SHOOTING SONGBIRDS IS ILLEGAL WHAT CAN WE DO ABOUT IT?

Songbirds such as thrushes and starlings have been found shot in West Wickham and this practice has got to stop!

Some landowners permit people onto their land, ostensibly to shoot woodpigeons. We know pigeons do a lot of damage to crops, particularly rape. These people however do not limit themselves to shooting pigeons. They are quite partial to having a shot at anything that flies, and after they have been in the area, corpses of other birds have been found. As well as song and mistle thrushes, starlings and pheasants out of season, they were seen to kill a little owl.

In some Mediterranean countries this practice is seen as normal. In Britain it is not only considered despicable, but illegal under the Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981, which prohibits the shooting of all wild birds with the exception of gamebirds (when in season) and those in special categories, including those that damage crops like woodpigeons. These "marksmen" have been coming to West Wickham for a number of years with their shotguns and in the past have been seen on public footpaths. There has been no noticeable decline in the number of woodpigeons during this time, whilst at a national level, species such as song thrushes and starlings have declined alarmingly.

So, a plea to those landowners who permit this activity – take away the permission you gave to these people to come onto your land with their guns, and don't let them come back. Their actions are illegal, cruel and distressing.

FROM THE VICARAGE

Canon John Fellows, who has served this group of churches in recent years, is about to retire. John has taken services in all the churches in the group. His sermons have brought laughter and also serious reflection, and have been greatly appreciated. He has also been part of the work that we have undertaken to try to forge greater links between the church and the communities, through his contribution to Bible Studies, Lent courses and discussions. He has made a significant contribution to the life of these parishes, particularly at West Wratting and Weston Colville. His last Sunday is 17 April at 10am at St Andrew's, West Wratting. This is going to take place whilst I am away and I am grateful that the Archdeacon of Cambridge will be there to preside. After the service there will be refreshments. If you would like to contribute to a gift for John, Roger Whitehead at Weston Colville is organising this.

John's retirement leaves a gap in the ministry team which we hope to fill in the near future. This has made us look again at where the best place to house the ministry in the group is. There are three vicarages, at Balsham, Little Abington and West Wratting. Looking at where the balance of work arises over past years, it has been clear that the two places where there is most call on the time for an appointed priest are Balsham and Abington/Hildersham.

For a number of reasons, it has been decided that I should move to Balsham and we should seek a house-for-duty priest to live in Little Abington. This places the full-time post in a more central location in the group and it keeps a priest in the Abingtons. I will continue to be the priest in charge, and will have someone in place to help. This will release me to focus more on West Wickham, Weston Colville and West Wratting than I have been able to in the past.

The reality of the reduced numbers of priests, alongside the financial burden of covering ministry costs, has been evident to observe in the development of my own role as priest in charge of first three and then seven churches. It would be easy to view this with dismay. However, we have worked hard, in the team and in the churches, to make the best of working together. From the Six Parish Annual Report (which can be found at the back of the church and on the website), you can see that with the current arrangement of working together there have been many opportunities for mutual support. There are some things that we have been enabled to do because we are working as a group of churches rather than just focusing on a single parish. A case in point is the 7 church choir. Working together gives a sustainable model for church life and growth across all the parishes. We are aided in this by the time given by Rev Kathy Bishop and Very Rev Keith Johnson and by the licenced lay minister, Mr Steven Wheeler, and the two authorised lay ministers, Mrs Rosemary Mead and Mr Keith

You are welcome to share your hopes, dreams and any concerns, with me, the churchwardens and PCC members, who will be part of a consultation process to appoint the new house for duty priest.

The Church Annual meeting this year will take place on Thursday 14 April at 7.30pm in St Mary's Church, West Wickham.

NATURE NOTES

Unquestionably the highlight of the month comes from Trevor and Carol, who have been sitting watching a group of redpolls feeding on sunflower kernels in their garden, for several days in succession. As far as we are aware this is a first appearance in West Wickham of this small finch with its red crown, streaked back, small black chin patch and, in some cases, a yellowish beak. These birds are more common further north, especially in the summer months, so I expect they will be leaving the village soon, without having had the good grace to visit our garden, only 200 yards away. I have to admit to feeling slightly envious.

Di, however, is more positive. "It's that time of year when we wait for the first sights and sounds of the summer visitors, warblers and swallows returning to our village from Africa. Last year we saw the first chiffchaff on 23 March and the first swallow on 4 April, not so far away. Already people have seen reed buntings around and the wintering thrushes, redwings and fieldfares, are gathering in large flocks on the fields to depart for Scandinavia and Russia. After last month's mention of house sparrows, several people have told me that they have some in their gardens, which is good news. Mrs Dockerel tells me she saw a barn owl sitting on a post at the crossroads recently, and had a grey squirrel on her windowsill which made her jump. Steve saw a pair of red kites, and we have seen common snipe on the very wet field opposite Pete. The rooks are back on their nests on the A1307 and making a lot of noise about it. They are often to be seen in the fields displaying to each other by throwing their heads back and cawing loudly. They can be seen flying with large sticks in their beaks, to add to the already untidy heap of sticks that make up their nests.".

Herons continue to be sighted at both ends of the village and in fact my neighbour, Brian spotted two standing in the field behind us the other day. This is quite unusual as they are generally solitary, except in the breeding season of course, when they build nests very much like the rooks described by Di.

On the wildflower front, we were walking around Thriplow recently, where the daffodils are all in flower, but for me the highlights were a couple of clumps of coltsfoot in flower, with their leaves wrapped round the stem like someone hugging themselves to keep warm in the cold wind. I noticed another patch of coltsfoot on the roadside between Haverhill and Withersfield as I was driving home the other day. Di wrote "Despite the wet ground, the arums, lords and ladies, jack in the pulpit, whatever you call them are coming up everywhere. Tiny weeny blossom buds are on the dark branches of the blackthorn waiting to burst, the sticky buds of the horse chestnut are swelling and the cheerful yellow celandines are now showing in a ditch near you. In Norfolk last weekend we even found some greater stitchwort in flower".

Len Ling told me that there have been signs of badger activity near the allotments again. Quantities of ivy and other vegetation have been dragged into the culvert there, presumably as bedding material. Unfortunately we had an awful lot of rain on Wednesday last week, which must have cast some doubt on the wisdom of building a residence in a drainage channel. There are probably a few human builders who can take a lesson from this badger's experience.

LINTON AND SAWSTON GP PRACTICES AN UPDATE ON THE MERGER.

The two partnerships merge on 1 April to form Granta Medical Practices. Our computer systems will then merge on 20/21 April. This is a huge piece of work for which we have been preparing for quite some time.

Both Sawston and Linton sites will be closed from 1 pm on the 20 April (Wednesday) until mid-day on the 21 April. All calls will be diverted to the out-of-hours service that will provide emergency medical cover during this period.

Both practices will close their computer systems down by mid-afternoon on the 20 April with all electronic lab results and hospital letters having to be checked and filed – quite a task for the GPs. The merge will then run overnight. Any forward bookings for appointments at Linton site will not transfer and Linton will aim to minimise forward bookings as much as possible in the run up to the merge. On the morning of 21 April we will need some time to check that everything is working as it should and our reception staff will manually input all the pre-booked appointments for Linton. By mid-day we hope to have this work completed and we will be ready to resume normal service.

As always, we appreciate the support of all our staff and also the support and understanding of our patients as we prepare for the future. The next update will come from Granta Medical Practices – the culmination of several years of hard work and collaboration between the GPs and practice staff.

CRIMEWATCH

There have been a number of shed break-ins reported in this area recently, with lawnmowers, hedge trimmers and other garden equipment stolen. In light of this Cambridgeshire Police ask you to please consider this security advice:

- Install security lighting positioned out of arms reach.
- Deny easy access to your rear garden with lockable gating and fences.
- Lock your shed and consider a shed alarm these can be purchased at Sawston police station for £8.
- Mark your property to make it less desirable to sell on and easily identifiable as being stolen property, for example use bright coloured paint displaying your post code.

BROADBAND UPDATE

Burton End Cabinet Installation:

Connecting Cambridgeshire state there is no change to the December 2016 date and are still unable to advise when work on the physical installation will commence.

BT OpenReach:

Followers of BT OpenReach's online service may have noted that the status to bring Superfast Broadband to West Wickham has been downgraded from an "In Scope" status to "We are exploring solutions". In plainspeak BT OpenReach describes these statuses respectively as "We have a plan" and "We have no plans, there is no BDUK funding, we will help you develop your own solution".

Connecting Cambridgeshire have assured me this is an unfortunate error, that there is BDUK funding and a solution is in progress but are unable to get BT OpenReach to correct its contradictory public position.

Air Broadband:

By now all those who signed up will be aware that as of 15th March Air Broadband's plans had to be put on hold as BT OpenReach want an extra £4,800 in Excess Construction Charges to bring fibre broadband to the property in Horseheath which would be our link to the outside world. This additional cost has come as some surprise and means that the scheme may no longer be viable at the installation and monthly charges and minimum subscriber level initially set. Air Broadband have contacted Lucy Fraser and Connecting Cambridgeshire to ask for help in waiving these charges - the least BT can do after the repeated delays and broken promises made to West Wickham residents. I will do the same as these charges are unreasonable given that Horseheath's cabinet was recently upgraded with a fibre connection with BDUK funding less than a year ago. BT OpenReach have stated in their report to Air Broadband that for technical reasons, the fibre will have to come from a location towards Haverhill approx 1.3km away instead of the approx 400yards from the cabinet in Horseheath.
