AUTOMATED EXTERNAL DEFIBRILLATOR (AED)

The Parish Council has acquired an Automated External Defibrillator that has been installed at the front-door entrance to the Village Hall.

AED is a fully An automated, easy to use medical device to help those experiencing sudden cardiac arrest, a medical condition in which the heart suddenly and unexpectedly stops beating. It analyses the heart's rhythm and, if necessary, delivers an electrical shock, or defibrillation, to help the



heart re-establish an effective rhythm. Research has shown that using a defibrillator within 3-5 minutes of collapse can produce survival rates as high as 50–70%.

The AED can only be accessed by dialing 999 in an emergency. If necessary, you will be directed by the operator to the AED at the Village Hall and given the code to open the cabinet and remove the AED within to transport to the patient. The AED is small, light, battery powered and contained within a special carry case making it very easy to transport. When turned on, the AED gives simple voice instructions along with diagrams printed on the device on how to remove the pads, attach them to the patient and continue treatment until an ambulance arrives. The 999 operator will also provide guidance and instructions and the AED case includes additional items that may assist with its use.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Following the uncontested election the Parish Council meeting held on 23 May had various duties to carry out before the full meeting could proceed.

Election of Chairman, Vice Chairman and other positions: Cllr Alex Schuilenburg was elected as Chairman with Cllr David Sargeant elected as Vice-Chairman.

The two new Councillors, Cllr Caroline Mulley-Richards and Cllr. Ronnie Temple, were welcomed and their registration forms signed.

Cllrs Mulley-Richards and Cllr Schuilenburg were appointed to be representatives on the Village Hall Management Committee.

Correspondence: A letter of thanks had been sent by the Parish Clerk to Martin Chamberlain who kindly made and donated a plaque for the refurbished village bench.

Planning: There were no outstanding applications to discuss. Cllrs Sargeant and Hazelhurst agreed to attend the Seven Parish Meetings held with South Cambridgeshire District Council during the year.

Finance: The end of year accounts, bank reconciliation and various other documents had been distributed to the Council prior to the meeting. These were accepted and agreed as being correct. A full list of authorised payments and monies received are shown on the draft minutes posted on the notice boards.

Risk Management Assessment & Standing Orders: The risk assessment had been carried out satisfactorily and the form was signed. Regarding the Standing Orders, the Chairman thought these should be updated and the Parish Clerk will forward the latest Standing Orders issued by CAPALC for discussion.

Maintenance:

- 1. The street sign in Streetly End has at last been replaced.
- 2. The defibrillator should be delivered this week and the Chairman has asked Trevor Hall, Chairman of the VHMC, to organise an electrician to fit it. It was suggested that if the defibrillator is portable it should be charged up and kept in the Hall until installed.

Village Hall & Recreation Ground:

- 1. *Rospa Report:* This will be discussed at the next meeting.
- 2. *Heating:* It was agreed that the Parish Council should pay £16 per meeting towards the cost of heating during winter months

Reports by District & County Cllrs. Harvey & Batchelor:

District Cllr Harvey was absent but was congratulated for his re-election.

The full minutes of the meeting can be seen on the Parish notice boards.

A report on the Annual Parish Meeting and reports received from the various clubs and groups etc. will be published in the August Village Voice.

NATURE NOTES

As I write this in JUNE, the garden is full of the whistles, squeaks and chirrups of young birds calling for their parents' attention. They are new fledglings searching the leaf canopy for tiny caterpillars, but still very reliant on their parents for food. We have a family of three young spotty robins in the garden, very much like their parents, but without the red breast. They peck about under the feeder, and seem quite tame under my feet when I am watering. Their rarer cousins, the spotted flycatchers, also nest in our gardens but I have not seen any for the past two years. Has anyone else?

As you read this in JULY, the birds will have mostly gone silent, recuperating from parental duties and moulting. This is the month for butterflies and other winged insects. The 'Big Butterfly count' between 15 July - 15 August is well worth doing. I am always surprised by the wealth of butterflies we have in this parish. On the grass verges and in the fields, skippers (small butterflies), meadow browns and gatekeepers are abundant along with some stunning blues. Painted ladies and speckled woods are also about. Around areas of water the tiny jewel like damsel flies, bright iridescent blue or bright red, hover over the water. The magnificent demoiselles that fly with helicopter movements to show off their spotted wing pattern, the broad bodied chasers and other dragonflies are on the wing.

Flowers are at their peak, and meadow flowers worth seeing are the ox-eye daisies (around the Gallop footpath at Yen Hall). They appear as a white sheet, but on closer examination reveal a field of white daises covered in pollenseeking insects. Our often overlooked buttercup is glorious in large numbers and in our grass verges (we apparently have a rare buttercup in our parish, which I am going to report back on next month). Many of you have reported seeing orchids, especially the beautiful bee orchid, but also early purple and common spotted in greater numbers than in previous years, which is great news.

Moths, love them or hate them, are fascinating things. them have Some of extraordinary habits while they are caterpillars and festoon our trees with webs of silk. These are the orchard ermine caterpillars, which feed on hawthorn, or spindle the ermine caterpillars, which feed on spindle bushes. You will often see brown gaps in the hedgerows, Ōn closer examination, they are 'tents' of silk webbing filled with munching caterpillars, using



the webs as protection from hungry predators. Some of these tents can cover a whole tree. Jan and I found one at West Wratting, starting in an ash tree (uneaten leaves) 10ft up, stretching down to the ground and spreading across the grass. It looked like something out of a horror movie or house adornment for Halloween. Interestingly, the caterpillars never kill their host. Pete is enjoying the learning experience of a garden moth trap. His most spectacular find to date is the 'eyed hawkmoth' but he finds identifying the less spectacular ones a challenge. One beauty to watch out for in the garden, especially on honeysuckle, is the 'hummingbird hawk moth.'

GRANTA MEDICAL PRACTICES UPDATE

Face Masks. NHS England have updated the guidance around the wearing of face masks in GP surgeries. You no longer have to wear a mask when coming into our buildings, unless you have respiratory symptoms such as coughing or wheezing. Of course if you prefer, you can continue to wear a mask. Doctors and nurses are advised to wear face masks when they are seeing patients with respiratory symptoms, and some clinicians may prefer to wear a mask when seeing any patient.

Long Term Conditions (LTC). You may have received a text recently regarding your "LTC Review". LTC stands for Long Term Condition, which describes illnesses such as asthma, COPD, hypertension, kidney disease and diabetes. Since April we have started aiming to review patients around their month of birth. There will be a transition phase as we work towards this. Please do not hesitate to contact us if you have any questions.

Ukrainian Refugees. Ukrainian refugees can access healthcare in the same way as UK residents. If you are hosting a family please encourage them to register with us as soon as possible to ensure they have access to different services they may need. The Granta Travel Clinic. If you are planning your summer holidays and need some travel health advice, look no further! In our dedicated Travel Clinics, our travel nurses will talk to you about where you are going and what may be required. This could include travel vaccinations and other travel health risks that you might like to consider, such as malaria prevention. We will ensure you get your injections at the right time for your trip, and we will also assess the impact of any existing medical conditions on your vaccination requirements.

The first step is to complete one of our Travel Risk Assessment forms so we can assess your risk. Please note that each traveller must complete their own Risk Assessment form. Once you have completed and returned the form, we will contact you within 7 to 10 days with further instructions. At your appointment, the recommended vaccines or medications will be given and follow up injections planned.

On our website you will find our travel vaccinations price list. We also have a range of travel essentials for sale such as first aid kits, travel adaptors, sun screen, mosquito repellent and chlorine dioxide tablets. There's also been a significant increase in delivery company branded 'smishing' (SMS fraud), with scammers asking customers to click a link to reschedule deliveries or pay incomplete shipping charges. Other recent scams have seen victims contacted via email and/or text and being asked to take a fake post-vaccine survey with the promise of a cash prize.

So please stay alert. Stop and Think. Around £2.5billion has been reported lost over the last 13 months by almost 1/2 million consumer fraud cases.

HELP SHAPE POLICING PRIORITIES IN YOUR AREA

Residents across Cambridgeshire are being invited to have their say and help shape policing priorities in their area.

Following a pilot in Cambridge city, Neighbourhood Policing Teams have launched a new way to influence what officers in your community focus on. This online tool provides a quick and easy way to have your say.

People living in Cambridge city, East Cambridgeshire, Huntingdonshire and South Cambridgeshire are invited to take five minutes to fill out an online survey each quarter so local officers can understand what crime is happening in their area.

Residents are also invited to attend an online meeting each quarter where there will be a presentation on recent policing activity from the team and the results of the survey will be shared. During the meeting neighbourhood teams will be able to listen to concerns, discuss, and allow residents to have an influence on what local police teams tackle.

After the meeting, the team will work on the matters agreed and update residents with progress over the following three months before the process begins again.
