## SPEEDWATCH RETURNS AND SPEED INDICATOR SIGN

New volunteers are needed for the Community Speedwatch for West Wickham and Streetly End to help tackle the problem of speeding traffic through our parish. This program was instrumental in helping the Parish Council to have the speed limit in Streetly End reduced from 40 to 30mph and installation of the "Village Gates". A number of years have passed since the changes and offending drivers have become familiar with the route so the problem has returned, particularly in Streetly End.

Unfortunately, most of the speedwatch volunteers have retired. Volunteers will be trained in the use of the Speedwatch equipment by Cambridgeshire Police, who will also approve the location of the Speedwatch sites as well as the date and time of Speedwatch sessions. If you are interested in joining the group, please speedwatch.team@westwickham.org with your contact details.

What is involved? During a Speedwatch session, details of vehicles travelling in excess of the speed limit are recorded and forwarded to the police. Sessions usually last an hour, and preferably held once a week at various locations when traffic is heaviest. The police use this information to notify the owner by letter that their vehicle has been identified as exceeding the speed limit, and the information is kept on record to identify persistent offenders.

Speed Indicator Sign: Currently the Speedwatch equipment is shared, but the Parish Council will be applying for its own equipment (under a Local Highways Initiative grant) which also doubles as a speed advisory like the present speed indicator sign. This should allow our Speedwatch Team to operate effectively, with greater flexibility and frequency, to provide the further evidence required to help us introduce additional speed reduction measures if warranted.

On joining and becoming a member, you will be added to the "Announcements" group in which only volunteer members of the community and Parish Council can make announcements.



(Note: This link and code will only be valid until 16th November 2023).

Once a member, you can optionally join the "Village Shouts/Asks/Wants" group through which residents regularly share, request or offer information, items, help, etc. This group was set up initially by a couple of residents to bolster community spirit at the start of the Covid lockdown and has been incredibly successful before morphing into its current form and its inclusion into the West Wickham community.

As a member of the community, your mobile phone details will remain

hidden from other members unlike normal WhatsApp groups. You can also join and leave open groups within the community without requiring an administrator, and your mobile phone details will remain private **until you post into a group.** You will also be able to add other members of your family and friends to the West Wickham community also allowing them to receive announcements and choose which groups within the community they wish to join. You may also create groups within the community (subject to approval by a moderator).

Why another WhatsApp group? A WhatsApp Community addresses the privacy and content concerns of the Parish Council as well as many residents. It provides greater control over content and security, helping prevent hijacking of groups for nefarious and other purposes, and allows for community groups to be established and advertised. You don't have to be a member of any group to be a member of the community other than the "Announcements" group, and if you leave "Announcements" you will automatically leave the community and all the groups within the community (your departure will not be announced). Finally, this allows the "Village Shouts/Asks/Wants" group to remain on-topic by moving official "Announcements" into its own group, allowing residents to determine which messages they wish to receive alerts for or receive.

#### SOLAR PANELS ON THE VILLAGE HALL

The solar panels and battery installation was completed on 15 September and in the month since installation have generated 714 kWh of electricity with 503 kWh exported to the grid. We are still waiting for nPower to agree to our request for accepting our exported electricity for credit to our account.

Thanks to the continued fine weather the panels have generally kept our battery fully charged at the end of the day and provided power for all activities which have been held in the Hall over the last month. Import of electricity from the grid has been minimal.

As the efficiency of the panels drops off during the winter months we have arranged for the battery to be charged from the grid between midnight and 7am on the night time low tariff. This should enable the usual evening activities in the Hall to be powered from the battery.

It remains to be seen whether there will be sufficient battery capacity to run the infra-red heating system but we will be able to monitor this on the app which has been provided with the installation.

Profits from November's Bingo and HUB event will contribute to the ongoing PV Appeal Fund organised by the Parish Council.

#### POPPIES FOR REMEMBRANCETIDE

Poppies will be available locally at Balsham Post Office, Coffee Shop, the Bell Inn, the Black Bull and at Church Services in Balsham, also at The Chestnut Tree Pub in West Wratting, from 27/28 October until Remembrance Sunday, 12 November. My grateful thanks to all of them and to those who are helping me distribute poppies. With changing circumstances, there will not be a local house-to-house collection.

For those of us who no longer use cash there is now an easy way to make a donation for your poppy. There is a QR code specific to our area, ECF03, on collecting tins - just scan and donate, cashless and anonymous. I will only receive the total sum of donations made in this way, not even tin specific. Cash is of course most acceptable in the collecting tins, or cheques in envelopes labelled POPPY APPEAL handed in at Balsham Post Office, where there are also Gift Aid forms with envelopes, upon request (this increases your donation by 25% at no cost to you). Wooden crosses will also be available in Balsham Post Office, Coffee Shop and the Chestnut Tree PH, plus reflective poppies etc, but 2023 enamel pins are not been available owing to supply difficulties - supermarkets will have these. A few non-dated pins may be available locally. Totally recyclable, plastic free Poppies have been developed, but for use only when the others have been used up, to avoid unnecessary waste.

Please give generously to help the Royal British Legion support our ex-service men and women.

#### **NEWS FROM THE PAST**

Cambridge Independent Press 12 October 1917



#### **WEST WICKHAM**

Mr C Bradnam, of West Wickham, has received official news that his son, Corporal B. Bradnam, was killed by a shell on the 13th September last. Corporal Bradnam, with his brother, volunteered on September 29, 1914 and both men were wounded in the big advance in July, 1916. Pte. A. Bradnam died of his wounds on July 30<sup>th</sup>, 1916, while Corporal Bradnam, after recovering from his wounds, returned to France in September 1916. The following letter was received from his officer: "It is with the deepest sympathy that I write to inform you of the death of your son, Corporal B Bradnam, who was killed in action by a shell on the night of the 13<sup>th</sup> September. He was a fine lad, always willing to do anything that was asked of him in the most cheerful way and I can assure you that I am most grieved to lose such a valuable NCO. Everybody loved him in the platoon, and I am sure all join me in sending you our heartfelt sympathy in the sad loss of your dear son. He was buried by our clergyman in the British cemetery just behind the British lines. All his personal property will be forwarded to you as soon as possible. If there is anything further I can tell you concerning your son I shall only be too pleased to do so if possible."

Bennett Bradnam was born in 1890 and he and his brother, Albert, born in 1895, were the youngest sons of Charles and Mary Bradnam. The family lived in a now-demolished cottage between 23 and 25 High Street. The brothers enlisted together in Linton and joined the newly formed 11<sup>th</sup> Battalion (Cambridgeshire) Suffolk Regiment familiarly known as the 'Cambs Kitcheners'. Both brothers, along with two other West Wickham men in the Battalion, were injured on 1 July 1916 at what is now known as the Battle of the Somme. Albert was treated for his wounds in Chorlton upon Medlock (Lancashire) but died on 30 July. While Bennett was buried in France, Albert was buried in the churchyard in West Wickham. You will find his grave with military headstone to the right of the gate.

#### **PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

The following were some of the items discussed at the Parish Council meeting held on 25 September. The full draft minutes are displayed on the noticeboards.

Correspondence: Parish Nurse Project: Due to the Parish Nurse Project no longer existing the Charity Commission requested that any money donated last year be returned to the donors but gave the option of the money being put towards some other Charity. This includes the 2022 donation made by the Parish Council. The Parish Clerk will enquire about this before a decision is made.

*Planning:* Devona Centre for Environment Recovery: There are aspects of their plan which would not be acceptable, e.g. restricted access for dogs in the area.

Finance: Full details of payments made and monies received are shown in the draft Minutes.

Traffic & Parking issues: The Chairman hopes to put in an LHI (Local Highways Initiative) application for speed and "road narrow" signs for Webb's Road and the entry into West Wickham from Streetly End. County Cllr Batchelor said he would support this but would also put in a request for a "Road Narrow" sign from the County Council Highways Dept as a priority. The Highways Dept have inspected Webb's Road and it been patched up.

Maintenance:

- Footpath posts have now all been put in place and some waymark discs. Not all farms have reinstated their footpaths but Cllr Temple will check up on this.
- Village Sign has now been repaired and is in place again.
- Wild Flower area and hedges: Rob Giles will shortly be doing this job and the hedges have now been cutback.
- The MUGA (Multi User Games Area). Cllr Sargeant reported that a sign is still missing but he would deal with it. The tension on the zip wire needs tightening up. He and the Chairman will carry this out.

Village Hall & Recreation Ground:

- Solar Panel Project has now been completed and is in operation. It is a very efficient system.
- The Play Area repairs have been carried out but the fence posts are not yet protected with a guard sleeve.

Allotments: Cllr Mulley-Richards reported that the gate had been purchased but not yet been erected.

Reports by District Cllr Harvey and County Cllr Batchelor: These are published on the website.

Any Other Business: WhatsApp Group. There have been concerns about some of the content on this site. A Community Group is being set up which will only be for announcements (e.g. road closures etc.).

#### **NATURE NOTES**

My Yorkshire friends always refer to autumn as the 'back end'. A time when the year is beginning to die away as winter approaches. And Emily Bronte, also a Yorkshire lass, in her poem *Fall, Leaves, Fall* paints a similar picture but takes some pleasure from the decay and darkness which approaches — hardly surprising from the author of *Wuthering Heights*. The last two lines of the poem:

'I shall sing when night's decay Ushers in a drearier day'

seem to be saying that despite the grim and dark landscape that surrounds her she is going to keep her chin up and remain defiant.

In the more benign environs of West Wickham we still have much to interest us in the natural world and although leaves are turning colour now there are still plenty on most trees. And if you look closely at the oak trees, there are more than just the leaves. Oaks, particularly the native species quercus robur, are host to over 70 species of gall wasp which develop inside distinctive galls. Oak gall wasps have complex life cycles, with alternating generations which are either sexual, with males and females, or asexual with females only. In some species the generations alternate between native and non-native species of the tree. Two particular galls which you may notice at this time of year are the knopper gall and the marble gall. In the former case the wasp lays its egg in the developing acorn which converts into a ridged woody structure in which the larva develops. The marble gall wasp causes hard, woody spherical galls on the twigs which can persist for a number of years. Both these species transfer their attention to Turkey Oak (quercus cerris) for the next generation. Oak gall wasps are part of the biodiversity that a healthy oak tree supports, so attempts to control them are undesirable. The oak trees themselves do not seem to have produced many acorns this year, possibly because we did not have a warm spring and a hot dry summer. Beech trees, however, seemed to have produced a good quantity of beech nuts.

On the subject of gall wasps, this is also the time of year when you may notice robin's pincushions, which are also galls, formed on dog rose. This gall has a hard centre but produces a reddish fibrous growth on the outside. Other insects penetrate galls and either feed off it or parasitise the larva inside so there can be quite a lot of life within one gall. Another feature of autumn is the shield bugs which we can often see in the hedgerows, or in my case on the raspberries. Di has been keeping a watch on the alder trees on Maypole Croft where a shield bug has laid many eggs. The baby bugs are increasing in size every day, at least 50 being huddled together on just one leaf.

Insects in general are active where there are flowers blooming – notably ivy, which as Sandra Bebbington pointed out was absolutely buzzing with hornets, bumble bees, honey bees, all sorts of flies and butterflies. Several people have experienced large incursions of harlequin ladybirds.

As far as the birds are concerned, we await the arrival of the winter thrushes and northern blackbirds. Di reports from a recent trip to Scotland that they were seen flying overhead, along with several skeins of geese, so they are on their way south. Meanwhile the resident mistle thrush has been eating as many berries as possible from the whitebeam and rowan trees before the migrants arrive. Di has also been visited by marsh tits – a species that is in decline, so this is good news.

#### FROM THE VICARAGE

In Church, November always feels something of a 'transitional' month, waiting for the season of Advent, which in turn heralds Christmas. However, a significant fixture in November is Remembrance Day and so also, Remembrance Sunday.

I always have problems with Remembrance Sunday and its place in our national life. For as a younger man, it seemed obvious (and easy) as a Christian to hold a pacifist position. The appalling, mutual brutality of War was a gross affront to what God wanted for the world.

Christians should take no part in it, nor collude with what could appear to be a celebration of military victory. In the end there were no victors, only deep and prolonged damage to both sides. And always seeds sown for further bitter enmity.

Yet the war in Ukraine, particularly, has pushed me further into a corner of doubt. Surely the stance of listening to the needs of both sides, compromise and appeasement, in the face of an authoritarian and duplicitous aggressor, isn't good enough. When we pray for Ukraine and the people of Russia we're not simply asking that they start being nice to each other. Yes, we pray for peace, but also for justice. And we support Ukraine in their desperate fight to preserve the freedoms of a liberal democracy as we fought, rightly, in two World Wars, to preserve our values and freedoms.

Our democratic nation state, with its institutions and balances against tyranny, isn't perfect. But its relative stability and fairness alone foster future peace and prosperity. Moreover, in a world facing the rising threats of global warming and the rapidly evolving technologies of Artificial Intelligence and biological sciences, surely the only chance for their containment, and use for the benefit of all, are the regulatory frameworks that only stable, honest and cooperating nation states can provide?

Thus, remembering with gratitude the sacrifices of our forebears in facing down the evils of tyranny seems more important than ever.

So what, if anything, does the Christian gospel have to add to this? Perhaps we need to raise our sights above a too cosy and complacent proclamation of God's love for us, to embrace more faithfully our trust in the dreadful, but lifegiving paradox of the Cross: God sharing in the profound conflicts in our lives, to bring us *all* home safely ... together.'
