FROM THE VICARAGE

Six months ago Claire Gillett, our Parish Nurse, wrote a letter in the magazine introducing the new newsletter about her work in our Granta Vale Group of churches. As she explained, Claire works three days a week, on Mondays, Tuesday or Wednesday, and Thursday. She is now supported by a volunteer, Sue Buckingham, who has worked locally for Age UK. Claire has an honorary contract with our local Granta Medical Practice, with access to Linton Health Centre

Claire is in a similar position to the Chaplaincy Volunteers who work in the Chaplaincy at Addenbrookes Hospital alongside the Hospital Chaplains. She is a member of our Ministry Team, regularly meeting with us at our Monday morning prayers and our staff meetings. She makes it clear to the patients she visits that she is ready to pray with them if they ask.

Parish Nurses were first established in 1986 in the USA, and have now spread to twenty-three countries around the world. They first began here in the UK twelve years ago in 2006. The newly appointed Bishop of London, the Rt. Revd Sarah Mullally who was, before her consecration the Head Nurse of the NHS, has been a supporter of the new movement.

Thank you to everyone who took part in the Gardening Club's Annual show this year - all the exhibitors, the judges, those who came along to admire the produce on show, take part in the raffle and auction and enjoy tea and cake and of course the hardworking Committee and Club members working to make the day a success. The number of entries was the same as in 2015 but considerably down from the last show in 2016. Considering the "difficult" growing conditions the vegetable and flower classes were better than expected and somewhat surprisingly the categories with the fewest entries were not those that would necessarily have been affected by the weather: the domestic classes and the children's classes. If you have any suggestions as to how to make the Show more appealing to both exhibitors and spectators, the Committee would be very interested to hear from you. The date of the Show has moved over the years in an attempt to find the best time when exhibitors have the most produce to show and the village is not all away on holiday. The 3rd Saturday in August has, in the past, seemed to produce the best results.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the meeting held on 23 July 2018 the following items were discussed.

Matters arising:

1. *Recreation ground upkeep:* Quotes from contractors will be sought but because of the considerable cost of grass cutting other options are being looked into.
2. *Streetly End telephone box:* It was agreed to ask Lucy Cameron from Streetly End if she was still interested in heading a project to re-use the box to everyone's benefit.
3. *Allotment vacancy:* At the time of the meeting there was a vacancy but this has since been filled. One allotment is not in a good condition and the holders have been asked to clear the weeds. This may possibly become available.

Planning:

S/3130/17/F. A Champ, 15 Burton End. Amendment to plan. Supported (Permission granted)

S/0507/18/PL. M Cornish, Land west of 13 Burton End. Outline planning permission for the erection of 5 dwellings. Supported (Permission granted)

S/2248/18/VC. T Getacre. Hanger 1, Skippers Lane. Variation of condition 2. Supported.

S/1215/17/OL. W Stone. The Meadow, Streetly End. Outline planning permission for a replacement dwelling. Not supported (Permission refused).

Cllr. Harvey was thanked for the work he put into getting permission granted on S/0507/18/PL.

Finance: A full list of authorised payments is shown in the minutes posted on the notice board. It was agreed that a 2.3% increase in salary should be awarded to the Parish Clerk.

Transport – A1307 proposed dualling “Northern Option” action group update: Georgina Magin reported on this. Cambridgeshire County Council have not clarified their position regarding the proposed dual carriageway but are supporting the Strategy Board who support the other A1307 proposed changes but not the dual carriageway.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr. Sargeant told the Council that the layout of the Character Assessment would be carried out by “Red Graphics”, a design company in Sawston. Trevor

Hall had already received the first draft and the Working Group would be discussing this at their July meeting. The Chairman stressed that the Parish Council must be kept informed and also approve as they are funding this.

Maintenance:

1. *Speed Indicators (SPIDS) and Speed Watch reports:* As half the cars going through Streetly End are speeding the SPIDS have been set up there and data collected so that the Police can set up a speed trap. (Ed. To clarify the reports in last months Village Voice. The Speedwatch sessions are only an hour long, whereas the speed indicators operate for a much longer period. Therefore the data collected cannot be compared, so there is a much higher figure recorded for drivers speeding in the period monitored by Speedwatch, usually at “rush hour”).
2. *Damaged road signs:* These are gradually being repaired or replaced
3. *Plot opposite Maypole Croft owned by the Potter family:* No work has been done to clear this land and a reminder will be sent to SCDC concerning the S215 enforcement notice.

Reports by County Cllr. Batchelor and District Cllr Harvey: These are available on the website and in the Minutes.

Any other Business:

1. Overhanging hedging onto pavements – **See separate notice about this.**
2. Footpath 3 needs reinstating and also the diagonal path No.14. The footpath alongside the Village Hall rear car park needs pruning.
3. Co-option – there is still one vacancy – **See separate notice about this.**

NATURE NOTES

Many people have remarked this year on the fluctuating fortunes of the wasp family. The contrast between last summer, when barely a buzz was heard, and this, when our stripy friends have been relatively abundant, is striking. We should welcome this comparative resurgence as a force for good, even though they sometimes sting us, eat our fruit and dive into our beer. They are also pollinators and consumers of waste. We have hosted two nests in our garden and one on the roof, with only minor inconvenience to us. Meanwhile the bigger cousin of the wasp, the hornet, continues to visit Di's rotten log, scraping off the soft fibres of the wood and flying off, rather than actually building a nest in the log. Further up the road, Shirley and Derek do have a hornet's nest under their eaves - possibly a bit too close for comfort. Our pond dried up in the drought so we took the opportunity to put down a new liner. While filling it, many a wasp came to sip at the water's edge, while at the same time a microscopic insect did the same at a droplet of water on the surface of the liner. It certainly brought home the huge divergence of scale among living things.

If anyone has taken part in the Big Butterfly Count, it would be interesting to know your results, so perhaps we could start to compile some figures for West Wickham, and possibly make comparisons in future years. In my case, the results have been mixed. There have been plenty of small and large whites desperately trying to lay their eggs on my purple sprouting broccoli, and good numbers of gatekeepers, but a paucity of small tortoiseshells and peacocks. The garden has been visited by a holly blue, speckled wood, comma, small skipper, brimstone and red admiral but only the brimstone was present during my count. There have also been a couple of sightings of painted ladies in the village.

While the butterflies have been enjoying the sunshine, Di has noticed that that flowers and trees have been fast-forwarding to Autumn, despite it only being August. Several of the bigger tree species have been shedding their leaves early, and the smaller hedgerow trees are in full fruit. The mountain ash at the Village Hall look stunning with their branches laden, and it looks as though there will be a decent crop of blackberries despite the dry summer. As for the wildflowers, many have gone over but there are still some stragglers of knapweed and scabious along the footpaths. Some flowers have recovered, and Pam has a patch of pale yellow toadflax on her path.

As far as the song birds are concerned, most of them are quiet although a family of buzzards has been based in the tree in the middle of the field between us and Trevor and Carol. The young have been very noisily demanding food for several weeks even though they have left the nest. We have heard tawny and little owl noises on a few occasions recently, while Sue spotted a barn owl up by the airfield the other evening. Di mentions that blue, great and coal tits have been making use of their bird bath as a watering hole during the dry period.

The dreaded motor car continues to wreak a heavy toll of wildlife. The rain has brought out some of the frogs who had been lying low during the drought and I found one squashed, while Di found a dead mole on the road. There was also a report of a dead polecat, a slightly bigger version of the domestic ferret, found in Dean Road.
