GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES 2020 Flu Clinics

ISSUE 208

In the wake of coronavirus, it is more important than ever to have your flu vaccination. However, with Covid-19 comes the challenge as to how we vaccinate 10,000 Granta patients in a socially-distanced manner, to ensure the safety of our patients, our staff and our local community.

Duxford Imperial War Museum has very kindly agreed to help us and we will be holding "drive-through" flu clinics on **Saturday 3 October** and **Saturday 17 October**. If you cannot get to these clinics please do not worry; we will make sure that the patients who can't attend or who cannot drive will be seen in smaller clinics at our surgeries. If you are housebound separate arrangements will be made for you.

Patients eligible for a free NHS flu vaccination include those patients who will be 65 years old before 31 March 2021, and those patients 6 months of age and up to and including 64 years of age if they fall into one or more of the "at risk" groups. Details of the "at risk" groups can be found on our website www.grantamedicalpractices.co.uk. If you are unsure if you are eligible for a free vaccination please feel free to ring us and we can let you know.

As you will have heard on the news, the government has now extended the flu programme to include everyone 50 years old and over, plus household members of shielded patients. However, NHS England wants us to prioritise the "at risk" patients first, and the new second cohort of patients will be vaccinated towards the end of the year. We will send out further details as soon as we have them. Children aged 2 years old and 3 years old are automatically eligible to be vaccinated by us. These will be done in our surgeries. Children from 4 years old to 11 years old will be vaccinated at school, unless they fall into an "at risk" category.

Appointment slots should be available to book from the end of August – keep an eye on our website for further details (see below).

Please note that you MUST pre-book your flu appointment. Please do not just turn up on the day - you will be sent away.

If you should decide to stay on and visit the museum after your vaccination please be aware that you will have to pre-book tickets in advance through the IWM website www.iwm.org.uk/visits/iwm-duxford. You will not be able to purchase tickets for the museum on the day.

We would like to say a massive thank you to Duxford Imperial War Museum for accommodating us in this fantastic community collaboration.

Pete and Rachel at The Chestnut Tree in West Wratting have been firm supporters of our Hub Nights since we started in 2017 and it is such a pleasure to be able to pop over and enjoy a chilled drink there this summer. They also have great food, if you would like to eat it is advisable to book ahead. We will keep you posted; plans are underway for a couple of great Hub nights soon. The Village Hall Management Committee has been working over the past few months to make the hall available for use following the shutdown caused by the coronavirus pandemic.

This resulted in the initial re-opening of the hall for the use of the Daisy Chains Pre-School in July. This was achieved by a lot of effort in putting together a number of procedures that met the latest government guidelines and by using the Council Cambridgeshire County Early Years recommendations for opening the hall for pre-school use.

The Committee has now implemented the government guidelines for opening the hall for general use. This was done by using the recommendations provided by ACRE (Action for Rural Communities in England) who have been supporting Parish Councils and Village Halls during the coronavirus pandemic. The work by the Management Committee has resulted in a major revision to how the hall manages bookings and establishes procedures to maintain social distancing and hygiene standards when the hall is in use. The new documentation is being sent to all the regular hall users and will be put on the village website. It is hoped that the hall will be open for use the beginning of September following some re-decoration inside the hall.

The government has provided a number of small business grants and the Village Hall qualified for a grant of £10,000 which is being used to pay for the extra cleaning and sanitising equipment needed to meet the Covid-19 safeguarding measures.

The Government requirement says that the hall should be "Covid Secure"; this means that we are required to maintain a high level of cleanliness. The hall will be cleaned weekly but users will have to clean the parts of the hall they use before and after their sessions. Social distancing of 2 metres has to be maintained on both entering and leaving the building. The social distancing in the hall may be altered according to the nature of the activity and appropriate risk assessment. Social distancing will limit the number of people who can use the hall at any one time to thirty. Face masks will have to be worn except where there is a recognized exception.

Hirers will be required to keep details of those attending and maintain track and trace records. In the event of someone in the hall showing coronavirus symptoms they will be sent home and there is a procedure for them to be isolated in the hall if necessary and for putting the track and trace system into effect.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Coronavirus update: Thankfully, there had been no cases in West Wickham to date. Updates from SCDC are received regularly regarding any changes in procedures. Cllr Di Licence and Nicky Cornish are hopeful that, if there is a second wave ,the volunteers will still be able to help. Planning:

20/2564 – Solar Farm at the Wratting Common crossroad: This was not supported and very detailed comments were submitted to the District Council. Cllr Sargeant was thanked for his work on this

20/2565 - New dwelling adjacent to the former White Horse PH. No recommendation was made but it was not supported because of the history of this site.

Finance: Full details are shown on the draft Minutes now posted on the notice boards.

Maintenance:

- 1. Pavements: These are in the process of being repaired and resurfaced.
- 2. 30mph road markings at Streetly End: The pothole has been repaired but the red strip and 30mph marking still needs replacing.
- 3. Broken bench in playground: This will be replaced by the Parish Council.

Village Hall & Recreation ground:

- 1. Use of the Hall: Regular groups will hopefully be returning shortly and enquiries for new bookings have been made.
- 2. Football Net: One has been purchased, erected and is in use.

Zero Carbon funding: Trevor Hall (Chairman of the WWVHC) reported that the committee intends to apply for this and is obtaining quotes for renewing lighting, heating and waste disposal.

Neighbourhood Plan: Cllr Sargeant reported that the first draft has been distributed to the Parish Council for comment. The section on the development framework must be carefully written so it would allow any extension of the Village Hall if necessary.

Allotments:

- 1. Vacancy: An allotment is available to rent. (ED. See separate item)
- Replacing gate: A gate has been donated to the 2. allotment holders to replace the broken one.

Report from District and County Councillors Harvey & Batchelor: A1307 update. There have been workshops over July and August looking at specific schemes on the A1307. The schemes that drew the most concern were the proposed westbound bus lane at Linton and the loss of the rural 'hub' at Linton, but there is a chance this could be looked at later down the line. FROM YOUR LOCAL M P

So many people have helped others in so many ways during the pandemic. They have kept community spirit alive and provided vital practical assistance during the darkest days of this lockdown. I have been so pleased to have had several opportunities to meet with many of those who have gone beyond the call of duty.

I visited the Cambridgeshire Volunteer Hub to hear more about the fantastic work they did during lockdown – they have provided a valuable lifeline for our most vulnerable during the pandemic, getting groceries to the most vulnerable and providing advice and support. I also had a great time catching up with Cheryl Wilding who runs the Fordham timebank. Along with other volunteers, I helped deliver pen pal letters from schoolchildren to those who were shielding. The scheme has been a great success.

In one village I met with George and a number of his volunteers. They regularly make cakes for NHS key workers and shielded individuals. It was great to chat to them, deliver the delicious cakes and have an opportunity to try some of them! In another I helped deliver letters to shielding residents written by local school children as part of scheme to reduce loneliness during this period.

Lockdown has made all of us work and think differently. In my own office, we have had regular teleconferencing calls and I have kept in touch with local stakeholders including parish councillors, businesses groups and volunteers using Zoom. My surgeries have also gone virtual! Technology has been a lifeline in keeping us connected but I know that many of us are keen to replace safely meeting in person soon.

Shops and small businesses are re-opening and during visits to Ely it was reassuring to see the measures that people are taking to safely social distance, protecting their employees and customers. These include perspex screens, masks, sanitising stations and one-way systems. Customers are returning to shop in person and I encourage you to do the same to help support our businesses, both big and small.

The Government is now focussing efforts on maintaining jobs and strengthening the economy as we come out of lockdown. They have pledged a £160bn support package and are committed to helping keep people in work, ensure young people get jobs and bring back people into sectors hit hard by the virus. Some measures include cutting VAT for tourism and hospitality businesses, the Eat Out to Help Out scheme as well as a reduction in stamp duty. These measures will help to get us back on track.

By following the Government's advice of keeping hands clean, wearing a mask in public spaces and adhering to social distancing we can help to play our part in preventing a second wave.

NATURE NOTES

My highlight of the month has been to receive several photographs, from Carrie Styles, of leafcutter bees in action.

They show a neat pattern of semicircular chunks being bitten out of the leaves of maple and elder by the female bee; and one shot of the bee rolling a piece of leaf up like a sausage, which she will push into a crevice to use as a nest cell. Carrie tells me that the bees have been nesting in the fire pit in her garden or snuggling under



the thatch. It is good that her garden is providing a habitat for this particular pollinator.

Everyone knows how important all insects, and particularly pollinators, are to life on earth and therefore it was really encouraging to see, earlier in the summer, the ox-eye daisy meadow sown by Sarah Humphrey at Yen Hall. She told Di: 'this meadow is part of the Countryside Stewardship Scheme. The aim of these areas is to provide food for farmland birds and nectar feeding insects, including butterflies and bumblebees. The seed mix used contained phacelia, crimson clover, vetch, buckwheat and ox-eye daisies.' These areas give hope that the decline in wildflower meadows can be reversed to some extent. For Di they evoke childhood memories of such meadows where there were grasses, wildflowers and insects, including grasshoppers and crickets which they would try in vain to catch. In those days children picked wild flowers and searched for birds' nests, and while picking wildflowers is

now not allowed, it certainly gave people some appreciation and knowledge of the natural world

If you participated in the Big Butterfly Count this year you will have noticed a big contrast to 2019 when the painted lady topped the count. This year I haven't seen one! My four counts were initially dominated by meadow browns, then gatekeepers and at the end the whites have taken over so anyone growing brassicas beware. The recent rain may have dampened down the butterfly year somewhat but the whites seem to be more tolerant of wetter conditions. However I have seen some of the second brood of brimstones and small heaths, and a silver washed fritillary has visited Di's garden on three occasions.

Deer have certainly been out and about in recent weeks and many people have reported sightings in different parts of the village. We have had a number of encounters in the Hare Wood environs including one 'reverse Bambi' moment. Two adult fallow deer and a fawn were strolling through a field of barley when they spotted the dogs and me on the footpath. All bolted for the wood and the two adults made cover but the fawn panicked and turned back into the crop. Fortunately the dogs were on the lead on that occasion but the very pale coloured fawn kept popping its head up to check out the danger. It was quite distressed to have been abandoned by the adults. Presumably one of them was its mother. If so, her response to her fawn being in danger was rather un-Disney like.

Di said she spent ten happy minutes lying in the churchyard watching the family of spotted flycatchers feeding but by the time you read this they will probably have returned to Africa, leaving only the tell-tale white mark of their poo on the branch of the small tree which was a favourite launch pad. They were a treat to watch so let's hope a pair returns to our churchyard again next year. Of our other summer visitors, the swifts have already departed but swallows and house martins will remain well into September.

LINTON VILLAGE COLLEGE NEWS

It has been an exceptional year for us all, but in particular our Year 11 students who have foregone their traditional school leavers' experiences and rites of passage. While examinations are typically stressful, they are an important demarcation of the end of secondary education and capture students' academic accomplishments.

This year, the awarding of GCSEs was replaced by a Centre Assessed Grade process. This involved teachers estimating the grades that students would have achieved had they sat the exams, using their best professional judgements. Subject rankings of predicted grades were then scrutinised and moderated by subject teams and senior leaders.

Now, more than ever, it is important to recognise and celebrate students' broad educational and personal achievements. I am proud of LVC students' stoicism and resilience as their time at LVC ended prematurely. There are many examples of students who have shown exceptional determination, compassion and drive during these challenging times. All have been a delight to watch grow into exceptional young people during their time at the College. We wish them every success in the next step of their education, careers and lives.

As we enter September our focus is on fully reopening the College safely to all students and staff. Extensive planning and preparation has been underway during the summer holiday to ensure that the site and systems are ready for all of our students to return to school full time.

Many changes have had to be implemented to make this possible and to adhere to government guidance. This includes zoning the school site for different year groups, creating nomadic specialist teaching and staggering break and lunch times to reduce movement and minimise close contact between students in different year groups. This is in addition to enhanced cleaning and hygiene measures.

We are all looking forward to seeing our young people back at school and benefiting from face to face teaching again. The school community's ability to adapt and care for each other has been evident during this crisis.

LINTON LALA (Linton Area Learning Alliance)

As Covid has stopped us planning our usual course at Linton Village Hall, we are planning to use Zoom. This is free to download. You need a computer with a camera and speakers/headphones or iPad - and then sit in the comfort of your own home.

Our course will be 'Glory Days and Golden Girls' (aviation history) with Ian McLachlan as announced previously. Ian has received training in Zoom presentations and has explained to me how it works from his perspective. He has recently delivered some talks to a group in Downham Market. He gives a powerpoint presentation as he would in the hall. It shows on our screens and we hear his voice talking. We would miss the social element and chatting to each other but we can still enjoy learning about something new and keeping our brains active. Other independent groups in Cambridgeshire are encouraged to try Zoom courses too as there is the added consideration that if no courses run, then the tutors' income is affected.

The course would be 7 weeks of 2 hours starting in early October, still on Tuesdays. I am not sure of the fee yet but we would save on hall costs and tutor travelling so it should be cheaper than in the hall.

I or 'a host' would set up the meetings, send out the email invitations to participants which includes a link for you to click and you are taken into the meeting. Ian said that he could include 3 breaks within the 2 hours to allow people to move around, make coffee etc. There would also be chance to ask him questions and add comments.

You could forward details of the course to friends from other areas. You don't have to be anywhere near Linton to join it. The WEA has announced on their website that there will be no face to face courses this year. They will be all by Zoom. I would like to give it a go. Could you please let me know whether you think that you would like to take part, or ask me questions if you are not sure how it can work.
