NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN UPDATE

This year the Neighbourhood Plan Working Group has been steadily creating our draft plan using the feedback and evidence we have gathered from the community over the last five years. The main themes of our plan are protecting the character of the village, protecting the environment and providing affordable housing to meet the needs of parishioners.

The first draft has been approved by the Parish Council and has now been sent to South Cambridgeshire District Council for their initial comments. If they approve of the draft plan, we will hold a statutory consultation process next year when everyone will be invited to comment. Following the evaluation and incorporation of the consultation results, the plan will be examined and put to the Parish in a referendum.

The four "affordable" homes are due to be handed over to South Cambs District Council on Friday 11 December. They consist of a one bedroom bungalow, a two bedroom bungalow and a two bed house. The fourth one is for 70% shared ownership and is a three bedroom house.

South Cambs Housing Department will be dealing with the letting arrangements. People from West Wickham and the parishes in the immediate locale have preference for the letting of these dwellings. I do hope that local people are able to make use of this opportunity.

Meanwhile, thank you to those at that end of the village for your forbearance of the building works whilst they have gone on. Whether it be mud, parking, traffic lights etc. It has been a difficult year weather wise. The verges will be reinstated next spring.

NATURE NOTES

The natural world frequently reveals new wonders. For me, this month's revelation has been the discovery of slime mould in our garden. Slime mould begins life as an amoeba -like single cell organism but when food is scarce the cells congregate and start moving as a single body. Its appearance is a pale froth which gives the impression that some animal has been sick but on closer inspection the froth contains small black spots. Slime mould reproduces by releasing spores but is not a fungus. It is a member of the protista kingdom which is often found on mulch or, in our case, uncollected grass cuttings. It has no brain but can detect airborne chemicals, recognise a food source and find the most efficient way of reaching it. In laboratory experiments, scientists have demonstrated the ability of slime mould to find its way through a maze and to choose the best route network for finding food.

To more conventional wildlife sightings, and your two editors have given me a couple of reports. Andrew has seen a group of three native grey partridges from the footpath behind the allotments, which makes a change from the armies of red-legged varieties that we normally see these days. It would be good to receive news of any more sightings of these birds, which have declined in recent decades as their French cousins have thrived. Following last month's reference to starling murmurations, Sue had a trip to Lackford Lakes recently where there was an incredibly spectacular display with starlings joining from all directions forming a bigger and bigger group before plunging into the reeds to roost.

Di visited the Suffolk coast before the lockdown and one of the highlights was hearing the skeins of geese in the coastal sky. There is a small group of Canada geese resident on the Acre Pond at Horseheath Park who pass over here occasionally and their honking noise is uplifting but not to the extent of the huge numbers of geese that come to our coast in the winter whose cries really lift the heart.

The early part of November has been mild and at times sunny. This rather unseasonal weather has brought out the winter gnats and also some of our butterflies, awakened from their overwintering hiding places. Brimstones and small tortoiseshells have been seen. Bats also, flying at dusk on mild evenings. I was walking next to Hare Wood recently and saw a bat flying. It seemed quite a large one but not identifiable without a bat detector. Seeing bats flying at this time of year seems unusual. It may be yet another indication of our warming climate.

Despite this, winter is coming and with the recent winds most trees have lost their leaves, producing a beautiful multicoloured carpet on the woodland floor and the footpaths. Under most oak trees you will also find a large number of acorns. The trees have been producing prolifically in this 'mast' year, with one exception. The oak on the village green has had no acorns at all - there must be an explanation for this, so if anyone can provide one we would be grateful.

Another enigma this year has been the absence of our usual visit from large flocks of golden plover. Di saw a few birds in September but they usually come in numbers of 50 -100 and stay for some time in the autumn and then again in February / March. I have always assumed that West Wickham is their stopping off point between their breeding and wintering grounds. I hope they haven't found a better alternative.

END OF YEAR UPDATE FROM LUCY FRAZER MP

As we look to the end of 2020, I wanted to take this opportunity to update you on some of the work I have been doing over the course of this year.

2020 has been a challenging year for all of us and I want to pay tribute to everyone who has helped and supported their local communities and vulnerable individuals during the pandemic. The response to the public health challenge of Coronavirus saw us pulling together, ensuring that our communities across Cambridgeshire kept connected. I know that our villages are continuing their great support to others. I was pleased to safely meet with local volunteers in person across the constituency during the summer months – and to take part in regular Zoom updates with local leaders and stakeholders.

Whilst the government is focused on dealing with the pandemic, other projects are still progressing and I continue to work to improve our area. I welcome the announcement that the Department of Health has awarded Cambridge University hospitals $\pounds 1.9$ million to expedite the complete redevelopment of Addenbrooke's Hospital, which will include a new children's hospital. At the beginning of October, the Prime Minister also announced the building of a new cancer hospital. Residents across Cambridgeshire rely upon Addenbrooke's Hospital for their medical care, and population growth makes its complete replacement with a brand new hospital in the years ahead a necessity. I have campaigned hard for continued investment in NHS services in our local area, and the construction of a new hospital has my complete support.

The Greenways scheme is one of the local efforts to improve cycleways by constructing routes between central Cambridge and nearby villages. The routes will help to reduce pressure on public transport and offer more environmentally friendly ways to commute and get around. I have supported this scheme since 2017, working with the Greater Cambridge Partnership and other local stakeholders to ensure that local residents were involved in determining the routes. This currently includes 6 routes in our area. I am really pleased that the routes to Fulbourn, Waterbeach and Linton have been approved. Having recently met with the GCP and written to the Board to press for further routes I am delighted that the three further routes in Horningsea, Bottisham and Swaffhams have also been approved. I'm looking forward to using the routes and hope you will do the same!

Education has also been a key campaign pledge since I was first elected. As a result of much campaigning with teachers and others the 2021-2022 academic year will see per pupil funding increase by an average of 4%. The National Funding Formula allocations reflect a 60% increase in the total additional funding for small and remote schools. This is good news for small schools in our area, which can attract further funding due to their status

I continue to hold regular surgeries and am here to help with any issues you may have.
