was also in need of repair and the County Council will be contacted about this.

Hedging round Playing Field: CGM will be cutting these in September/October.

Wildlife & Interpretation maps: A grant of £1000 from the Cambridge Community Fund has been awarded to the Preschool to develop the wildlife area following Cllr. Licence and Sue Harrow making an application. Cllr. Licence requested funding from the Parish Council to purchase a footpath map board to be sited hanging on the Village hall outside wall. The cost would be approx £360.00. Three quotes will be needed and the Council needs to look at the budget for this coming year before agreeing.

Parish Council website requirement: Cllr. Schuilenburg said it would be sensible to have a separate website for Parish Council information. He said that the Village Hall website could be a village website, containing more general information about events and meetings etc., calling it the West Wickham website. He will look into it and report back at the next meeting.

Telephone boxes: These have now been adopted by the

village and Perla Artega outlined her plans for the High Street box, intending to clear and paint it and use it as a mini library. She hopes it will be ready by 4 July.

Finance: The end of year accounts were accepted and signed by the Chairman and Parish Clerk, as was the ledger. The Statement of Accounts for the external auditor was agreed and signed as was the Statement of Governance after it had been read out. Former Cllr Morris had proposed that the allocated reserved of £4066.16 be accepted and this was agreed.

Planning:

S/1044/15/RM – Land at Balsham Hill re S/2433/13/OL application was recommended for approval but the Balsham Hill access must be closed.

S/1160/15/OL - 95 High Street, 2 single dwellings & garages following demolition of a garage. A planning meeting will be arranged to discuss this.

Electrical Recycling: Cllr. Licence said she would investigate a scheme operated by Shudy Camps where old electrical goods are collected on a particular day and the Parish Council is paid £40.00 per ton.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr. Hall will be sending an application to designate a Neighbourhood Area to SCDC. This is a precursor to producing a neighbourhood plan. Cllr. Hall was thanked for his hard work. (Ed. Watch for an article on this in next months Village Voice).

Any other business:

Cllr. Charlton had chased up Connect in Cambridge re superfast broadband but had had no response.

It was noted that the Church clock face needs replacing.

The next Parish Council meeting is Monday 27 July. The meeting dates for the next 10 months are: 28 September, 23 November, 25 January 2016 and 28 March. All are welcome to attend.

The draft Minutes can be read on the Parish Council noticeboard.

NATURE NOTES

First some very sad news. Brian and Linda's blue tit eggs duly hatched on 25 - 26 May as predicted but after five had hatched, the nest box was visited by a green woodpecker. We think it took out one of the adults (probably the female), leaving the young chicks helpless. The male stayed with them overnight but then abandoned the nest, and with noone to feed them, all the chicks died. There were six of them by this time because another one had hatched. All this happened just after last month's Village Voice had been printed. Now when we hear the woodpecker's resounding yaffle from the oak tree in the middle of the field, it feels as though there is a touch of menace in it. But we have to remind ourselves that nature is like that.

In the meantime life continues and on the other side of our house a nest of starlings has fledged and is now causing havoc around the bird feeders. There are at least ten of them going around mob handed spraying sunflower seeds in all directions and asking to be fed by the adults and generally making a racket. It's quite an uplifting sight and sound – rather like a children's playground when you have no responsibility for keeping them in order.

The starlings nested just under the thatched roof overhang and they are not the only creatures using items in the garden not intended for the purpose. Bees have colonised our compost tumbler, using the holes in the sides for their entrance and exit, while thirty feet away another bees' nest has been created in a bird nest box. I stand and watch the activity occasionally, with little understanding of what is going on, although it certainly feels that when I come within a certain distance, one bee after another will fly out on a wider arc to check me out.

As the summer advances, and it is advancing, despite the rather chilly north-easterly blowing as I write, other insects are emerging including the many species of dragonfly, with which I am not yet familiar enough to be certain of identification. However, we are fortunate that we once again have the unmistakeable broad-bodied chaser. This splendid insect has regularly been in our garden for the last few summers, presumably breeding on our pond, although I have only ever seen the male, with his impressive pale blue abdomen with yellow spots down the side. He tends to perch fairly high up on a rose bush or the hedge from which he makes forays in pursuit of prey. There are also several pairs of blue and red damselflies, often flying around coupled together, but the chaser puts them in the shade.

No-one has contacted me to report hearing a cuckoo in the village, but we made a trip out to Lakenheath Fen for the Dawn Chorus walk. It's a popular place for cuckoos because of the large number of reed warblers (their favourite host) and the availability of the big furry drinker moth caterpillars, which cuckoos are uniquely adapted to eat despite their toxicity. There were reportedly ten cuckoos on the Fen and we heard and saw a number of them. But that has been my one and only cuckoo experience this year.

Things will get quieter for the birds as July progresses, but this is when many of our butterflies come in to their own so watch out for the skippers, gatekeepers and ringlets, not to mention the blues and the browns.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

We have just got to the end of another enrichment week at the College. Many schools no longer have such extravaganzas, but I have always firmly believed that strong programmes of enrichment help students with their educational development as great people and great learners. Let me describe the Year 7 trip to Boulogne for example.

The day before the trip, the students spend time with their language teachers learning and practising the words and phrases that they are going to use. They are encouraged to go to the canteen and order an ice cream in French, they have to find French items in a treasure hunt around the school and they are taught how to recognise the shops and public places they will experience on their trip.

At 5 am the next morning, we gather at school and set off on our journey. Around half of the 170 children will never have been to France before, so the excitement is tangible as we near the channel. The Pupil Premium Allowance that we get for every disadvantaged child allows us to provide the trip to those children for free. This is a trip that those children would never have experienced with their families and that makes it feel quite magical.

When we arrive in France we visit the Aquarium at Nausicaa and marvel at the sharks and sea lions, then we head into town to buy things: silly berets and sun glasses, hats, patisseries, bread and candy floss and pancakes. All of these items are bought using French to negotiate the transactions. Every child has to use their language skills and the shopkeepers and waiters play along, even if their own English is very good. The children are always immensely proud of their purchases in French. We end the day with a trip to Cite de Europe to stock up on French goodies before we return home for around 9 pm. It's a long day for the staff, someone is always travel sick, there are always complicated problems to sort out ... a lost passport, a broken phone or camera, a spilt drink, a parent who forgets to collect their child, but it is always memorable and fun. Apart from the French learned and put to use it is also a great way for a teacher, the head teacher perhaps, to really get to know a small number of children in a more relaxed setting. Relationships are so important in teaching and count for so much. They help us to understand what motivates the children and for the children to know how to get the best out of us too. Long may enrichment week continue.
