# SEEKING NEW CHAIRMAN FOR VILLAGE HALL COMMITTEE

After five years at the helm, I recently decided to step down as Chairman of the West Wickham Village Hall Committee, with an aim of handing over in time for the AGM in October. The reason for this decision is partly one of increasing work commitments, but also, its time for someone else to bring new ideas and energy to the Committee.

Over the last few years the Committee has undertaken a programme of repair and maintenance on the Hall, including resurfacing the car park, refurbishing the floor, installing new strip lights, replacing heating fans and repainting the inside. We have also eliminated much of the paperwork, having introduced a website with online booking, and using online banking for invoicing and bill paying. A structural survey of the Hall was recently performed, to give us an idea of future maintenance requirements, and the findings were very positive; the Hall was built well and is lasting well.

In a nutshell, the Hall is in great shape, and solvent, with a reasonable cash buffer for future maintenance and replacement of equipment. The Hall is widely used and appreciated by many in West Wickham and the surrounding villages, and is a real village asset.

DIG 3 – STREETLY END 16 & 17 July

In 2015 we confirmed this early settlement around the church and that this was probably built over by the re-building or extension of the church itself in the 14thc. # CONNECTING CAMBRIDGESHIRE AND BT OPENREACH VILLAGE MEETING

Thank you to all those who attended and supported the meeting on 16 May, as well as those who emailed me apologies, thoughts, questions and support. Your support was very much appreciated and noticed - I counted over 40 attendees. I would also like to thank Noelle Godfrey from Connecting Cambridgeshire and Martin & Carolyn from BT for their talks and for answering questions. Carolyn will the BT manager responsible for overseeing the installation of the new broadband cabinet in the village.

I presented a brief history of broadband in the village, the delays and occasions we have been let down and the little faith residents have that the December 2016 date for Superfast Broadband will be met. The latter was tellingly illustrated during the Q&A session at the end when an attendee asked all residents who thought the December date would be met to raise their hand and the only hand raised was that of Martin.

Noelle Godfrey spoke about Connecting Cambridgeshire, how it is funded (local and national government) and its goal of bringing Superfast Broadband to areas of Cambridgeshire not considered commercially viable for providers such as BT OpenReach. The reasons for the delays to West Wickham were put down to the dates being estimates that were progressively revised as the difficulties in providing a solution to West Wickham became apparent. She assured attendees that the new single cabinet solution, known as a Onesie, is the solution for West Wickham and it is planned to be in place by the end of December 2016. The incorrect broadband upgrade status for residents on BT OpenReach's website, as well as that reported by other major ISPs, is because the website is a national website and only can reflect the status of existing cabinets.

Martin followed up by providing the designation of the new Onesie cabinet (West Wratting R1), whose status we should be able to track online. He also gave the current schedule for the upgrade: the cabinet is currently in the planning stage which is expected to be completed by the end of June. Following this, a survey will be done during July and August to establish the optimum location for the cabinet that will permit the maximum number of residents to receive Superfast broadband. Following the survey's completion, physical installation is expected to commence in September with the cabinet being open for orders before Christmas. On average, orders can take up to two weeks to complete so I would expect the cabinet to be open for orders at the start of December for us to have decent broadband through BT OpenReach infrastructure this Christmas.

While dates cannot be guaranteed due to the possibility of unforeseen circumstances (skeletons, historic finds, tree roots and collapsed ducting have been known issues to cause delays in the past), Martin remained confident that the new Onesie will be in place and accepting orders by December 2016. Speeds residents would be able to attain would vary according to their distance from the new cabinet, although all residents should be able to receive speeds above 10Mbps with the majority capable of receiving speeds in excess of 23Mbps and those closest to the cabinet up to 76Mbps. Exact speeds would depend on your ISP and selected package. However, since the exact location of the new cabinet location is unknown estimates cannot currently be provided.

Through modelling, Burton End has currently been identified as the best location although this was also speculated to be because Burton End is the primary distribution point for the copper lines to the village to enable re-use of existing copper cables despite their known poor condition. A location further down the village would require BT OpenReach to lay new copper cables back up the village towards Burton End.

Residents not upgrading to Superfast broadband will not see any improvement to their existing broadband speed, although Martin was unsure whether their reliability would be improved. Martin did say that part of their installation mandate is to ensure that existing services were not to be disturbed.

The remainder and majority of the meeting was spent answering the many questions raised by residents. The dominant question was why Connecting Cambridgeshire could not fund the additional fibre charges imposed by BT OpenReach on Air Broadband. These unprecedented charges to Air Broadband are a result of the Horseheath cabinet having insufficient capacity requiring fibre to be brought from another cabinet towards Haverhill and substantially further away. Unfortunately, under existing rules Connecting Cambridgeshire are unable to fund projects to bring broadband to areas which are already covered through an existing government funded broadband project. BT OpenReach were awarded the contract in March 2013 to provide superfast broadband to the region. However, this does mean that properties still too far away to receive broadband from the new cabinet will be able to obtain their own individual voucher to fund the installation of alternative broadband, such as satellite broadband, at the property.

There is no penalty associated with failure of BT OpenReach to deliver on time, nor does BT OpenReach have to account for how the awarded funding is spent to fulfil their obligations. However, I was encouraged by the fact that Noelle Godfrey offered to return to a meeting in September regardless of the status of the project and promised to have her team provide monthly updates regarding the project's status. I will also continue to provide broadband updates through the Village Voice when appropriate. If you have any questions, please email either the list or myself.

Air Broadband: The Air Broadband scheme is still on hold, although BT OpenReach have informed Lucy Fraser they will not reduce their charges and Connecting Cambridgeshire's position on providing the additional funding has been clarified as above. Air Broadband's shortfall will be made up of either a loan or gift, and there is the possibility of an increase to their monthly charges. Further information is expected at the Parish Council meeting on 23 May.

# **NATURE NOTES**

Insects outnumber all other members of the animal kingdom added together but in our part of the world many are only just emerging into active life at this time of year.

The butterflies that overwinter as adults have been around for a while, but the first butterfly I look for to emerge from chrysalis form in the spring is the orange tip. This year my impression is that they are abundant. In the last two weeks I have rarely been for a walk and not seen them flying alongside hedgerows and woodland edges. Only the males have orange tips to their wings, but the females are also out now so if you see an orange tip pursuing another white butterfly we all know what that means. They lay their eggs on lady's smock (cuckoo flower) for choice or alternatively garlic mustard (Jack by the hedge), both of which are available at present. On a recent walk at Fulbourn Fen nature reserve I saw scores of orange tips, brimstones and a single holly blue which obligingly came to rest and folded its wings just enough to reveal its pale blue underside. Another butterfly which can be seen at this time of year is the green hairstreak. I have looked for them on the Devil's Dyke without success but they have been seen on Fleam Dyke.

Although we are not yet in the wasp season, the queens have hibernated and are now looking for nest sites. Our largest wasp species is the hornet, recognised by its tawny brown and dull yellow colours. Two queens have been seen by Andrew and Janet recently, so look out for a hornet's nest in a dead tree near you.

One insect I like to see at this time of year is the humble St Mark's fly with his laboured flight and dangling undercarriage. Walking alongside Rands Wood recently the air was full of these harmless creatures who had missed their traditional Saint's Day emergence (25 April) by a couple of weeks. They seemed unconcerned by this.

Insects are vital pollinators but also a key part of the food chain, particularly at this time of year when nesting is in full swing and soon birds will be feeding their young. We currently have a robin's nest inside our shed. It means our shed is virtually out of bounds. Gardening tools and mower have had to be removed to ensure minimum disturbance. Incubation seems to have been proceeding for a while now so hatching is anticipated within the next few days. At the front of the house starlings hatched out some time ago and are noisily making short and messy work of the food in our feeders. We had a brief visit to our garage from a couple of swallows (possibly from the same family that nested two years ago) but after a bit of twittering they decided not to stay on.

I had an interesting message from Linton resident Rob McEwen who noted Di's redstart from last month and informed me that he had seen a black redstart on the Linton Water Tower. Black redstarts are common in mountainous areas but have been known to nest in tall buildings in cities. However it seems this one decided to move on. Rob said that he was particularly hoping to see Spotted Flycatchers in the area. This is a declining species and is the subject of a survey locally, see separate article.

Mammals have the last word. Trevor and Carol had a hare in their garden last week. Let's hope it wasn't nibbling too many of their orchids.

#### SPOTTED FLYCATCHERS

Do you have this increasingly rare bird breeding in your garden?

Spotted flycatchers are attractive little migrant birds which are summer visitors to UK village gardens and churchyards.

Although they breed with us, they spend ten months of the year travelling between here and their wintering grounds in Southern Africa. This is an increasingly dangerous journey for them, and sadly they are in deep decline.



Widespread losses amounted to a 50% decline during 1995-2010, continuing an 88% decline since 1970.

Only some fifty pairs remain breeding in Cambridgeshire, so it's now quite a rare bird, but most rural villages still have a pair or two. The Cambridge Bird Club is running a survey this year to find and monitor nesting pairs, and it's almost certain that there will be additional pairs in our villages of which they are not aware.

# MEADOW SCHOOL NEWS

The summer months are upon us and by now you can usually hear shrieks of laughter and joy, amongst the noise of splashing and 'kick' being shouted by the swimming teachers. This year our swimming season has been delayed by severe structural problems! As a school, we have managed to find a grant to fund some of the work, but not enough to fund all that's needed. In the past schools with a swimming pool were given money from the Government to help maintain them. This central funding ceased some years ago and since then, it has been left to schools to find the money needed from their very tight school budgets.

Why not just close the pool down? The answer is simple, teaching swimming saves lives and teaching children to swim 25m is a requirement of the National Curriculum. We looked into the option of closing our pool and paying to bus one year group of children for 6 weeks to a local pool but not only does this not ensure everyone has access to this necessary skill, it is not cost effective. The Meadow has taught swimming for years. In fact, Chris Walker-Hebborn who swims for our country and is soon off to the Rio Olympics, was a pupil and swam in our very pool! Imagine if we can inspire more children to follow their dreams, or even just learn such an important life saving skill.

We have an amazing community and group of parents behind us. They have started a campaign to save our pool and already have raised £4000 of the £10,000 needed. They recently to join me in repainting the pool. By the time you read this we will hopefully be just starting swimming; due to the delay, we have decided to continue teaching into the autumn term and are also planning to open the pool over the summer holidays and some weekends to ensure we make the most of it. Lots of other things have also been going on! Our Y6 children have taken their SATs, which were considerably harder than in previous years. The children took it all in their stride, and with the help of the Teaching Assistants who came in early to cook breakfast to set them up for the day we were able to keep the stress levels down and disruption to a minimum. We find out in July how the children have done. Whatever the results, we will be very proud of our children and the effort and perseverance they have shown!

We recently took a team of Y5 children to the Cambridge maths challenge. George, Kristen, Aisha and Ted worked incredibly well together as a team. Through 14 rounds they tackled a wide range of problems and challenges. Out of 18 teams, we finished  $3^{\rm rd}$ , only one point off  $2^{\rm nd}$  place!

We also took 4 teams to St. Neots for a cross country relay race. Our girls teams finished  $53^{rd}$  and  $63^{rd}$  out of 103 teams and our boys finished  $15^{th}$  and  $76^{th}$  out of 130 teams. The children really did perform well. The team spirit, encouragement and shouting was second to none. We were even more proud when we discovered our Boys B team had been the first in that category to cross the line and Archie, Edward, Jacob and Eddie all won a medal.

# LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

Henry Morris, Secretary of Education for Cambridge (from 1922 to 1954), was the pioneer for village colleges. His ideals were based on schools being at the heart of their local communities to support lifelong learning. An extract from his 1925 paper proposes: 'There would be no 'leaving school'! – the child would enter at three and leave the college only in extreme old age... The village college could lie athwart the daily lives of the community it served; and in it the conditions would be realised under which education would not be an escape from reality, but an enrichment and transformation of it.'

I have been fortunate to work at four village colleges in Cambridgeshire. I am proud that the 'cradle to grave' learning philosophy of schooling still rings true at LVC 79 years after its opening, with two-year-olds on site at the Linton Granta Playgroup and older local residents benefiting from the school's facilities at evenings and weekends. However, while there has been a historical reputation for a thriving and varied programme of adult education at Linton Village College, its profile and participation numbers have dwindled in recent years.

With a wealth of other learning opportunities locally and online, it is perhaps unsurprising that we have seen the volume of adult learners decline. And yet, while some village colleges have ceased adult education provision due to lack of viability, other schools' programmes, such as Sawston Village College's, remain buoyant. We are keen to rejuvenate LVC's adult learning provision to make it sustainable and to ensure that it meets the needs and interests of the local community. Central to this is having the support and commitment of local residents and someone with expertise to drive it.

We are looking to appoint someone on a part-time basis to lead adult education at LVC and to provide the necessary energy, enthusiasm and skills to make it a vibrant aspect of village life once again.
