### **1ST HORSEHEATH BROWNIES**



# NATURE NOTES

In November we recommended the book *Entangled Life* by Merlin Sheldrake. Unfortunately, a local muntjac fawn has taken this advice too literally and walked straight into the football netting on the playing field where, yes, he/she



became entangled. Peter Liepa happened to be walking through with his dog, borrowed a pair of scissors and cut the animal free while its mother watched on with concern. A happy outcome to what

could have been less so. Netting of all sorts can be very hazardous for wildlife - I expect many of us have disentangled blackbirds from strawberry netting. I once had an exhausted sparrowhawk flat out after a session bashing herself against the netting round our raspberries but fortunately for both of us she came back to life just before I could pick her up.

On the subject of sparrowhawks, Jan and Sandra have each had one in their gardens in Maypole Croft. Jan's had caught a pigeon, and was straddling it and beginning to pluck it, when the pigeon moved and then flew off. Bird feeders are often a hunting ground for rapacious sparrowhawks, especially at this time of year but we hope they don't wreak too much destruction, especially as recent sightings of bramblings (visitors from the far north & more colourful versions of chaffinches) and goldfinches, who have a particular liking for niger seed, have been a source of delight. I was personally very pleased to see three redwings on our lawn as people have been remarking how comparatively few fieldfares and redwings have been around this winter.

In February the bird world becomes focussed on pairing up and breeding. Traditionally, it is said that this sort of activity begins on St Valentine's Day, so we can soon expect to hear a bit more birdsong as part of the territorial and mating process. Winter has not been completely silent as robins and the occasional song thrush lift our spirits with their songs. Great tits have already begun to repeat their 'teacher, teacher' refrain so there are definitely stirrings. Birdsong is very complex and has meaning to those of us who hear it, whether we be human, bird or other living creature. A recent David Attenborough programme on his favourite sounds in nature is well worth a watch as he explains how in some species those male birds with a wider range tend to be more successful in attracting mates. For us humans however the reaction can be one of calm, elation or contemplation depending on our mood at the time.

I have changed the camera position of our trailcam in the copse at the top of our garden and was pleased to see a couple of shots of foxes and badgers, as well as four red legged partridges and a song thrush exploring the floor of this small patch of



woodland, in addition to the usual dozens of rabbits.

At the time of writing our winter this year has been hardly worth the name - the new year period producing record high temperatures for that time of year. Who knows, we may still have a cold blast yet to come, in which case Longfellow's poem *Woods in Winter* will have resonance:

'Chill airs and wintry wind! My ear Has grown familiar with your song I hear it in the opening year I listen, and it cheers me long.'

Meanwhile I look forward to spring and particularly to using my new moth trap and extending my very meagre knowledge of these insects, many of whom spend their adult lives in darkness. Watch this space.

### PEOPLE FROM THE PAST



An undated photo of West Wickham School. Judging by the fashions, this is probably early 20<sup>th</sup>c. Sailor suits for boys gained popularity from the 1890s but rural fashions inevitably lagged behind urban ones. Our earliest dated school photo from 1920 shows they had gone out of fashion by then, as had lace collars for the girls. Mitchell Elizabeth became schoolmistress in 1905 at a salary of £92 per year plus accommodation in the attached school house. Her daughter, Frances but known by her middle name of Kate, was paid £36 as assistant teacher, so this may be her with the younger schoolchildren in the photo. MEADOW SCHOOL NEWS

As the new school term begins we have lots of exciting learning planned. It is quite scary to think that this time two years ago, we were also just starting out these very same learning topics, when we were suddenly plunged into a lockdown. I don't think any of us could have even imagined nearly two years ago that so much would have happened and that the children in our schools would have had so many lost opportunities and rites of passage. We teach about things like the plague and small pox, but we never envisaged we would ourselves be living through a pandemic that in years to come people will learn about in History lessons in school.

This term in school, the children will be studying the following topics that will drive much of their learning:

- Infants Grab Ya Brolly! Focussing on UK weather and Grace Darling
- Years 3 and 4 Rainforest Adventure looking at South America. They will also be studying rocks as a side topic.
- Years 5 and 6 Where in the World? Focussing on comparing the UK and the USA.

If you feel you have something you could share with us about any of these topics, then please do get in touch. We love hearing from 'experts' who can help bring the learning alive for our children.

All of our year groups have been undertaking mammoth Design Technology projects this term, which have involved many lessons researching, evaluating and experimenting.

Year 5/6 have evaluated, explored and researched different musical instruments. They then spent a whole day making their very own musical instrument. There was lots of measuring, cutting, gluing, fastening and testing but by the end of it, all of the children were able to perform on their own instrument. We were incredibly impressed with the orchestra they formed!

The Infants did exactly the same for their biscuit-making project. This included the very hard task of tasting lots of biscuits to see what the crunch, texture, crumbliness and of course, taste was like. They then used all of these ideas to design and make their own biscuits. The test was in how they tasted and I think we all agreed they were yum!

Year 3/4 were also focussing on a food based project. They made pasta salad. After all of their initial investigation, testing and evaluating there were lots of different salads made in the end. Cheese was a popular ingredient for many!

You will have heard in the media that children's learning has been affected by the lock downs and online learning. Reading and comprehension, being one of the areas that schools are being encouraged to continue to focus on. Thanks to our wonderful Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and Tesco blue token community collection, we have been able to re stock our library. One of the most powerful things we can do in school is enable children to find a passion for reading as this opens up so many opportunities in the rest of their life. We are always on the look out for community volunteers, who might have an hour to spare each week, to come in and listen to our children read. If you are interested in becoming a reading volunteer, or would like to help with another subject in school or have an idea to help us continue to fundraise to continue our library re-stock campaign, then please do get in touch.
