CHANGE TO MOBILE LIBRARY DAYS

The service for this village has changed to the 2nd Tuesday. 2.50-3.05pm in Streetly End; 3.15-3.30pm in the High Street. **Did you know?**

- The service is free to join and use.
- Each Mobile Library vehicle carries up to 3000 items of stock including fiction, non fiction, large print, books on CD & cassette and books for children of all ages.
- You can request books/cassettes/CDs/DVDs. We have access to all the books in Cambridgeshire Libraries. You can also request books online to collect from the mobile Library on our next visit.
- Any books borrowed from the Mobile Library can be returned to any other Cambridgeshire Library and you can return books from other libraries toit, so no need to worry about missing your due date.
- You can renew and order books online, please ask onboard for your 'PIN' to get you started.
- Download the Spydus mobile app to keep track of your library account using your smart phone.
- Books are issued for 5 weeks and you can renew for up to three months.
- Unfortunately there are charges when books are returned late.
- All vehicles have a lift for wheelchair users or those who find stairs difficult.
- We also supply free Hearing Aid batteries, sell stamps and reading glasses.

This month I am going to remind you about the domestic classes which you may care to consider entering in this year's Show. It may be too late to make a batch of Seville orange marmalade (unless you've frozen some oranges as we do) but there's still plenty of time to make a pot of jam, jelly or chutney to enter. Closer to the day there is a wide range of baking classes and the cup cake class gives those of you who enjoy being creative with icing, chocolate, fruit, etc. to let rip!

The 9 Classes are:

A jar of home-made jam

A jar of home-made jelly

A jar of home-made marmalade

A jar of home-made chutney, relish or pickle

4 ginger biscuits

A wholemeal loaf (handmade please, no bread maker)

A vegetable quiche

A Swiss roll, filled with jam

4 decorated cup cakes

Most points will be awarded for appearance, taste and texture but presentation is also important; you need to label your preserves and the baked goods need to be covered with cling film or an alternative clear cover. After the judging and the presentation of awards in the afternoon anything that you don't wish to take back home with you can be entered into the auction of produce and is a good fundraiser for the Club.

Do think about having a go and entering some of the classes; they might inspire you to cook something you haven't tried before with a delicious end result, and you will also be part of an established village tradition. There seem to be fewer and fewer village shows around so I'm keen to try and make sure our one thrives.

Next month I'll be reminding you about the two Children's Classes and doing my best to encourage you to persuade any eleven-year-olds and under in the village that you know to take part. (The show is open to club members and residents of West Wickham and Streetly End and visiting children & grandchildren; also to residents of neighbouring parishes without horticultural societies of their own.)

Early 20thc. Left to Right: Ann Daniels, Susan Woollard and Mahala Beavis outside Ivy Todd farmhouse. Ann's husband, Henry, was the tenant farmer of this small (72 acres) independent farm (ie one not part of the Wimpole estate which owned the 5 largest farms in the village). Susan and Mahala lived with their families in the two cottages belonging to Ivy Todd opposite. In 1911, Susan's husband, Daniel, described himself as a groom on a farm and Mahala's husband, John, as a horseman on a farm. It is not clear whether they worked for Henry or elsewhere. Note that Ann appears to be doing some darning – a long lost skill!

NATURE NOTES

Having spent a few days near the Suffolk coast in 'nightingale heaven' my descent to earth here in West Wickham has had a soft landing thanks to the sound of local songbirds. Blackcaps, whitethroats and willow warblers have all helped to keep my spirits up. We are privileged in this part of Cambridgeshire to host a healthy number of skylarks whose song is said to be the most complex of all birds. Song thrushes may have had a hard time during the incredibly dry April and first half of May because worms stay deep and snails hidden but they have been in good voice nonetheless, as have blackbirds. Walking on the track that leads from Woodall Lane down to the Roman Road in Balsham I heard my first cuckoo of the year from the Balsham Wood direction. Trevor heard a cuckoo from his home in the same week.

A couple of months ago we began anticipating the arrival of swallows and they have been seen in some familiar locations - particularly around the mill at Streetly End and skimming over the rape, but my perception of numbers is that they continue to decline. I'd be interested to hear of any swallows or house martins nesting in West Wickham. My neighbour Jenny gave me some good news about a group of swifts flying over and I spotted three over Haverhill near Tescos. They are a rare sight these days but a phenomenal bird that can spend years on the wing without landing, including periods of sleep when they presumably switch to autopilot.

Di has been up in Scotland where the swallows and house martins were plentiful and the first contributors to the dawn chorus with their rapidly delivered chatter. May is the prime time for the dawn chorus but it's still worth the effort to get up early one morning and either go to one of our local woodlands or sit in the garden and listen. Di's other highlights from the Lowther Hills included grey wagtails, dippers, sandpipers, oystercatchers and mistle thrushes, all of which are either rarities or absentees in West Wickham. Moving down from the hills of Scotland to the mundanities of shopping at Sainsbury's and wrestling with the cost of living crisis, I can suggest an ideal antidote. Simply have a stroll around the drainage reservoir opposite Sainsbury's (also known as West Town Park) and appreciate the riot of wildflowers that occupy the banks. In April these banks were covered in cowslips but, as I write, the oxeye daisies, clover and buttercups have taken over, soon to be joined by more than one species of orchid and numerous butterflies attracted by the diverse vegetation.

As for mammals, the foxes and badgers have temporarily absented themselves from our copse but apparently are making regular appearances at the other end of the village in Trevor and Carol's garden, along with roe deer, while the ten remaining ducklings in their pond are growing feathers and will soon be fledging as long as they can avoid the foxes.

Finally, a couple of small dramas to report, both involving a crow as victim. We have a regular carrion crow in our garden who chose to use our pond for a wash and brush up. He was just 'splashing it all over' when our chickens, who were out on the lawn, took exception and rushed over to chase him off. On another occasion, we were walking near Skippers Hall when we spotted a commotion in the field where a single crow was being dive bombed by two kites for no apparent reason.
