NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN REFERENDUM

The referendum held on 11 August asked the question 'Do you want South Cambridgeshire District Council to use the Neighbourhood Plan for West Wickham to help it decide planning applications in the neighbourhood area'? There was a total of 107 votes.

98 votes in favour; 9 votes not in favour.

Therefore 91.59% of people voting were in favour of the plan and it will become part of the guidance South Cambs DC has to take note of when deciding on a planning application.

PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

At the meeting held on Monday 25 July the following are some of the matters discussed. The draft minutes can be found on the noticeboards.

Co-option of 2 new Parish Councillors: The Parish Council is now up to full strength following the co-option of Graham McNeillie and Richard Ling. (Ed. See separate item)

Planning: two applications were discussed at the meeting.

22/2301/2302. 32 Streetly End. To raise an existing chimney stack etc. This was supported.

22/1039/FUL. Platts Farm. Minor changes so were supported.

Finance:

The internal audit had been carried out satisfactorily and the external auditors have granted exemption from an external audit.

The list of authorised payments etc. are shown on the draft minutes.

Parish Nurse contribution: This is under discussion and Cllr. Mulley is making enquiries on the use of this service.

Traffic & Parking issues:

Speed Indicator Equipment: Trevor Hall was asked to do a full costing for a SID (Ed. Speed indicator device?) and poles before any decision is made. The speed data is kept by him and it was suggested this should be published on the website or in the Village Voice.

Maintenance:

Footpath Officer: Cllr Temple offered to do this.

Tree officer: Di Licence is happy to continue looking at the planning applications for tree work but asked for a councillor to take on the Jubilee Forest project with her. Cllr Sargeant offered to do this.

Village Hall & Recreation ground:

Solar panels: A satisfactory survey of the roof to check if it is suitable for solar panels has been carried out.

RoSPA Report: It was agreed that the play area needs to be checked by Councillors to see what needs doing. Cllrs Sargeant and Ling will do this.

Neighbourhood Plan: Following the Referendum on 11 August, the dissolution of the Plan Working group will be effective immediately as their role is completed. The Chairman thanked the team for their hard work.

Meetings attended by Cllrs: Cllrs Sargeant and Mulley-Richards attended the Combined Parish Council meeting on 23 June. Jane Rodens will be the new District Council Planning Officer.

The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 26 September at 7.30pm. All are welcome.

PEOPLE FROM THE PAST



The road gang with tar boiler outside Manor Farm (note barns now demolished). The photo is undated but probably late 1930s although I've always been led to believe that the roads were not surfaced until the 2nd World War when better vehicle access was needed to RAF Wratting Common. Alfred Moss, second from right, died in 1946 aged 73. He and his wife, Sarah, lived in one of the cottages at Bottle Hall. If anyone can enlighten me about the roads or can identify any of the other men please do get in touch.

There was a local road gang based at the Council depot in Balsham until about 40 years ago when the land was sold for housing. Nowadays, it's hard to believe that the gullies in the verges draining the roads of surface water were cleared regularly each winter, pavements were swept every six weeks and even gritted in icy weather!

NATURE NOTES

Farmers are complaining that the ground is too hard for them to drill, so what must it be like for the moles? There have been a number of reports of moles found dead or wandering in a distressed state, presumably unable to access the worms on which they depend. If still alive, it feels right to move them to a safer and cooler place but their problem with the iron-hard earth would remain. The hot dry weather has been responsible for the death of thousands of moles, who have starved to death because the worms, centipedes and beetles on which they feed are deep in the earth beyond their reach.

Other mammals may not be quite so distressed, but nevertheless will be desperately seeking water as the ditches, ponds and rivers dry up. Deer have been particularly active and Trevor and Carol have been visited by both fallow and roe deer (pictured) who have been



browsing on their apple trees, in some cases standing on their hind legs to reach the fruit. They have also had foxes in the garden producing some great action shots of cubs at play and attempts at pigeon catching. I placed a container with water in the copse at the top of our garden and this has increased the numbers of muntjac and badgers caught on my trailcam. While the Granta (or Cam) which rises in Castle Camps continues to keep flowing, the Stour which rises in West Wickham is bone dry in its course through Weston Colville. These conditions are putting otters under stress so it wouldn't surprise me if one travelled over to seek out some of the West Wickham ponds.

Butterflies and moths are more appreciative of the hot dry conditions and I hope people were able to do the Big Butterfly Count. Mine produced nothing remarkable although a couple of weeks before the count was due to start I was lucky to see a beautiful silver-washed fritillary feeding on bramble flowers, and I also accompanied someone doing a count on the Fleam Dyke, where we saw an extraordinary number of chalkhill blues. Many were mating so this should augur well for next year. We mentioned the spindle ermine moths a couple of months ago. Their caterpillars develop in a protective web and in the process they wreak havoc on the spindle tree. Di was lucky enough to discover the pupae that they became, and thence to see the lovely white moths (with black spots) emerge so it is easy to see how they got their name.

Resident birds are still having to care for their recently fledged young, noticeably the buzzards up at Burton End, whose noisy youngsters have been regularly heard beseeching their parents for food. Di spotted a buzzard 'deliveroo' moment as an adult flew in with something hanging from its talons and dropped it for one of the chicks, perched on a telegraph pole. Meanwhile a spectacular gathering of migrants occurred at Vicarage Cottage as a large group of house martins chose to perch in the birch tree while a similarly large group of swallows took up their places on the telegraph wire above. One rarely sees these type of birds perched in trees so this was quite remarkable. Both swallows and house martins have been scarce this summer, although I know there has been a fair amount of activity around the barns at Yen Hall. It's also quite surprising that they are massing, seemingly in preparation for their departure, so early in the year. Perhaps they are hoping it will be cooler when they fly over the Sahara.

THE COUNTRYSIDE CODE

The Countryside Code, the official government advice for those living in and visiting the countryside, was updated earlier this year. As there are many of you who may have recently moved to the village and who may be living in a rural area for the first time, the relevant extracts are below.

Respect everyone

- be considerate to those living in, working in and enjoying the countryside
- leave gates and property as you find them
- do not block access to gateways or driveways when parking
- be nice, say hello, share the space
- follow local signs and keep to marked paths unless wider access is available

Protect the environment

- take your litter home leave no trace of your visit
- do not light fires and only have BBQs where signs say you can
- always keep dogs under control and in sight
- dog poo bag it and bin it any public waste bin will do
- care for nature do not cause damage or disturbance

FLU CLINICS

Now that we are all socialising again and there are questions about lower levels of immunity since lockdown, it is really important to get your flu vaccine. We now have the dates of our clinics, which are as follows:-

- Saturday 24 September Sawston Medical Practice, CB22 3HU
- Saturday 1 October Linton Health Centre, CB21 4JS
- Sunday 2 October Market Hill Surgery, Royston, SG8 9JN
- Saturday 8 October Shelford Health Centre CB22 5FY
- Sunday 16 October Linton Health Centre, CB21 4JS
- Sunday 16 October Barley Surgery, SG8 8HY
- Friday 21 October Sawston Medical Practice CB22 3HU
- Saturday 22 October Shelford Health Centre CB22 5FY

All clinics will run from 8:30am to 4pm.

We will be vaccinating:-

- all children aged 2 to 3 years on 31 August 2022.
- people aged 65 years and over (including those becoming 65 by 31 March 2023
- those patients aged from 6 months to less than 65 years of age in a clinical risk group such as asthma, COPD, chronic heart problems, and diabetes. If you are unsure if you fit into an "at risk" group don't hesitate to ask
- pregnant women (including those women who become pregnant during the influenza season)
- household contacts of immunocompromised individuals, especially those for whom continuing close contact is unavoidable
- those in long stay residential care homes
- those who are carers
- those with a learning disability

The government are also extending the cohort to include those patients 50 years old and over with no underlying health conditions. However, these patients will be vaccinated later in the programme, most likely November time.

The vaccines we are using this year are:

For the 2 to 3 year olds – *Fluenz nasal spray*. This should arrive in time for us to vaccinate in our planned clinics.

For 18 to 64 year olds – *Flucelvax* and *Supemtek*. These are both egg-free and provide a better immune response than the traditional egg-based vaccines used in previous years.

For 65 years old and over – *Fluad* (adjuvanted quadrivalent). This vaccine contains an immunity boost.

We are hopeful that we will be able to give the Covid autumn boosters at the same time as the flu vaccines. We will keep you updated with any developments.

FROM THE VICARAGE

September often seems to me like a time of fresh starts and new challenges. My children, along with many others, return to school and new classes are greeted with a mixture of eagerness and trepidation! This seems especially so this year as a remarkably hot and dry summer gives way to the plans and preoccupations of autumn.

One of the groups planning ahead is the youth group which I am leading, called *Explorers*. It's been going for just over a year now and the monthly meetings are a mixture of games and exploring the Christian faith, together with some snacks and drinks! We have also enjoyed a couple of outings so far: a 'hike and hot dog' and a summer barbeque. When we meet in September, however, we will be looking to plan the year ahead and reflecting on a theme of boldness and courage. This is partly connected with the new challenges at school but also recognises that courage and boldness may be needed at many different times in life. This theme was highlighted as well at the special confirmation service we held in August, where Dagmar Winter, Bishop of Huntingdon, spoke of the challenges those being confirmed would face in living out their faith in Jesus and how each would need the support and prayers of others. Bishop Dagmar also gave the example of the Bishop of the Amazon whom she met at the recent Lambeth conference, who took a boat along the Amazon River to visit congregations and faced many perils along the way. What courage and boldness she needed as she proclaimed faith, hope and love in her part of the world.

This confirmation service indeed reflects the encouragement St Paul gave to the church in Corinth when he wrote: "stand firm in the faith; be courageous; be strong" He also immediately added: "Do everything in love". How important it is to hold all of these things together! Whatever new challenges we may face in the different times and seasons of our lives, we too may draw upon this encouragement in living out faith, hope and love in our place and time.
