NATURE NOTES

At the time of writing we are preparing for an extreme heat emergency for which people are being advised to close the curtains, open the windows and drink plenty of water. The heat, coming on top of such a long dry period, is also stressful for wildlife, who don't have the same options without human help. Water is essential to life and at times like this, birds, insects and mammals can place a great deal of reliance on our ponds and birdbaths. Bees, wasps and flies can sometimes be seen sitting on the edge gingerly taking a drink and trying to avoid getting in too deep as they can get into difficulties or become waterlogged. Birds use them for drinking and bathing. So we need to keep the birdbaths and ponds topped up if possible. Di recently found a very dehydrated hedgehog in the middle of a recreation ground in full sun and gave it some respite by moving it under the hedge in the shade.



Life in and around our pond continues. Dragonflies, unlike some other insects, emerge directly from the larval stage without becoming pupae. They shed several skins but before the final moult many climb out of the pond and then emerge as adults, leaving the skin (known as exuviae) behind them. We found two of these exuviae still seemingly clinging to pondside reeds and some days later were treated to the spectacle of male

and female broad-bodied chasers zooming around the pond.

In attempting to ascend the mountain of knowledge required to make me a moth expert, I am still in the foothills, but the learning process is being helped by my moth trap. This has attracted numerous varieties including the enormous eyed and poplar hawkmoths and the delightful elephant and small elephant hawkmoths with their iridescent pink and khaki colours. Di is fortunate to be able to attract the elephants into her conservatory with the help of a hoya flower, which gives off an alluring (for moths) smell in the evenings. It's wonderful how plants and insects have evolved to suit each other's needs for nectar and pollination during the hours of darkness. During the day a number of people have had the pleasure of watching a hummingbird hawk moth with its long proboscis extracting nectar.

Although spiders are not technically insects they too seem to be particularly active and noticeable at this time of year. The tunnel web spider builds an impressive web, then sits at the tunnel entrance, ready to rush out in response to any movement on the web to entrap the unfortunate prey. Another variety is the nursery spider, who carries her egg sac around, then makes a nursery web in the grass when they are ready to hatch. It appears as a mass of web with a cherry sized dark patch in the centre, occupied by spiderlings, who, when disturbed, will run about inside or sometimes run along the grass stems. When they are ready, the young spiders climb a stem and produce a dragline from their spinnerets and balloon away on the breeze.

We have good news from Horseheath that spotted flycatchers have bred opposite the church and it seems that the youngsters successfully fledged. Another family I noticed recently were reed buntings, who obligingly perch on top of the rape, the males displaying their striking black heads.

BE DRONE WISE

Recently there has been drone activity at the rear of properties in Streetly End during which the flyer remained out of sight, raising concerns as to security and personal privacy. The Police have recorded the incident as "suspicious". (Ed. There have been other similar 'suspicious' activities recorded recently in the County!)

The Drone and Model Aircraft Code regulates the use of drones, particularly those fitted with a camera and/or listening device, to protect people's privacy and bears brief outlining as pertinent to this incident:

You must register before flying a drone with a camera outdoors and pass the CAA's official test every 5 years to obtain a flyer ID. You must also hold an operator ID, details of which must appear on the drone, and the flyer must divulge this information if requested.

The flyer should remain in clear sight when flying the drone so people know who is responsible and should let people know before recording or taking images.

If a drone is used where people can expect privacy, such as in their house or garden, it is likely to be in breach of data protection laws for which there are penalties.

It is against the law to take photos or record video or sound in breach of the General Data Protection Regulation.

If you record images for commercial use, the flyer must meet further specific requirements as a data controller.

Please be aware of the above activity and report any sightings to the Police on 101.
