CUSTOMS AND FOLKLORE FROM THE PAST

June was the time when the travelling fair went from village to village (conveniently when there was a 'breather' between the hay and corn harvests). In West Wickham the fair took place on and around the 6th of the month on the green next to the White Hart (now White Gables). In the 19th century it lasted nearly a week and the head teacher had to close the school as attendance was very low! Not long after he moved to the village in 1865, the temperance lecturer, John De Fraine, wrote a description of the fair which was published in the local papers. There was a big tent for dancing and stalls selling gingerbread and toys. There were wheels of fortune, booths where you could have your photo taken, skittles, a collection of waxwork figures, a dancing pony and a show with a variety of 'comic and sentimental' performances. The best thing, John said, was seeing the children happy and excited enjoying the few pence they had to spend but unsurprisingly he ended his piece condemning the men who were spending all their money on drink. Catherine Parsons, too, recorded her memories of the fair in Horseheath when she was growing up in the 1880s. She adds stalls selling rock, brandy snaps and sherbert and describes the cheap toys for sale - drums, water squirts, tops, marbles, mouth organs, tin whistles, Dutch dolls and wooden soldiers. There were also stalls selling crockery and fancy goods along with swing boats and coconut shies before dancing in the evening.

Travelling fairs seem to have declined in the 20th century and many did not resume business after the First World War. One or two people have told me they remember a smaller fair in West Wickham between the wars so if you have memories please do get in touch.

West Wickham & District Local History Club is having a summer break from its talks programme but we will be back on 14 October when Richard Adams will be telling us about *RAF Wratting Common: Then & Now.*

NATURE NOTES

Undoubtedly the event of the month was the spectacular show from the **aurora borealis** on 10/12 May – well shared on the village WhatsApp group. It was caused by a massive solar storm which rearranged the sun's magnetic field. The knock-on effect on the Earth's magnetic field gave us this wonderful display and while these events are difficult to predict, experts are saying that another storm could be on its way, potentially affecting the aurora once again, although it probably wouldn't be so widely viewable.

Although the light show was unexpected, the month of May is a more predictable assault on all our senses - sight, sound, smell and touch, the last of which I was made aware of as I brushed past a patch of nettles in my shorts. The **hawthom blossom**, be it white or deep pink, always makes a good show but also gives off a heady aroma, as does the **cow parsley**, or **Queen Anne's Lace**, when you walk along narrow paths flanked by it on either side. **Bluebells** will have finished flowering by the time you read this, but they have been especially bountiful this year and have their own pleasant scent which one experiences when walking through woodland.

Birdsong creates the soundscape, from the dawn chorus, usually started by the incomparable notes of the **blackbird**, until twilight when we hear a **song thrush** bidding farewell to the day. I find that the thrushes and blackbirds are often in good voice after rain so this year has given them plenty of encouragement. Quite a few people have said to me that there have been many **skylarks** singing, which is wonderful because nationally skylarks have been on the decline. To see and hear a lark rising and singing always gives us a boost. Other birds in the area at the moment include some **swallows**, though not as many as we'd like, and a couple of **swifts** which Di spotted going up the High Street. On 15 May she also heard a **cuckoo** behind her house, as I did the following day at Sturmer near where the Stour Brook flows into the River Stour.

Other birds seen in West Wickham this month include a **stonechat**, which we normally associate with heathland or rocky coasts. But here it has found a place it likes near the crossroads at the top of the village, a place where it has been seen several times over the years. I've also had a number of reports of **reed buntings**, who often sit quite prominently on top of hedges or the rape crop. The male is unmissable with a black head and white collar. Some people have expressed concern about the lack of **yellowhammers** but I heard one at Thurlow the other day so hopefully we will soon be hearing requests for a '*little bit of bread and no cheese*'.

Di and I both have moth traps and as the nights get warmer there are more and more moths flying around during the hours of darkness, some of which can be lured into a trap by light. When the trap is opened up in the morning, they are free to fly away. Di has caught a **poplar hawk moth** in her trap, a beautiful insect which flies from May to September, but as an adult does not feed as it does not have a functional proboscis. It relies totally on the fat reserves built up as a caterpillar which feeds on its host plant, having hatched out from an egg laid under a poplar leaf, or sometimes sallow, willow or aspen.

Beyond the Curriculum at LVC. We are proud of the depth and breadth of our Enrichment programme. Enrichment encompasses all of the clubs, trips and opportunities for our students outside of lessons and is firmly at the centre of the LVC experience for all of our learners.

A highlight of this month is our Enrichment week. Students in Years 7 and 8 go on a variety of exciting excursions and trips, whilst Year 9 will go further afield on residential adventures to the Peak District and Greece amongst others and will have the opportunity to develop transferable skills such as leadership, resilience, and teamwork.

As part of our Enrichment programme, students are also able to gain a variety of National Qualifications. Year 8 can take part in the Silver Arts Award validated by Trinity College in London and Year 9 can take part in the Gold equivalent.
