FROM THE VICARAGE

There is so much to look forward to in December in our parishes: Christmas tree festivals; Christmas concerts; carol singing to name but a few! Whilst I sometimes find myself rushing from one event to another, I really enjoy the festive atmosphere! It's as though there is a deep instinct that Christmas is a time for seeing the good in each other and the world. For celebrating gift, generosity and expressions of love. You don't need religion to understand these are some of the things which really matter in life.

Gift, joyful celebration and an instinct for seeing the good, also point towards the deeper reality of the Christmas story. A familiar story, but one with strange beauty. A story, which is a mix of uncertainty, hope, joy and new life. A child, born in humble circumstances, is the Christ child who is greeted, as Luke's gospel says, as "Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord". PEOPLE FROM THE PAST



John de Fraine moved to West Wickham, the home village of his wife Ursula, in 1865 and remained here until his death in 1910. He made his living travelling the country lecturing on 'social subjects', mainly about temperance and for more than forty years he raised the money for annual Christmas teas for the elderly, the children and the young men and women who attended his Bible classes. These took place in the Mission Hall he had built in 1871 (now known as the Old Chapel) which was

suitably decorated for the occasion and featured a Christmas tree with presents for everyone. In the early days these were of a practical nature – warm comforters, scarves and gloves – but later on, in a reflection of changing times, the elderly were given coal, tea, sugar and a little money while the young received books.

NATURE NOTES

With due respect to John Keats, our season of 'mists and mellow fruitfulness' is, at the time of writing, turning into one of gusts and woeful wetfulness, with remaining fruit being blown to the ground and people and wildlife alike needing to take cover from the driving rain. Having said this, we have been fortunate to have had some lovely autumn days, particularly atmospheric in the misty, drippy mornings and at twilight as the sun rises and falls.

Di's favourites of these autumn mornings are the silk webs stretched across the grasses and flower stalks, enhanced by water droplets glinting in the sun. Poet Andrew Young describes:

> cobwebs drooped heavy and hoar as with wool they had been knit, too obvious a mark for fly to hit

Although the spiders may be suffering a temporary blip in their fly-catching strategy, they at least have the consolation of being able to have a sip of water from the droplets that have condensed on their webs. Swings and roundabouts come to mind.

Spiders and flies are essential players in the cycle of life, as are other creatures further up the food chain. There has been a fallow deer lying dead beside Webbs Road in Streetly End for some weeks (cause of death unknown – surely cars wouldn't be going fast enough?). A couple of times when passing the carcass we have disturbed a red kite and although we see these birds most days, there is still a sharp intake of breath when seeing it at such close quarters in these somewhat gruesome circumstances. Meanwhile the deer carcass diminishes by the day as not only the kite but also various insects and bacteria get to work on it.

Other birds that eat carrion as part of their diet include buzzards and carrion crows who are seen frequently in West Wickham, but a pair of the crow's big cousins, the raven, have been spotted recently. They are more often associated with coastal and moorland locations in the north and west of the country, so this sighting was a surprise. They have a distinctive deep croaky call and are spectacular flyers who can fly upside down, seemingly just for the fun of it.

Fieldfares and redwings cannot, as far as I know, fly upside down but they have managed the trip from Scandinavia to Britain once again, and they can be heard chuckling and ticking as they rise from the hedgerows when disturbed. It would be nice to hear if anyone sees one of their relatives, the missel thrush, which I believe has declined somewhat in recent years. On the subject of migration, there are many species of water fowl who come to this country for the winter, including Bewick swans who can sometimes be seen at the Ouse washes north of Ely but have been reported as arriving at the Slimbridge wetland reserve on 10 November, ten days later than last year and their latest arrival since 1965. It is thought likely that this late arrival is due to warmer temperatures in their breeding grounds in the arctic.

The mild autumn could also be the reason for Carol Hall's spotting of a red admiral in her garden on 12 November. It is not unheard of to see overwintering butterflies emerging for a quick flutter on unseasonably warm winter days, but red admirals are mainly migratory and come from southern Europe and North Africa. However, more are beginning to overwinter in this country so we may see more of them in the autumn and early spring in future years.

CAMBRIDGE CITY ACCESS CONSULTATION

A 'Sustainable Travel Zone' road user charge has been put forward by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (the body currently implementing the upgrades to the A1307) for private vehicles between 7am and 7pm on weekdays. The plans are part of a package to improve public transport, reduce congestion in the city and help the environment through lower emissions.

A £5 congestion charge to drive into and around Cambridge is being considered as part of a 'once in a generation' plan to shake up how people travel during the working week.

There is now a public consultation on the proposals and it is vitally important that as many people as possible respond to this with their views. It will be one of the largest decisions that will affect the way that we travel in and out of Cambridge for generations to come.
