### NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN NEWS

Housing Needs Survey. The Survey forms were distributed to each household in the parish by members of the Working Group during January and February. A total of 172 survey forms were delivered and by 16 February 115 had been completed and handed in, this is a return of nearly 67%. The completed forms have been sent to ACRE for evaluation and it is hoped that the results will be available in mid March. If you still have a completed form to hand in please place it in the post box in the old telephone box in West Wickham or drop it into the letterbox at 49 Burton End.

Working Group Meeting. A brief meeting of the Group was held on 14 February. It was agreed at the meeting that the next activity for the Working Group will be to carry out a Character Assessment of the parish. This will help to develop a policy in the Plan that will provide guidance on the nature of any future development; this will have special regard to size, materials and character. ### PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the meeting held on 23 January the following items were issues which were discussed. The draft Minutes are available on the notice board by Platts Farm.

Matters arising:

- 1. Dean Road hedging and the grips at the West Wickham cross roads nothing has been done yet and it will be raised at the Parish Forum meeting on 25 January. (Ed. The grips have now been done)
- 2. Signage repairs: Again nothing yet done and will be raised on 25 January.
- 3. Pavements: The roads have been swept but the County Council Highways Dept will not be sweeping the pavements. A Community Volunteer scheme to organise volunteers to sweep the pavements when necessary and a similar scheme for cutting back hedging and lopping overhanging branches was suggested. See left.

Finances: The budget and precept were set for 2017/18: The Chairman felt that it was unnecessary to increase the precept this year and it was agreed and voted on that it remain at £11,000. The budget was discussed and it was agreed that £1000 would be allocated as a contribution to a Parish Speed Indicator.

Neighbourhood Plan: 31 residents had attended the Dropin meeting on 14 January.

Maintenance:

- 1. Gritting: The fact that Councillors had been out gritting the pavements had been noticed and appreciated. 2 more yellow grit bins were needed, one for Streetly End and the other at the junction by the Post Box and these will be ordered. An item will go into Village Voice asking for volunteers to help, particularly in Streetly End.
- 2. Speed Indicator: Cllr. Hall had looked into the cost to be shared with Shudy Camps, Castle Camps and Balsham which would be approx £1000 per village, this had been allocated in the Budget. It will be discussed with the other parishes involved at the Parish Forum.
- 3. Flooding: Cllr. Hall has written a letter to landowners pointing out the problems of flooding roads which turn to ice in winter when ditches on their land are not cleaned out. Also included was a pamphlet put out by the County Council on "The rights and responsibilities of a riparian owner".
- 4. Village Sign: This needs some repair work doing to its base where the brick work is breaking up. Tom Licence will be asked to look at this

Parish Nurse: Cllr. Licence said the cost of employing a Parish Nurse for the seven parishes was £66,000 to cover a period of 3 years. It was agreed to leave any decision for the present.

Report by Dist.Cllr. Fraser:

- 1. South Cambs DC have set up a housing company called Ermine Street Scheme, buying property which is let out on the commercial market. This generated a £50,000 contribution towards council services this year. 150 houses have now been purchased.
- 2. City Deal. There are plans to have a corridor between Haverhill to Cambridge to include a bus priority route and to provide a Park & Ride site at Four Wentways.

The next meeting will be held on Monday 27 March.

#### **BROADBAND UPDATE**

Unfortunately BT OpenReach have remained true to form and there are further delays with the cabinet at Burton End (designated West Wratting 5) being ready for Superfast broadband orders. The earliest date provided by Connecting Cambridgeshire for this is now early March. To keep updated on progress and receive a notification when the cabinet goes "live" (open for orders), send an empty message to <br/>broadband-request@westwickham.org> with the subject "subscribe" to subscribe to the resident's only Village Broadband subscription list.

On the positive side, the cabinet on the Common Road (designated West Wratting 1) went live for FTTP (Superfast broadband delivered into your property over fibre) orders for residents at the top of Burton End around the 15 February. This was unknown to Connecting Cambridgeshire and unannounced by BT OpenReach. Please go to https://www.dslchecker.bt.com and enter your phone number to check whether FTTP is available to you. You will see WBC FTTP in the list of featured products.

FTTP provides a lossless and reliable medium for broadband connectivity and while not all ISPs provide FTTP, the monthly cost is comparable to FTTC (even cheaper if bundled with line rental with certain ISPs). BT are not the only provider of FTTP Superfast broadband, so please shop around for an ISP that will fit your pocket while providing you with a decent customer service. Ask around (neighbours/friends/etc) for personal recommendations.

The delay to cabinet 5 is due to the need to replace some of the telephone poles because of concerns about the additional weight of the fibre cables and the additional copper bundles. Yes, new copper cables are being brought into West Wickham, although it is not known whether this is to increase the number of lines or replace some of the faulty lines.

The commissioning of cabinet 7 opposite the Village Hall, which went "live" in early January, was unfortunately not a smooth process for the majority of residents. However, I am pleased to report all issues reported to me have finally been resolved.

Please continue to report issues to your ISPs and/or telephone provider, regardless of which cabinet you are being connected to, and let me know if possible since Lucy Frazer, our local MP, has become involved. To inform Lucy Frazer directly, please email your details to Rachel Jeffery, part of Lucy's team, at rachel.jeffery@parliament.uk. You will also need to provide your consent for Lucy to act on your behalf.

I also advise you to go to http://speedtest.btwholesale.com and follow the instructions to run the performance test if you think you are having problems with your broadband (ADSL/FTTC/FTTP). If a fault within BT OpenReach's network exists, this test will help diagnose the issue and eliminate network contention issues - we all share the fibre optic cable from the cabinets back to the West Wratting exchange, so during periods of heavier "village" use your speeds will be slower. Take note of any fault numbers reported and provide these to your ISP when reporting these faults.

#### NATURE NOTES

Our roads and settlements are human constructions, but they have been imposed on a pre-existing world of animals, and it's nice sometimes to be reminded of this, as Sue and I were the other evening when driving back home after the Local History Club and we had to slow down for a young badger who was trundling across the road from April Cottage to the White Hart. (No chance of a pint - they closed 60 years ago). Apparently they are regular visitors to April Cottage, clearing up under the bird feeders to take advantage of human generosity. Sadly I have also noticed two dead cousins of this local resident on the roads recently. Following Trevor's lead, I have erected a trail cam to find out a bit more about what goes on during the hours of darkness, and have been rewarded with numerous pictures of a fox (or foxes) going backwards and forwards at the bottom of our garden. Fortunately it was during the hours when the chickens were locked safely away. I'm hoping that some other creatures will walk past the camera one of these days - maybe a hare, as we are now in the season of madness and I have noticed a couple in fields recently, although still apparently sane.

We are on the verge of spring and things are on the move. Robins have been seen pairing up instead of sparring aggressively – in Di's garden and Len's allotment; Connie reports blue tits investigating the nest box; collared doves are promenading in pairs. Di's robins have been running rings round a blackbird over the meal worms that have been put out. One attracts its attention while the other grabs the prize. Meanwhile up in the trees some bird species have begun singing – notably the song thrush which can be heard most mornings, high in a tree at the Old Vicarage, but Di also reports great tits and chaffinches in full voice. I haven't heard a blackbird's song yet this year – perhaps because a lot of the blackbirds around at present are still the winter visitors from northern Europe.

The early plants have been coming into flower – there are some wonderful displays of snowdrops and winter aconites to be seen locally, although by the time you read this they may be nearly over. Good places to see them are at Wandlebury, in the woods beside the river near Hildersham, at Fulbourn Fen nature reserve and locally alongside Dean Road. Di has also seen violets and primroses out in some sheltered spots.

I hope a few people in the village did the Big Garden Birdwatch at the end of January and perhaps had one or two unusual visitors. There have been some unusual 'spots' this month. Di and Steve saw a pair of stonechats up by the warehouse, a heron sits in the field behind Ann's house and Connie has seen a fieldfare in her garden. Mick informed me that the little egret is still around near the Roman Road and he spotted it recently standing within a few yards of a buzzard. The two were facing in opposite directions taking no notice of each other, like two embarrassed people waiting at a bus stop. A disappointment for me on the day of the BGB was the lack of long-tailed tits. Last week they made up for it as eight of them completely covered the nut feeder like a swarm of feathery insects.

March is a time with so much to look forward to, so let me know if you see the first brimstone butterfly, or hear the first chiffchaff or find frogspawn in your pond.

### GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES AND BARLEY PRACTICE PLAN TO MERGE IN APRIL

The Partners of Granta Medical Practices and Barley Practice have taken the decision to merge the two partnerships. On 1 April the Partners intend to merge the contracts too. Both Granta and Barley are strong practices and very well respected in the local health community; the merger will build on that strength and ensure patients continue to receive the best possible service in the future.

Granta and Barley deliver services to around 26,000 patients and 7215 patients respectively. We have been in discussions together for the last two years about how we can meet the challenge of improving healthcare with the problems facing the NHS at the moment. The merger of Sawston and Linton has enabled us to recruit 2 Emergency Care Practitioners (paramedics), helping us improve care to the frail and elderly in their homes. Working with South Cambridgeshire District Council we are about to have patient advocates in the practices to assist patients to get access to all the community services available. The Mental Health trusts are placing Community Psychiatric Nurses in the practices giving our patients direct access to these services. These are just a few of the services we will now be able to offer directly rather than referring to other organisations. Granta will be the first Primary Care Home in the region. This will mean that community services will begin to be delivered directly through the practice rather than through another agency or secondary care. This is not a cost saving exercise: there will be no reduction in staffing levels and in fact all partners are investing in this merger as a means of building on the services we provide to our patients and securing a strong future for general practice in South Cambs.

Initially, we suspect that patients will notice very little difference! Patients will be able to choose to attend any site. All sites will continue to provide all the current services for patients and, over time, we hope to be able to provide more services shared between the sites. An example would be extended 8-8 opening hours: neither practice could comfortably offer such extended hours alone, but together that becomes more feasible and is certainly a better option than having to travel to Chesterton for out-of-hours care or to Stevenage for the Barley patients. There are many opportunities for the future, but in the very short term the aim is to secure a sustainable future for delivering GP services to both Granta and Barley patients.

On 26 April the patients' records and computer system will merge and this will require both practices to close from 1pm on 25 April and open again at 1pm on 26 April. The out of hours service will be available to our patients during this time.

As always, we appreciate the support and interest of our patients and both Practice Managers are very happy to respond to your comments.

#### BE SAFE AND WELL

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service are committed to supporting the safety and wellbeing of residents in all of the communities that we serve. Safe and Well Visits and Home fire safety checks are available to those who are most vulnerable in our community. This may include those who smoke, have a disability or mental health problems and are prioritised according to individual risk.

The Safe and Well visit will provide us with sufficient information to support you and, with your permission, refer you to selected partner agencies who will be able to support you further. We will not share your data with marketing companies or for other purposes. Our visit will last no longer than 60 minutes and is completely FREE of charge. Our visit will assess five key elements:

- 1. Fire safety in the home including cooking, general safety and escape plans.
- 2. Falls prevention including simple remedial action such as replacing lightbulbs or taping down loose carpet.
- 3. Alcohol use Alcohol related illness in the over 65s is on the increase. We can provide you with helpful information.
- 4. Stay well and warm Can you afford to heat your home? Do you have access to a hot meal? Do you have access to all the services available to you?
- 5. Crime reduction We can provide advice on making your home more secure in addition to advice to make you less vulnerable to scams or fraud.

You are under no obligation to answer any questions that you do not want to, but the more information you provide us with, the better we will be able to support you. We can also provide advice in relation to promoting the health and safety of individuals with hoarding concerns, as well as providing valuable information to care providers.

You can find out if you or a family member or friend are likely to be eligible for a free home fire safety check by completing a short online questionnaire. 

### MEADOW SCHOOL NEWS

Ever heard the phrase, 'Be careful what you wish for'? Well we experienced this recently when we received 'the call' at lunchtime on a Wednesday from Ofsted to say they were coming the next day for a 2 day inspection. As we had been waiting for this we immediately put our plan into action. The staff were amazing, rallying around to support each other, checking everything was tidy, helping each other to set up classrooms for the following day, gathering evidence ready and checking all of displays were looking super smart. We all had takeaway together on the Wednesday evening to settle nerves and then people started to drift away late in the evening.

Ofsted inspections can make or break a school and the people who work within it. When your school has been in Special Measures, you are being judged constantly and you know how much it means to the community and the staff to prove how much things have changed so an inspection is perhaps even more high stakes and pressurised. We had a team of 3 inspectors, who were all Secondary School specialists, not ideal for a Primary School I have to say. This added to the new far tougher inspection framework that was introduced last year, provided 2 days of extreme challenge. I won't lie; the pressure we were all under for the 48 hours was like nothing I have experienced before and knowing that people can and do lose their jobs if things don't go well was a hard thing to put to the back of your mind. The desire of each and every member of the staff team to show off what we have achieved was evident and the team effort was absolutely amazing. We were very well supported by our parental community too and inundated with cakes and food to keep us going as we worked a couple of ridiculously long days.

What I am immensely proud of is that we kept our promise of doing things for us and our children and not for Ofsted. There was no show put on that we would struggle to maintain for 2 days. We still did Forest School and trailed mud through school, we carried on as normal. We stuck to what we believe in and practice on a daily base. We were confident in these beliefs and morals and our passion for learning was clear. The children were fantastic ambassadors and also made no exceptions for the inspectors, there was absolutely no preferential treatment given in the lunch queue and the memory of the child who was incredibly sick at the feet of an inspector shall forever stay with me!

There are always going to be things that schools need to work on and anyone who thinks differently is not being honest. The problems arise when you aren't aware of these things. We have a very detailed School Improvement Plan that we write and develop each year in line with our school priorities.

I couldn't be prouder of everyone. I genuinely love my job and feel privileged to work with such a talented team and fantastic children and families. A huge thank you to the whole community for all of your support over these past few years. As I write this we are still awaiting our official report and I am unable to share the judgements with the staff (still!) or community. As soon as I am able to share the news I will!

### LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

8 March marks International Women's Day, a calendar event more commonly celebrated in other European countries. While some may question the ongoing necessity of such a day, the fact that we still witness women being denied equal rights and opportunities on account of their gender suggests that there remain equality issues that need addressing.

This year's theme, 'Be Bold for Change', is a plea for action to quash and challenge practices, laws and customs that prevent women from living full and equal lives. While it may be easy to cite international examples in which women are the victims of unfair treatment, there are also causes closer to home.

Recent gender pay gap research confirms that despite girls traditionally outperforming boys in examinations and greater numbers of women entering higher education, after a short period in their early careers, pay and promotion are very unequal for most of women's working lives. Furthermore, Harvard Business Journal highlights that only 24% of senior management roles are held by women and only 5% of executive positions. These stark statistics seem quite incongruous in 2017, as does the concept that women are literally 'worth less' in terms of an hourly pay rate.

The gender gap has dramatically narrowed at LVC. In 2016, boys' academic performance was equally matched to girls, unlike previous cohorts. Despite the results showing parity between the sexes, the profile of intervention groups appeared to confirm entrenched gender stereotypes: pockets of girls deficient in confidence and self-esteem and some boys lacking intrinsic motivation and work ethic.

Despite much progress being made in terms of gender equality, there is still work to do to counter fixed mind-sets and barriers, for the benefit of both sexes. Pervasive views about 'laddish' and 'girly' behaviours, excusatory phrases such as 'boys will be boys' and notions of 'girls' subjects' and career paths need tackling too.

While gender has become a more fluid notion in modern day society, the ambition for all people to have the opportunity to be happy and successful remains a central motivation for schooling and one that over 50 teachers meeting at LVC on 8 March will be championing.
