# FROM THE VICARAGE

As December sweeps in with a fanfare of Christmas cards, carols, mince pies and mulled wine, diaries may be swiftly filled with festive occasions. As I look at my calendar I see a multitude of Christmas activities for our children, christingles and carol services in abundance, and carefully planned gatherings of friends and family. It suggests a whirligig of busy activity.

Yet, as calendars on walls, wreaths on doors and candles in homes and churches might remind us, December is also the time of Advent, an ancient season focused on waiting for Christmas. In an age of instant messaging, four weeks dedicated to waiting may seem incongruous. Yet perhaps this underlines its importance. Rather than rushing ahead to begin Christmas early, it encourages us to savour this time and prepare ourselves well to celebrate the birth of Jesus.

Advent, then, may challenge an often frenetic pace in life. It seems to say: pause; notice; give thanks. It suggests, as R. S. Thomas put it in his famous poem '*Kneeling*', that: 'the meaning is in the waiting', and prompts us to live with attentive gratitude in the present, not always striving for the next goal.

Advent is also a time when we are encouraged to recognise signs of God in our midst. When we are invited to recall that Jesus showed us God who is deeply involved with our world: creating, liberating, healing, raising from the dead and saving. In re-encountering the story of the birth of Jesus, we may be attentive to the presence of the risen Christ in our lives today.

As we then light candles, re-visit favourite carols, and share festive occasions, we also have the opportunity to pause and wait; to notice all that is good and sacred in our lives, and practice living with prayerful thanksgiving. For Advent beckons us into the depths of life and points towards the presence of the one who is *Emmanuel*, God with us.

# END OF YEAR UPDATE FROM LUCY FRAZER MP

As Christmas approaches and we near the end of another year, I wanted to reflect on the last 12 months which seem to have flown by once again.

Working with partners across the constituency, from local campaign groups to councillors and the Mayor and Government, I am delighted that projects which I have championed are now reaching fruition. The Ely Bypass, which I helped obtain Government funding for, has now been finalised. After regular meetings with BT and Connecting Cambridgeshire, open meetings with residents and regular phone exchanges, 95% of premises in our constituency now have access to superfast broadband (although I continue to press for full rollout in some of the outstanding 'not-spots'). Also, a free to use, Government backed teacher recruitment website, which I've actively pursued for 3 years, is now being rolled out nationally, having been piloted in Cambridgeshire.

I am proud to have supported a number of successful campaigns; such as helping local commuters regain a pre 9am off peak train service to Cambridge after timetable changes made it 'peak'. At every available opportunity I continue to make representations on behalf of local residents to the A1307 Strategy Board and the Greater Cambridge Partnership (GCP) about concerns relating to the A1307. In the short term, I am keen to see essential safety improvements, proposed as part of the GCP's work stream, delivered as soon as possible. I am also focused on engaging with the A1307 Strategy Board to highlight to them the significant reservations about a new dual carriage way between Haverhill and Cambridge which I know concerns many residents – I will do my utmost to continue to make sure these concerns are heard.

Also ongoing is my commitment to local schools. £6m extra funding over 3 years, owing to the 'Opportunity Areas' status I helped secure for schools in East Cambridgeshire, is now being made available in the form of grants. My parliamentary inter-School debating competition, which encourages students to develop their debating skills, is now in its fifth year. In the last 3 months I have met with all the pupils taking part and this year's final is being judged by Sir Brian Leveson.

I always enjoy meeting constituents, whether welcoming you to Westminster or seeing you at an event, group gathering or surgery. If you would like to arrange a tour of the House of Commons for yourself or a group you belong to, please do send me an email. I am always happy to arrange this and wherever possible I will try to be around to say hello and answer any questions you have.

I am extremely grateful for your ongoing support and will continue to work hard on your behalf in the coming year. If you have anything you wish to raise with me personally or would like to be added to my email newsletter distribution list please email me at lucy.frazer.mp@parliament.uk.

# **NATURE NOTES**

The seasons are a constant reference point for our nature notes. Depending on the time of year, we know what to expect from the weather, the vegetation and the movements and changing habits of living creatures. We talk about the spectacles of autumn, but 2018 should be remembered as one of the most colourful. The mild temperatures and gentle winds which have followed our warm, dry summer have produced a spectacularly golden autumn to keep our spirits high as winter approaches. Trees and hedges have been clothed in glorious yellows and firey rust, perfectly captured by the low sunlight.

Di tells me that on a recent walk along the Roman Road from Marks Grave towards the Balsham turn off, there was a magnificent display of berries. Orange spindle berries in their bright pink cases, intense red hips and duller hawthorn berries; blue/black sloes with their greyish tinge and shiny black berries of the buckthorn bush. So there is more to autumn colour than the leaves, and the berries are a welcome food source for the winter thrushes who come to gorge on this feast. Fieldfares and redwings are back now, flying out of the hedges in numbers, like falling leaves, chuckling and chortling.

Something we perhaps don't expect to see this late in the year is the continued flowering of mallow, yarrow and hogweed, all visible on the verges, and to see ox-eye daisies flowering in November is amazing.

Another unexpected autumn sighting, for both Di and me, has been bats flying as late as mid-October. We were both surprised to see them but apparently they can remain active until November provided the night temperature is above the minimum they need, when the insects they feed on are also likely to be flying. Insects, as we know, have declined markedly (when was the last time you needed to clean all those dead bodies off your car windscreen?), but at the end of October many people noticed that lots of ladybirds were coming into their houses. Ladybirds have bred well in the summer and are now seeking somewhere warm to hide out. Unfortunately many of them were the non-native harlequin ladybird which seems to be a threat to our native seven-spots. The question is, do bats eat ladybirds?

Last month I mentioned the BTO tawny owl survey. Di did her own mini owl survey at the Hub Night last month and was told by Joe that he often sees a barn owl when driving to work or out running, and Tom has seen one quartering the field opposite our house. Unfortunately we haven't, but we do hear the occasional little owl and tawny owl. Although we associate the tawny owl with the tu-whit-tu-whoo call, that sound pattern is formed from a contact call: 'ke-wick', answered by a second owl with a 'whoo-oo-oo'. Shakespeare may be partly to blame for the misconception (Love's Labour's Lost), but he does remind us that owls call out on winter nights.

Everyone is seeing red kites now - I had three over my head in the back garden the other day, one of which floated right down so we made eye contact. They have been seen flying very low over Maypole Croft and feeding on road kill near Bottle Hall. I was reminded that in the 1800s, before persecution started, they were a common sight even in London, so their recent revival is a return to how things ought to be - perhaps an optimistic sign among other less encouraging trends.

# **NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN - PROGRESS**

The Neighbourhood Plan Working Group has been meeting on a monthly basis and making progress on the development of the Plan.

The Character Assessment will soon be going to the printers with the text, maps and photographs agreed upon.

A request for a grant was submitted by West Wickham Parish Council to Locality in October to fund the first of stage activities in developing the Neighbourhood Plan and to cover the cost of the printing the Character Assessment. We received confirmation that a grant of £3991.00 was approved on 8 November.

The grant will allow us to employ Cambridgeshire ACRE to provide guidance on developing the Plan structure. It will also cover costs for printing information boards for a presentation of possible options for policies. These will address residents' proposals obtained in an earlier survey. The presentation will be in the Village Hall and will be used to get feedback for developing the final Plan.

The Grant, to fund the first stage of developing the Plan, will be available until 31 March 2019. It will be necessary for us to apply for a further grant in the next financial year to allow us to write the Plan and submit it for final scrutiny by residents before it goes to South Cambridgeshire District Council and an independent assessor for approval.

The approved Plan will then be subjected to a referendum of residents. If the referendum accepts the Neighbourhood Plan it will become an official planning document supporting the District's Local Plan. Possession of a Neighbourhood Plan will allow the Parish Council access to greater infrastructure funding for the Parish.

# WEST WICKHAM & DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB

At our meeting on Monday 19 November we were given a talk by Sean Reid who is the manager of all the gardens and land at National Trust Ickworth. I'm not sure of his exact title but he is responsible for keeping the gardens in their original Italianate style. This is not exactly a copy of those formal Italian gardens that would have been included on a Grand Tour in the 18th and 19th Centuries with their fountains and statuary but a more loose planting of clipped bushes and the occasional splash of colour.

Sean took us through the history of the estate from the early 1700s, from the walled garden and medieval church and the building of the house with its Rotunda up to the present day. At any time of the year you will be able to appreciate the planting; in spring swathes of narcissus, primroses, snowdrops and bluebells; in summer the herbaceous borders and wildflower meadows and on a winter's day the clipped yews and box, possibly covered in frost or snow. For anyone with children there is a magical, cool and dark area called the stumpery with upturned tree roots creating a weird and wonderful garden complete with its own dragon.

Our next meeting is on Monday December 17 when Zsusanna Serer will tell us about the customs and traditions of a Hungarian Christmas and we will have wine, nibbles and a raffle for 2 Beeches Nursery gift tokens, one for £25 and one for £15. Please come and join us at 7:30 in the Village Hall.

# MEADOW SCHOOL NEWS

The autumn term has flown by and the Meadow has been a hive of activity. The pace of school life is certainly not slowing down as we approach the festive season.

It is a well-known fact amongst children and staff, that we are not allowed to mention the 'C' word until 1 December. This is rather challenging as we design Christmas cards at the end of October and the Infants start to rehearse for their production from mid-November! The school is greatly anticipating the Christmas nativity 'Lights, Camera, Action'; a take on Strictly Come dancing, complete with judges, dancers and hosts, alongside the usual Christmas historical figures! Although some children will no doubt forget their lines, costumes may malfunction and children will be ill, we just know that parents, teachers and the school community will be very proud of our youngest performers.

This term we have enjoyed a special focus on reading. Mrs Butcher and the teachers have held a reading café for parents. The aim of these has been to help parents understand the importance of reading with their children, equip them with strategies and questions they can ask, and highlight the enjoyment reading for pleasure can bring. Parents enjoyed coming into school to watch a reading lesson, complete a reading activity and enjoy spending time reading with their children. It is always a good reminder to learn of the impact reading can make on a child's life. Statistics show that a child who reads for 20 minutes a day is likely to be in the 90th percentile, and that reading to a child every day puts them a year ahead of their peers who are not read to. We are very grateful to the parents and members of the community who come in to hear our children read. However, we can always use more help! If you feel like you could spare an hour to come and support this vital work, then please do get in touch via the school office. We have no requirements other than enthusiasm for reading!

Reading with children is not the only way you can serve our school community. The school governing body is currently looking for a governor with some finance background. This is a vital role in helping support the school in its improvement. If you feel that you can spare the odd hour for a meeting, and become involved in working alongside our existing governing body, then please do get in touch.

Back in November, we took time to remember the centenary of World War One. Our outdoor assembly took time to reflect on the meaning of Remembrance and holding one minute silence as the clock struck 11am. The children are always remarkably respectful during this time, wearing their poppies proudly and thinking of how fortunate we are to live in a time of peace.

A week later it was 'Children in Need', coinciding with Anti-Bullying Week. The school marked this with a collection for 'Children in Need' as well as the wearing of odd socks to recognise the importance of diversity amongst our school community. As a school, we take time regularly to discuss friendships, positive relationships and how we deal with conflict amongst us. However, it is important to take dedicated time to discuss what bullying is, and the need for children in our school to appreciate each other's uniqueness, in the hope that this will prevent bullying in later life.
