RAF WRATTING COMMON May Memorial Service Sunday 26 May

A short open air service will be held at **12 noon on Sunday 26 May** at the RAF Wratting Common Memorial to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the unveiling of the memorial stone. The last Sunday in May was chosen as it was the same day in 1943 (Sunday 28th) that the airfield was commissioned. The Memorial is dedicated to those who served at the airfield, especially the 260 who gave their lives in the cause of freedom. We look forward to seeing some of the veterans who served with XC Squadron, 1651 Heavy Conversion Unit and 195 Squadron. Cadets from 1451 (Haverhill) Squadron of the Air Training Corps will be on parade. The Memorial is situated at Weston Woods Farm, Weston Colville and all are very welcome to attend the service.

Please note – To mark this anniversary Richard Adams has kindly arranged for a fly-past and some aerobatics by an ex RAF Bulldog training aircraft. We expect the fly-past at around 12.30 but it will be dependent on flying conditions. It is intended that tea and cake will be available while we await the fly-past.

We are always pleased to hear from anyone interested in getting involved with the Airfield Memorial. With just two services per year to arrange, as well as year-round general maintenance, this is not an onerous project to assist with but is very rewarding. It is hoped that, with the continued support of people in the locality, this important memorial to our community's war effort will survive for many generations.

What a joy to be going to evening meetings in the daylight now the clocks have come forward. Spring has never felt so good in the way of colour and blossoming trees. We are in the merry month of May with Maypole dancing and outdoor pursuits.

All this indicates change and in our parishes we are experiencing different ways of drawing closer together. One of them is the Granta Vale Community Hub at Balsham Institute that meets every month on the first Thursday at 1.30 - 3.30pm where people are invited to drop in for tea and cake. It is a good way to meet new people and to see the parish nurse if there are any health concerns. Come and meet us, everyone is welcome. We also now have more cafe church services throughout the seven churches as we try to reach out to families.

All this sounds very busy but it does not have to be that way. I had a conversation with a retired vicar the other day and somehow, we got onto the subject of the busy lives. We live like hamsters on a wheel that is ever turning. In an aeroplane we are advised to look after ourselves first with the oxygen and then look after others later. In our society so many people rely on carers to help keep people in their own homes. PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 25 March the following were discussed. The full draft Minutes are available on the two notice boards.

Recreation ground upkeep: Two quotes received for cutting the grass were discussed and it was agreed CGM would be asked to do this and a quote for a 3 year contract would be requested.

Planning: S/0619/19/FL – next to 13 Burton End. Approval of matters re access, appearance etc. The Council were concerned about the colour of the roofing tiles, which were thought not to be in keeping with surrounding properties and the possible use of Maypole Croft to park cars by the construction staff. However, this is all covered in the Conditions of the application dealt with by the Planning Officer. A vote was taken and support was given. *Finance:*

- 1. Full list of authorised payments in draft Minutes.
- 2. Allotment fees These were last increased from £8 to ± 10 per allotment in 2012 and it was agreed to make an increase of ± 5 from ± 10 to ± 15 per allotment if this was acceptable to the allotment holders, who would be asked by letter.

Traffic & Parking issues: It has been noted that the car from 2 High St. is now parking further up the street following a letter being sent.

Maintenance:

- 1. Road sign repairs the 30mph signs have not been fully replaced in Streetly End. The matter will again be raised at the next Combined Parishes Meeting.
- 2. Dead beech tree in triangle at Streetly End Cllr Cornish reported that this was in bud.
- 3. Water on road at Streetly End this problem has not been resolved as yet but is ongoing.
- 4. Post Office The person interested in re-starting the Post Office appears to be no longer available.
- 5. Litter Cllr. Grieve and his team of 6 volunteers collected 20 bags of litter on a very windy Sunday morning. The Chairman thanked them for doing this.

Neighbourhood Plan: There will be a display at the Parish Meeting on Monday 3 June. The Working Group have just completed the second training session with ACRE, which covered how to write policies and the structure of the Plan.

A1307 update: Georgina Magin reported that Dist.Cllr. Harvey had been selected to go on to the Strategy Board as a representative of SCDC. The A1307 has now been included on the National major road network which means further access to funding.

Reports by Dist.Cllr Harvey & County Cllr. Batchelor: Full reports are available on the website.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 3 June at 7.15pm followed by the Annual Parish Meeting at 8.15pm.

NATURE NOTES

The corvid family is not viewed with universal approval by us humans, but I can't help loving them despite some of their slightly anti-social habits. Currently a collection of jackdaws are busy dropping twigs down various Burton End chimneys, including ours. As I write this, I am listening to frequent squawking and the occasional 'ping' as another twig hits the fire. Jackdaws (and magpies) are also enjoying sharing breakfast with our chickens, who don't seem to object to the uninvited company. I do sometimes rise up from my bowl of porridge to shoo the jackdaws away, but they soon come back. Crows and rooks have as usual been very noticeable in the fields and there have also been plenty of sightings of a fourth member of the corvid family, the jay, in recent weeks. Trevor reports having seen four of these attractively coloured birds in his garden at one time. We haven't had any jays in our garden, but a couple of recent highlights have been a yellowhammer on the hedge and a female sparrowhawk sitting on top of the pear tree, frustrated at being unable to penetrate the dense tangle of branches where the smaller birds like to take cover. The next day we saw her swooping low into the hedge opposite. In his pond, Trevor also reports a coot paying a visit. Here we are more accustomed to seeing the coot's cousin, the moorhen, who is more at home in smaller ponds than the lakes where coots are more frequently seen. It would be good to hear about life in any of your garden ponds. Ours has been relatively quiet this spring. We had some frogspawn but it seems to have disappeared - possibly eaten by mallards, who have produced a duckling next door, or maybe by moorhens or newts. Alex's pond has attracted a great crested newt - a name to strike fear into the heart of any property developer. The presence of these protected amphibians in West Wickham has been often referred to, and I would welcome a good picture of a male, complete with crest.

Many of the members of the animal kingdom that I have mentioned here are predatory to some extent. None is more so than the stoat - another visitor to Trevor and Carol's garden, possibly in vain pursuit of their chickens. I'm hoping the stoat doesn't decide to try its luck a bit further down the road. As for the herbivores, we have been lucky enough to have a couple of sightings of fallow deer recently - one moving at top speed out of Leys Wood, and there still seem to be plenty of hares about.

Many people will have noticed that the hedge alongside Blacklands Lane has been severely cut down. This was done rather late in the day, well into March, and the Parish Council expressed its concerns that this work had been done when the nesting season was under way and the hedges by no means dormant. However Thurlow Estate has assured us that as part of a higher stewardship agreement funded by Natural England this coppicing work will result in a thicker hedge growing in the long term and they have also said that next year the hedges in West Wickham which remain to be coppiced will be cut at the beginning of their programme (i.e. much earlier than this year). This year spring was particularly early, and I expect that with global warming increasing all the time, this will become a growing trend to which people and nature will have to adapt.

MORE CAR KEYING IN STREETLY END

On Friday 12 April around lunch time my sister's car was deliberately severely scratched with a sharp implement across all 4 panels. There have been several incidents of cars being damaged with sharp implements in the last few years. All have been parked by their owners half on the road and half on the pavement, juggling respect for pedestrians and tractors. All the criminal damage has been on the pavement side of the car. I write this to warn people of the risk of criminal damage being done to vehicles by someone who is either unwell or unable to communicate appropriately with the owners of the vehicles. I will be contacting the local PCSO, so if anyone has any information that is relevant I would appreciate it if they could get in touch.

(Ed. This seems to be a recurring problem in Streetly End. No matter how annoying vehicles parked on a pavement may be to someone, there is no excuse in causing expensive and criminal damage to a vehicle. The following was taken from www.askthe.police.uk. Parking on a pavement is not illegal, although driving on a pavement is and you have to drive on the pavement to park on it! However, parking a vehicle on the pavement could lead to an offence of obstruction being committed. This could result in a fixed penalty notice being issued to offending vehicles. This is because parking on the pavement can obstruct pedestrians and wheelchair users, forcing them to use the road to pass a parked vehicle. The local police will usually deal with vehicles driving on the pavement or causing an obstruction. You can contact them by phoning 101.

Whoever is causing the damage, don't - point out the problem to the driver, leave a message under the windscreen wiper or report it to the police.

Drivers - the RAC advise that if your parking will cause wheelchair users or people with prams to have to walk into the road, then you should find somewhere else to park. The pavements in Streetly End are very narrow so you should not be parking on them!)
