# PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

The following are notes from the meeting held on 22 January. The full draft Minutes are on the noticeboards.

#### Planning:

- CCC/23/110/FUL Anaerobic digester & Streetly Hall farm access road: A decision is unlikely until spring. Further investigations are being made regarding the impact on the landscape. Mr Covey would be happy to show people round.
- 2. Possible family leisure destination at Horseheath Lodge: Cllrs Temple, Mulley-Richards & Schuilenburg have accepted an invitation to visit the site.

**Finance:** The full details of financial transactions are shown in the draft minutes available on the noticeboards. *Budget:* The Chairman discussed the financial needs for

*Budget:* The Chairman discussed the financial needs for the coming year and said there was a shortfall of £4735 after Greenscape Energy had been paid for the Village Hall solar panels. He will put in an application for a grant to cover this from The Wadlow Wind Farm fund.

*Precept:* It was agreed to request an increase of 3.17% making the precept £13000 for 2024/2025. This was agreed.

#### Traffic & Parking issues:

Local Highways Initiative application for new speed signs. This has now been submitted and accepted for consideration.

#### Maintenance:

- 1. *Footpaths:* One cross field footpath is still to be reinstated and the Parish Clerk will write to the landowner about this.
- 2. *Wild flower area re cut back & hedging:* The Parish Clerk had established that English Cottages are responsible for maintenance of this land as they own the houses in Home Close and she will write to them.
- 3. Dog fouling issue, dog fouling signs and additional general waste bins: There has been a good response to the request put into the Village Voice and there have been no further complaints. The cost of signage has been looked into and this will be purchased but ordering further bins will be delayed.
- 4. *Trimming of hedges.* Owners of hedges that need cutting will be asked to do so.

# DISTRICT AND COUNTY COUNCILLOR'S REPORTS

**Civil Parking Enforcement.** Local authorities in South Cambridgeshire have spent the last few years preparing and applying to the Secretary of State to take parking enforcement powers away from the Police and manage locally. The new traffic wardens are now active, out on the street, and issuing parking fines. There were certainly some unhappy people at Whittlesford Station in the first week of February.

The County Council has a list of problem areas in each of our villages, supplied by Henry Batchelor with support from Parish Councils, but if anyone feels that there are specific areas where parking is really an issue, do let him know directly.

**Home Energy Support.** The District Council is in a partnership with 6 other local authorities in Cambridgeshire. This partnership called Action on Energy, is aimed to help people create more energy efficient homes, therefore making them cheaper to run. There are various grants available which many people aren't aware they may be entitled to. Weed Killing Policy. Some may recall that last year the County Council altered its weed killing policy to move away from using chemicals to kill weeds in every situation. This policy has been reviewed after a year and is likely to be altered, although the Council will be asking for people's views on this via a public consultation on the change to policy. #### CUSTOMS AND FOLKLORE FROM THE PAST

The former custom of skipping on Parker's Piece in Cambridge on Good Friday (29 March this year) is quite well known – it is often mentioned in local newspapers and on the radio at this time of year – but skipping on Good Friday was apparently a custom rather nearer to home as well.

According to Enid Porter, in her Cambridgeshire Customs and Folklore, the skipping on Parker's Piece was performed on Good Friday until 1939-40 when it ceased for the  $2^{nd}$ World War and never really re-started. Families would arrive about 10am bringing with them ropes and a picnic and staving until early evening. Men traditionally turned the ropes with the women and children jumping. There were stalls selling sweets, ice cream, toys etc all along Parkside. She also recorded that in the 1930s an 80 year old woman from Linton recalled that in her youth the villagers of Hadstock and Linton used to skip to the Bartlow Hills on Good Friday to join in the fun of the fair held there. The Horseheath historian, Catherine Parsons, in her collection of memories of village residents, also mentions this event. However, she does not mention skipping – just that people from Horseheath and the neighbouring parishes went to the Bartlow Hills on the afternoon of Good Friday to 'dance around'. It's interesting that Roman burial mounds were the focus of such jollity on a Christian festival!

I was also interested that skipping was a form of travel as when I was a girl it was very much a stationery pastime – in the street or more usually in the school playground. Skipping was part of the annual cycle of playground games along with ball games, chasing games, jacks, fivestones and I assume marbles (at my large village primary school the infant children and the junior girls had one playground and the junior boys had another one just to themselves so we were not party to their games). One day, almost certainly in the spring, someone would bring in a rope and before long we would all be skipping. This would either be with one long rope with a girl turning at each end or with individual ropes depending on the whim of the moment. Skipping was done to rhymes passed down from generation to generation, each with words and order particular to the school. All these games must have encouraged agility, dexterity and hand/eye coordination which surely has served us in good stead over the intervening years.

Men, by the way, took advantage of one of the few holidays from work on Good Friday to plant their potatoes, an important family staple.

# NATURE NOTES

I got out of bed this morning and looked out of the window to see a **heron** standing beside our pond. Herons never give the impression of joie de vivre, but this one looked particularly disappointed on two counts – seeing me looking out of the window and realising the meagre fare that was on offer for him in the pond. I was about to say that 'some days there just ain't no fish', but before I could open my mouth the bird had flown off in a disdainful manner. Needing a boost for my self-respect, this was provided by the pair of robins who presented themselves, as they do daily, when I opened up the chicken house. They expect, and receive, a share of the chickens' breakfast.

The heron did not figure in my **Big Garden Birdwatch** this year. It was dominated by the colony of house sparrows who reside under our garage roof, while Di had a preponderance of the tit family and others had goldfinches or blackbirds and fieldfares, depending on what food was on offer on the bird tables and feeders. Jan Dennis spotted a sparrowhawk no doubt attracted by all the small birds on the bird feeders. Happily a pair of greenfinches were attracted to Andrew and Janet's feeder (see last month for concerns about greenfinches).

It is nearly springtime and the mating season is upon us. First out of the blocks, it seems, are the **earthworms**. Steve Licence came across two of them attached 'at the saddle'. Earthworms are hermaphrodites in that they contain both male and female organs. They can either reproduce sexually, in which case a mating pair will exchange sperm (like these two), or self fertilize, thus doing away with the need for relationship counselling. We would not exist if it were not for worms. 500million years ago worm-like creatures tunnelled through the ocean floor, thereby keeping oxygen at just the right level to allow animals and other complex life forms to evolve. We still depend on earthworms for many reasons, so it seems fitting to quote William Cowper from his poem *The Task*:

'I would not enter on my list of friends...the man who needlessly sets foot upon a worm.'

My copse camera has captured two foxes together on a couple of occasions (not in such an intimate embrace as the earthworms) but probably an item. As the copse is also populated by badgers I doubt whether we will be seeing cubs in this location, but in the meantime, those of us who keep poultry need to be doubly careful during the next couple of months when foxes are feeding their families.

It's the time of year when birdsong comes into its own, and the resident songsters are in good voice. It is very uplifting to be woken by a song thrush high in a tree, or a blackbird deep in the shrubbery. And the spring flowers will soon be showing. Already violets can be found in sheltered spots, green shoots of cuckoo pint and dogs mercury are showing and blackthorn is starting to flower in one or two places. I even spotted a celandine in flower this morning – all signs that an early spring could be on the way.

## MY EARLY DAYS IN WEST WICKHAM Pt 2

Easter weekend was quite busy. On Good Friday there were three Salvation Army services, one in the morning at Linton, one in the afternoon in West Wickham and one in the evening at Haverhill. At all the services the three SA bands joined together, as did the songster brigades.

In my early teens I started going to the regular afternoon service at Haverhill, as there wasn't one at West Wickham. I cycled the six miles there with my cornet in my duffle bag. The Haverhill band played marches, while at that time the West Wickham band only played hymn tunes. After the service I had tea at the Colour Sergeant's home and watched football on the television. I then cycled back to West Wickham and, after putting my bicycle away, joined the open air service before marching back to the Hall.

When I was in my mid-teens I started going to the Royal Albert Hall in London to listen to the national brass band championships sponsored by the Daily Herald, part of which was broadcast on the Light programme (now Radio Two). Our trombone player, Iris Dockerill, was going out with a member of Haverhill Silver Band, which is how we got the tickets and transport to London.

When I attended the Grammar School for Boys in Cambridge I joined the school orchestra which played once a week in school assembly. I was provided with a cornet by the school and they also arranged cornet lessons for me. For these I had to go to the Cambridge Technical College once a week after school. I once visited the school when I was on leave from the RAF. I was wearing my RAF uniform and after seeing the Headmaster I visited the classrooms of my old teachers. Mr Hare, my old English master, got me to tell his class about my life in the RAF and my old Music master, Geoffrey Varley, was particularly pleased to see me and find out how I was getting on. He invited me to play the EB bass with the school orchestra at its next concert, but I wasn't able to.

In my late teens I played the Last Post and Reveille with the Bandmaster at the Remembrance Parade and Church service which was usually held at Horseheath, although one year it was held at West Wickham.

When I was nineteen I saw an advert in the paper saying there were vacancies in the RAF for musicians. I applied and received an application form. I had to go to the recruiting office in London. I went there three or four times. Each time I was given a travel warrant to get a train from Cambridge railway station (this was in the days of the steam trains) to Kings Cross.

In June 2013 I looked on the internet to see what I could find out about West Wickham. I discovered there was a village newsletter so I got in touch with Andrew and have had a copy of the newsletter ever since. On 1 August 2013 I created a flickr group and a youtube slideshow called the Salvation Army West Wickham (Cambs). I also created a flickr group called Salvation Army Bands which features the West Wickham SA band.

#### **BALSHAM WI**

The speaker at our February meeting was Jan Cassidy with a talk about Women in Prison and how it affects their families and their mental health. Women make up 4% of the total prison population in England and Wales which means that there are few prisons in the country and therefore they will be a long way from home for visits. Women are more likely to be imprisoned for minor crimes and have a relatively short sentence, but this causes major disruption to children who must be taken into care, especially as many are re-offenders and the whole cycle repeats itself. It is estimated that 67% of the total prison population suffers from Mental Health problems.

Many questions were raised about the facts and Jan suggested that research showed that maybe longer sentences with better support or community sentences would bring about better outcomes with less re-offending.

At our next meeting on 12 March, we will be having a session on Mindfulness by Mel Cunningham. This will be a session on reducing stress, followed by our brief annual meeting.
